HORNETTES WIN TOURNEY

Sudan's sharp shooting Candace Mudgett paced the Hornets with 21 points to lead them to a 50-39 victory over New Deal, and a first place trophy in the Sundown tournament.

Miss Mudgett's unconquered jump shot and Nancy Hayes' outstanding defense ability were recognized not only by the three defeated teams - Morton, Sundown and New Deal - but by everyone, as they were named to the all-tournament team.

The Hornets began the tournament by outscoring Morton 52-48. Miss Mudgett led the scoring assault against them all, with 31 points.

The contest was a hard fought battle. At the end of the first period Sudan led 11-10, and at intermission the score was even, 26-26. In the third quarter, Sudan crept ahead of Morton 39-35. Even Evelyn Butler's 26 points didn't rescue the defeated Maidens.

Tension was not alleviated for Sudan, and again they clashed with a tough team, the defending state champions, Sundown.

The speedy Roughettes lived up to their name by giving Sudan a "rough" time. The first period ended in an 8-8 tie. Sundown led 20-18 and 30-29 in the next two. Apparently the Hornets saved the last for the best, because in the final quarter they surged ahead of the Roughettes with a 46-40 win.

Sundown's Jolene Dean, great with an outside shot, pitched 23 points for the losers.

In the finals Sudan trailed 10-6 in the first quarter and 23-22 at the half. Jackie Norman rallied 16 of her 18 points in the third period, putting Sudan in the lead, where they stayed throughout the rest of the game.

The Sudan Hornets won their first game of the season Friday when they walloped Sundown 60-49. The fighting Hornets got a lead in the first quarter and kept it all the way.

Players on both teams spent a lot of time at the free throw line, and by the end of the game, three of Sudan's starting five had fouled out. By then Sudan had a wide

Sudan lost the first game of the tournament to Morton 49-35 and in the finals they were defeated 62-52 by New Deal.

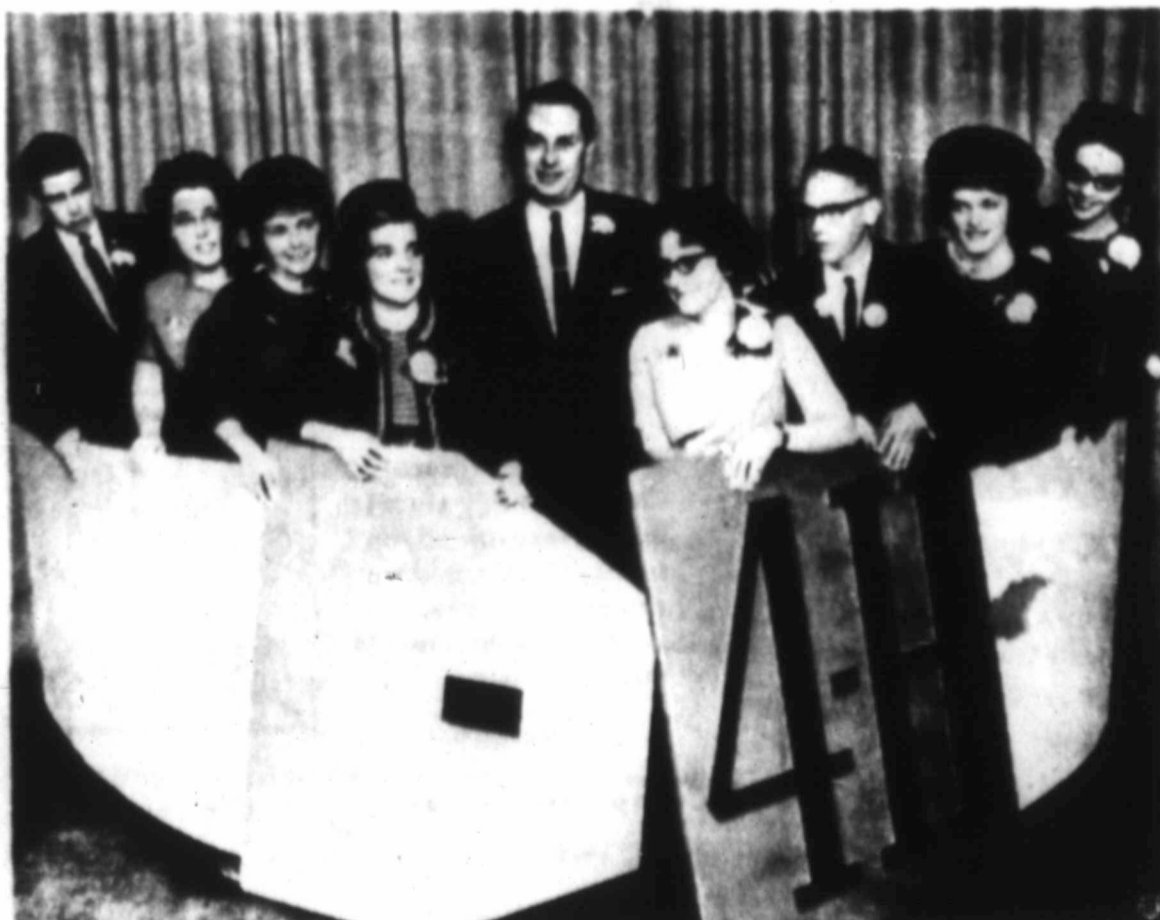
Tommy Thomson netted high for Sudan in both of these games. He had 17 points in the Morton game and 19 against New Deal.

