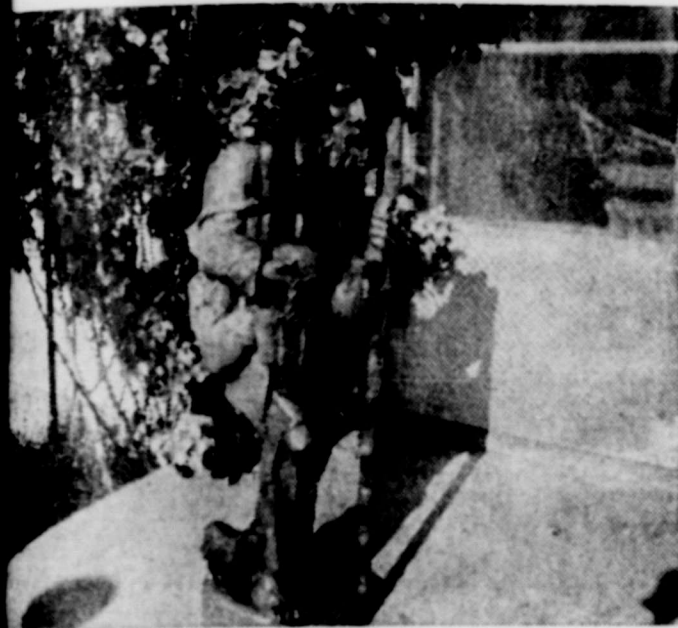

Jaycees Planning Observance For 4th Of July

In a meeting held last Tuesday night, members of the newly formed Rankin Jaycees voted to sponsor a July 4th observance that will make note of the Bicentennial Celebration.

To be known as the Bicentennial Barbecue, the event is to get underway at 4:00 p.m., Friday, July 4 at the Rankin Swimming Pool Park and will feature

a short program. This will be followed by a free barbecue, with all the trimmings.

In making the announcement of their plans, acting Jaycee president Gordon Shultz said, "A cordial invitation is extended to all residents of the Rankin and Midkiff area to attend this July 4th observance. We'd like to see a good turn-out and are sure that everyone will enjoy themselves."

The Jaycees also noted that

they could use any help, in the way of food donations, that any business firms or residents might wish to make.

This will mark the first July 4th observance to be held in Rankin in several years. Previously, the Beta Sigma Phi sponsored a July 4th party for several years and these were well attended. Should this one prove to be a success, the Jaycees will then consider whether or not to continue the practice.

Rankin Schools to Go To Quarters with 1975-76 Term

Students in Rankin Schools will be bringing home a slightly different type of report card when school opens this fall. A state requirement puts all Texas schools on the quarter system starting with the 1975-76 school term.

Orders have already been placed for the new cards; however the students won't get any big break since there is still a place where their grades, department and progress will be recorded for their parents' investigation. Nor will the parents gain much in the way of less signing of these reports. Six signatures will still be required on each card for the year.

A native of San Angelo, Miss

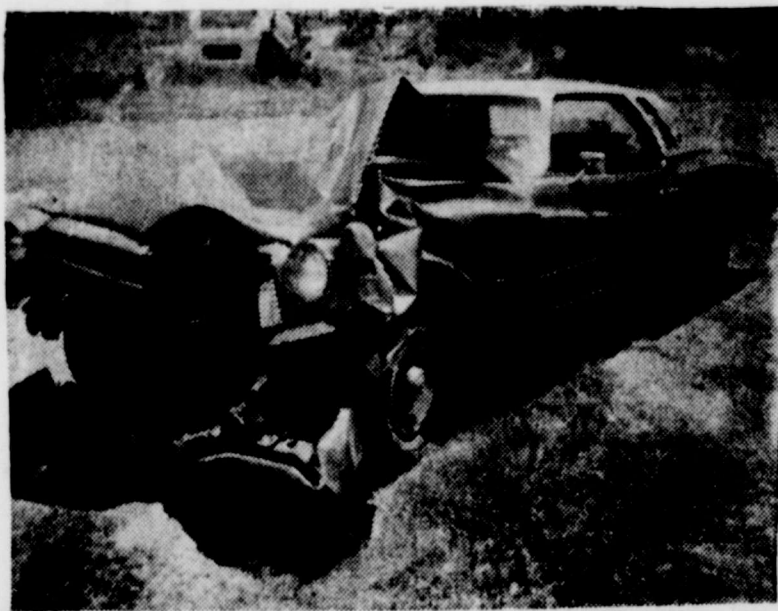

WHAMOS —

As a rule Rankin has a car accident about as often as we do a two-inch rain—not very often. But of late, that has—for some reason — changed rather drastically. For about five days in a row a week or so ago, the local law officers averaged working a wreck a day. Not counting the big pile-up on the Midland highway back in the spring, there has been about a dozen other wrecks over the past 30 days or so.

Although property damage has been very heavy, only one person has been killed and so far none have been seriously injured. In that respect, it might be said that we're lucky; but the odds on this "luck" are fast running out.

A recent report in the Midland Reporter-Telegram counted some 281 wrecks within the city limits

A car, truck, cycle or what have you will, when left to its own devices, hardly ever cause a wreck. It will generally just stay put where it's parked. It's only when a person gets behind the wheel and cranks it up that it becomes dangerous. That, in itself, pretty well tells us what causes wrecks.

