



Now Is The Time For.All Good Men. .

Next Tuesday is Election Day. This is a time of perennial, electric excitement which seems unique only to elections, Also, it is a time of sobering sadness.

Here's why: This year in Texas there are an estimated 5,900,000 people over 21, but only 3,110,000 are eligible to vote. And that "eligibility estimate" takes in everybody: poll-taxpayers, folks who were issued exemptions and those who live in towns who do not require over-age exemptions, and those who registered under the federal provision.

So, right off the bat we lost more than two million potential voters.

Now, some forecasters predict a voting turnout of 2,500,000 Texans. That would be a record, but not a record of which to be proud.

That means only about seven out of ten Texans who are eligible to vote will take time out to do so.

You -- and only you -- can do something about it. Only you can go to the polls; only you can cast your vote.

It's up to you. You are voting for more than yourself. You are voting for half of Texas which can't vote for themselves.

SUSPENSION FENCING

"Save With Suspension Fencing" is the title of a new leaflet now at the county agent's office. The leaflet tells how suspension fencing can cut fence costs in half and describes construction of this type of fencing.

Suspension fences are similar to other type of fences except distance between posts is about 100 feet, Such fences work well for boundary, interior and cross-fences.

Another advantage of suspension fencing is its swaying action. This keeps cattle from becoming mixed between pastures and discourages fighting

The fences are easy to repair should a section be torn down, With suspension fences, only one or two posts need to be replaced, where with conventional fences, five or six may need to

This fourth in a series on soil test results is on phosphorus. There are probably

more chemical soil test results for phosphorus than for any other plant nutrient. One reason for so many different tests is that each test is usually designed for a specific area or groups of soils,

It is important to use a phosphorus test which has been developed specifically for an area. Texas A & M University research and extension personnel located at Lubbock have developed such a test specifically designed for the alkaline, calcareous soils of this area. The test consists of extracting a sample of soil with a strong acid solution. The amount that is removed by the acid solution is then mea-

sured. Phosphorus tests are usually classed as very low, low, medium or high. This classification indicates the ability of the soil to provide phosphorus for plant growth. Soils testing in the very low to low range will not usually provide enough phosphorus for good plant grow-

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