FIRST, SECOND GRADERS TO PRESENT PROGRAM

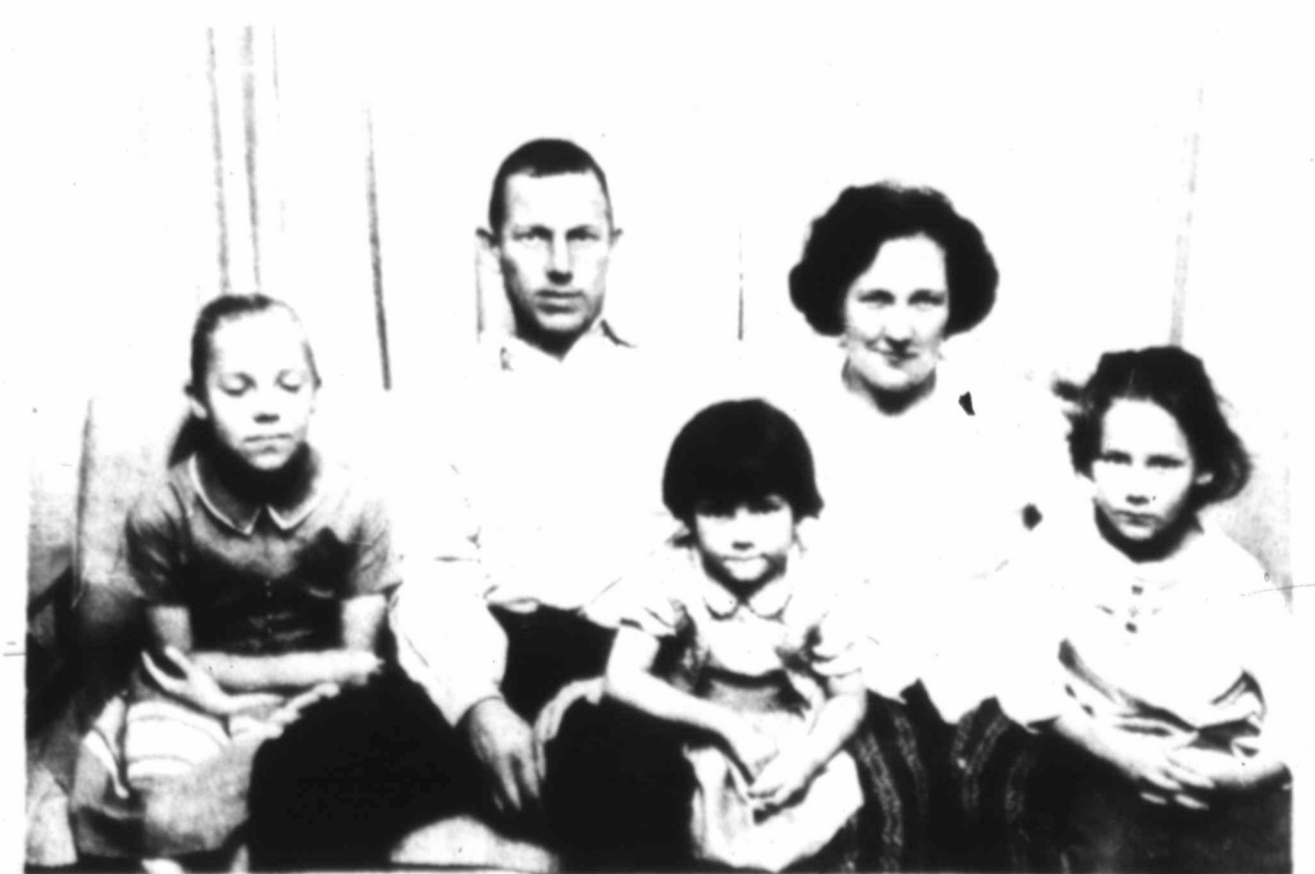

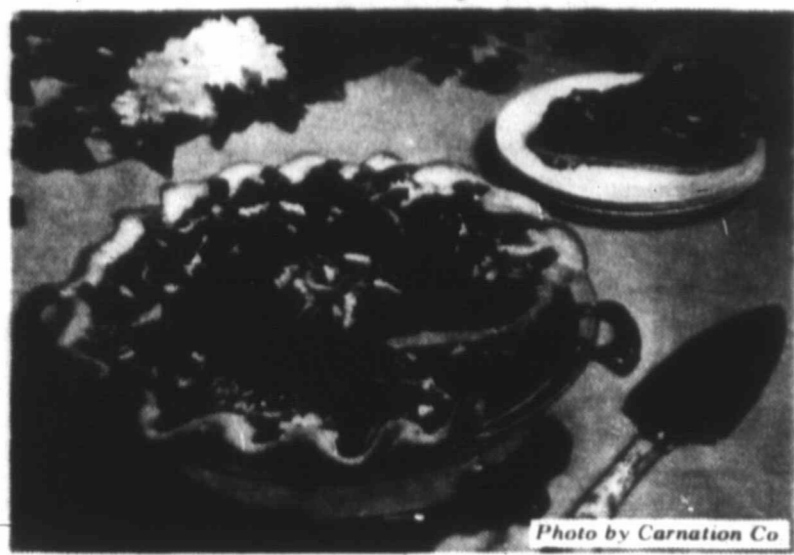

Mix together brown sugar, spices and salt. Stir in eggs, pumpkin and evaporated milk. Pour into pie shell. Bake