INTERSTATE COMMERCE.

Views of the Father of the Proposed Measure.

An Interview with Hon, John H. Reagan of Texas- Why He Regards His Bill as More Conservative of the Public Intorests Than the Other Proposition Before Congress.

Special Correspondence to Times-Democrat. PALESTINE, Tex., 1885. Yesterday I had an interview with Hon. John H. Reagan on the silver question. At the same time I sought to ascertain his views ont he interstate commerce and the reasons that induced him to introduce the bill in Congress that he has so ably and persistently advocated for several years past. The interview that resulted is presented herewith: Correspondent-Mr. Reagan, the Times-Democrat desires your views as to the necessity of congressional legislation in relation to

the railroad transportation of inter-state com-

Mr. Reagan-I have so often discussed the bill, which has been before Congress for the last several years "to regulate interstate commerce and to prevent unjust discrimination by common carriers," in Congress and in the newspapers, that it is hardly necessary now to do more than call attention to a few of its more important provisions. But before I do that it is proper for me to say, as I have often said before, that the bill referred to is not based on prejudice against or hostility to railroads. No one realizes more strongly than I do their great agency in promoting the prosperity, progress and welfare of the people I would not injure or cripple them in any way, but believe that a wise public policy requires that they should be encouraged and fostered, and that reasonable profits on the capital invested in them should be allowed to meet the interest on investments in them, to pay running expenses and repairs, and gradually to pay for the cost of construction. While I would do this, I would abridge the exercise of their monopoly powers, and would take from them the power to wrong others. Cor.-How!

Mr. R.-In two ways. First, by providing by law that their charges should be reasonable, that they should not discriminate between shippers in their freight rates and charges; that they should in no case allow rebates or drawbacks, that they should not charge more for a shorter than for a longer baul on the same road for the same kind and amount of service, and that they should in no case be allowed to pool the freights and earnings of competing railways. These are substantive provisions of what is known as the Reagan bill. And I can call special atten tion to the fact that it does not prescribe rates of freight, or cripple, or in any way hinder the railroads from doing anything which they have a moral or legal right to do; for every form of discrimination between shippers and all pools by competing roads are as clearly unlawful as it would be for a public ferryman or public miller, or keeper of a turnpike to make such discriminations or to agree to pools in order, by such monopely, to extort injust sums from the people for the services endered. The object of the bill is simply to prevent the railroad companies from doing

Mr. R.-The means proposed by the bill for the accomplishment of these purposes is to make the doing of anyting forbidden by the bill or the failure to do anything commended to be done by the bill a misdem anor, punishable in the courts of ordinary jurisdiction, and to afford the citizen injured by a violation of its provisions a plain and specific remedy in the courts of ordinary jurisdiction. And these things are provided for in the bill. The inquiry will probably arise in the mind of the impartial reader, who can object to law so just and fair and necessary as this would be! My answer would be that no one can object to it except those who mean by the use of their monopoly powers to unjustly extort money from the people.

Cor.-What do you think of a railway com-

ing that the public demands action on the sublect, antagonise this beneficent measure by offering in its stead various relilroad commisislation as pretended, but giving no remedy or relief to the people. Is there a disinterested man in the country who believes a commission to be necessary to inform him that it is wrong to make unreasonable charges, or to charge one person more than another for the same kind and amount of service, or to charge one more for hauling a given amount and kind of freight 100 miles than is charged to another for hauling the same 200 miles, or who thinks a commission necessary to enable no right to erect two monopolies into one in order to deny the public the benefits of competition by common carriers, by pooling? These questions would almost insult the publie intelligence, if it were not that misrepresentation and sophistry have been so extensively employed to mislead the public mind on this subject.


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
