First State Bank Records Best Report Ever For Quarter Ending April 15th

Established July 1, 1927, the First State Bank of Rankin had its largest asset figure of any call date with its Report of Condition to the Federal Reserve System and State Banking Commission as of last April 15. On that date, total assets at the local banking institution stood at \$7,787,541.39.

This figure shows a substantial gain over the \$6,807,922.27 reflected in the report of approximately a year ago, April 24, 1974. Gains were shown in almost every category with total deposits put at \$6,799,831.21 in the current report, as compared with \$5,896,120.23 last year.

A \$50,000 increase is shown in the Surplus Account, bringing that figure to \$250,000 as compared to the 1974 amount of \$200,000. Undivided profits are


Senior Survey Now Underway

HOW COME DEPT.—

It's probably pure imagination, but one sometimes gets the distinct impression that up in Washington things are not always the same—that what is said to be black and white today may very well turn out to be white and black at some later time.

A prime example of this can be seen in the Vietnam thing. For years we've been told by Washington—the State Department in particular—that it is to the utmost advantage of the U. S. that the Commie be kept out of Southeast Asia. A lot of men died and huge amounts of money was spent to that end. Now, with the end at hand—possibly before you read this—we read in last Monday's newspapers a statement attributed to "some high ranking sources in the State Department" that, perhaps, it's a good thing that the Communist are taking over there.

The reasoning for this about-face is that the Reds probably won't get along together very well and that this will work to the advantage of the United States — something like the spat between the Chinese and Russians—and that we can sit back and enjoy it and it won't cost us a thing.

It took State something like twenty years to get around to this position, which puts them about nineteen years behind a lot of the rank and file "com-

ferent ways. In China, for in-

get right down to it, that's prob-

learn anything in a lifetime, it

In the U. S. we are prone to
put much emphasis on youth
and things new, and—I believe

back. In so doing, we have very

no longer useful as a worker.