THE CRATS —

It's said that we have a Democratic form of government in the United States but I'm not at all sure that that is the proper word. I think we have a Bureaucratic form of government. I do not believe the Congress runs the country, nor does Mr. Ford, nor does those who hold state office. The country is run by the people who staff the agencies, commissions and all the other regulatory groups that have been created over the years — all staffed by people who are professional civil servants and who are never elected in any manner.

If an agency goofs—as apparently has been the case with the CIA—one or two head men

resign or get chopped but business goes right on as usual with practically the same people in charge. This is a lot like picking a few apples from a tree; the tree really isn't hurt and will go right on with its business of growing and bearing fruit.

One of the prime examples of Bureaucracy in Action can be seen in the Federal operations of HEW—Health, Education and Welfare. They have all but taken over the school systems of the U. S.

Down in Austin last week, HEW told the Austin School District that they were going to get their Federal funds cut off because they had practically all their Spanish speaking teachers concentrated in areas that had predominately Spanish named children enrolled. HEW said that this concentration of Spanish-speaking teachers was an unfair practice.

The Austin Schools assistant superintendent, himself of Spanish extraction, pointed out that the reason the Spanish speaking teachers were in the predominately Spanish enrollment schools was that HEW was paying the school district over a million dollars a year to operate a bilingual educational program — the State of Texas now requires such education in classes having 20 or more Spanish speaking students— that the district is required to have teachers in these classes who speak both Spanish and English. And, as pointed out by the assistant superintendent, it so happens that practically all of their teachers with bilingual abilities are of Spanish origin.

Further, HEW and the Austin Schools had went to battle over this very same thing only last year.

But HEW does not offer solutions; even where there apparently are none. They only make their dumb regulations and they have the power to enforce them. Undoubtedly the people in Austin Schools are doing a little hair pulling right now trying to figure

this one out. You've got to admit, it's a classic.

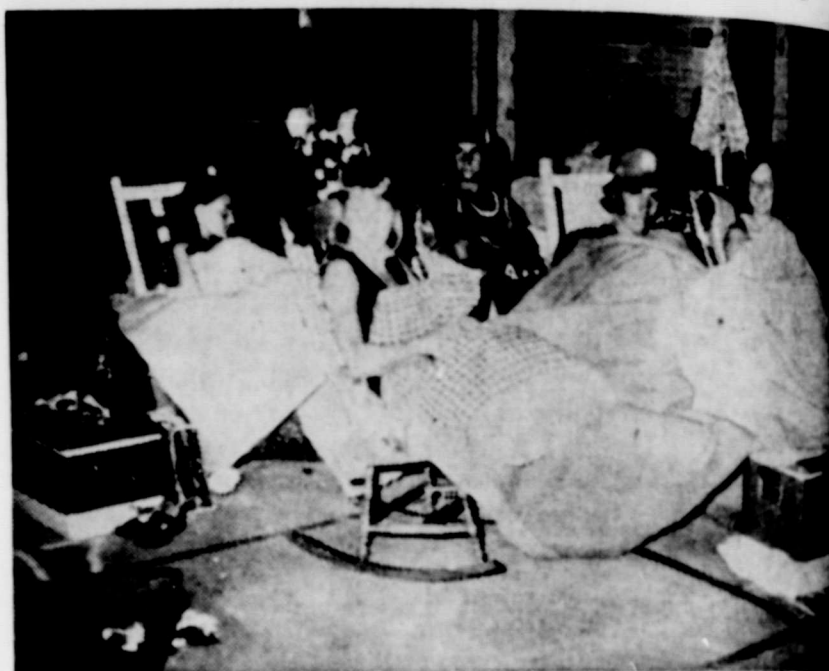

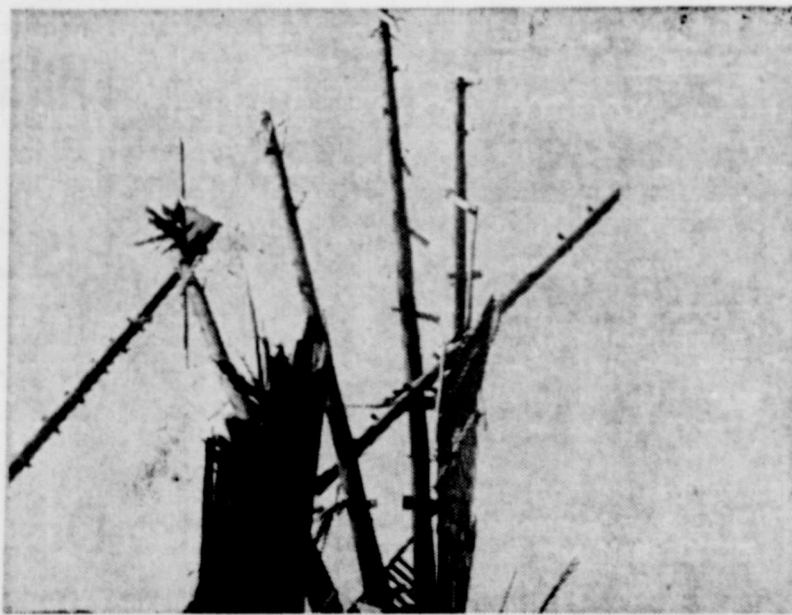

After that, he said to heck with it and there has been no further attempts made at operating a movie of any kind since. Incidentally, the polls that look like toothpicks in the above picture, were some 18 inches thick. It wasn't enough.

Rankin's last "house show" was the Ford Theatre. Originally opened in 1948 in the location now occupied by Boggs Grocery, it was moved into a new building across Main Street in 1952 and operated from there until about the mid-60's.

The building is now slated to be torn down.
