## WOODWORK BY DALTON

A TENNESSEE professor (George Peabody College) says that millions of American children are growing up in frustration because society has nothing for them to do, and they feel useless.

Of course, an obvious crack to that is that some of them not only feel useless, they really are, but it's hardly fair, since they're not entirely to blame. Professor Willard Godin said: "We are possibly the first people in history with little or no economic use for our children, unless one considers their extensive exploitation in advertising."

The man's remarks are aimed primarily at urban areas, which are more thickly populated than ever. Scarcely any places like our own.

Godin stated that for 300 years an American youth carried in the wood at age 6, learned to plow at 12, and became a full-fledged farm hand at 16. (In this area, there still are many farm youngsters who know what it is to work.)

"Now," said Godin, "about the only thing we have for a youngster to do is go to school a few hours a day for about half the days of the year. For most of his time, even the school will be closed to him."

Among the recommendations Godin made were one to keep schools open 12 to 14 hours a day, with different programs. (This would be about as popular as leprosy with most school teachers and administrators.)

Other suggestions, both good, I think, were that parents should try to find work opportunities for their children instead of shielding them from it, and that business and labor should accept their share of the responsibility for furnishing work opportunities for youth.

Paralleling the professor's statements was a remark made this week by a San Antonio dentist who came to our office while scouring the farm communities of West Texas seeking applicants for the San Antonio police force. He commented that it is difficult to get good applicants from cities because so many young men have been in trouble.

"In general, the boys who grew up in the country are more honest and are better workers," he said.

That statement this week by Sudan Coach Hank Brown regarding Friday night's playoff game against Springlake reflected the opinion of just about every fan of the Sudan girls basketball team.

Last Friday night the tall and talented Wolverines edged the Hornets in a real thriller, 63-62 at Hale Center, in the final game of the district tournament. The Springlake girls thereby won the tournament, and Sudan was an undefeated winner of the round robin, so Friday night's playoff game is sure to be another tight contest.

Springlake has beaten Sudan twice this season (one time in the Amherst Tournament), and Sudan has won two times. A free throw in the final 10 seconds proved the difference last week, after Sudan had been struggling to overcome a 5-point deficit at the end of the first quarter. Each team scored 19 in the second and 14 in the third periods. Not until the fourth quarter did Sudan catch up and led briefly a couple of times, only to lose out at the last.

Beth Dent, big No. 21 of Springlake, scored 31 points in the game. For Sudan, Judy Stern had 23, Candace Mudgett 21 and Glennis Gatewood 16.

The playoff game will be at 7:30 p. m. Friday at Olton, with admission prices set at 50 cents for students, \$1 for adults.

Winner of Friday night's game will face the Midland girls, winner of district 4-A.

## Greenies Win Junior High Tourney

Sudan junior high basketball teams wound up as bridesmaids in the Amherst tournament last weekend, with both the Sudan boys and girls losing to Springlake teams in the finals by the identical score of 37-23.

The Sudan teams downed Amherst teams in the first round of the tournament, with Sudan's boys winning 33-26, and the girls winning 22-18.

In second round play, Sudan girls defeated Bula 34-20 and the boys ripped Hart 33-18.

Top scorers for Sudan were Larry Morgan, with 15 points against Amherst, and Mike Bellar, with 11 against Hart and 10 against Springlake. For the girls, Jan Harper had 11 in the Amherst game and 10 against Springlake, while Donna Heard tallied 20 big points against Bula.

Another similarity of the Sudan teams is their identical season records of 11-4. Jimmy Ainsup coaches the boys and Kermit Sorells is girls' coach.

The vote was 105 against and 78 for, and the outcome left the school operating under its present maximum limit of a \$1.50 assessment, including both the maintenance tax and whatever amount is necessary to set aside for retiring bonds. This year the maintenance tax is \$1.25 and the other 25 cents is put into the bond fund.

School board members had little to say about the result, pending a meeting of the group. However, it was indicated that something would have to be done regarding school finances.

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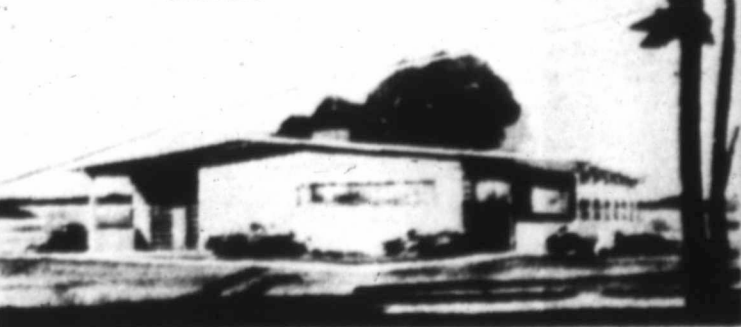

### SAN ANTONIO SEEKS POLICEMEN

Clyde C. McCollough, Jr., Director of the Fire and Police Civil Service Commission of the City of San Antonio, said this week that the City is still seeking qualified men to serve as patrolmen on the San Antonio Police force.

McCollough said the police department offers a challenging career to men who have a co-operative spirit, a desire to serve their fellow men, and the willingness to work conscientiously. The beginning pay for patrolmen is \$380 per month, with an automatic increase to \$410 per month after one year. Officers work forty hours per week with benefits of sick leave, injury leave, overtime pay, regular holidays, retirement system, uniform allowance and three weeks vacation each year.

Applicants must be United States citizens between the ages of 20 and 30, at least 5 feet, 8 inches tall with weight properly proportioned to height, and a high school graduate or equivalent. In addition to motorized patrol duty, there are opportunities for specialized work in traffic control, accident investigation, criminal investigation, juvenile work, police records and identification.
