WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Corresponder.t.) WASHINGTON, May 24th, 1884 .-Wednesday of this week was Martin Luther's day in Washington. To the long list of statues of statesmen and warriors that adorn the Capital there was added on that day a colossal bronze memorial to the great reformer. The occasion brought hundreds of Germans here from all parts of the country, and many of the clergy and members of the Lutheran denomination. Fully ten thousand people stood in the broiling sun, in front of the Memoial Lutheran church and witnessed the unveiling. 



Judgment in Farming.

There is no kind of business that requires the exercise of better judgment than most farming operations. It is no uncommon thing to hear a farmer say that he read so and so n his paper, and tried it, and it did not work. Such cases are numerous, and can be accounted for on the ground of a want of exercise of proper judgment.

In the first place, it must be renembered that conditions are variable and change, and what would work successfully in one case would work injury in another. The trouble is, that in far too many cases ufficient regard is not had to making mention of every circumstance attending any mode of procedure.

As an illustration, suppose that a writer makes mention of using a special fertilizer for a green crop, without a mention of any other conditions, and the result is an enormous yield. A reader who does not stop to consider the case, and without thinking of what the conditions might be, makes a purchase of the same kind, but, applying it under different conditions, is disappointed in the result.

One individual, with a soil exactly adapted, may plow to a depth of eight or more inches, whereby he obtained a heavy crop of corn. Now. without consideration or the exercise of judgment, another person whose soil is shallow, perhaps, not more, than five or six inches deep at best, reading the result as report- Scraps of Agricultural News from ed, sets his plow at work to the same depth, whereby the subsoil is turned up to the depth of two or three inches; the chances would be that his erop would be poisoned by the unused subsoil so as to ruin it, and then the disappointed experimenter would complain that the reports in agricultural papers were unreliable. It is an excellent thing for a farmer to read all that he has time for, but not to swallow it all without digestion. And to those who report their successors or failures to the paper, let the suggestion be made, that it is the part of wis dom to always use great care and make mention of every particular that might in any way affect a result.