in hot oven (425°) 15 minutes, reduce heat to moderate (350°) and bake 20 minutes. Sprinkle pie with pecans and bake 20 minutes longer. Cool.

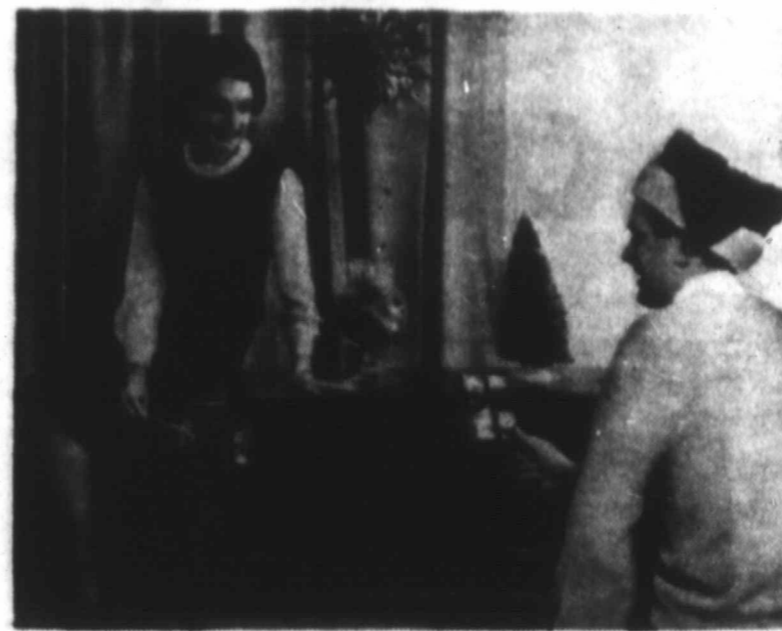

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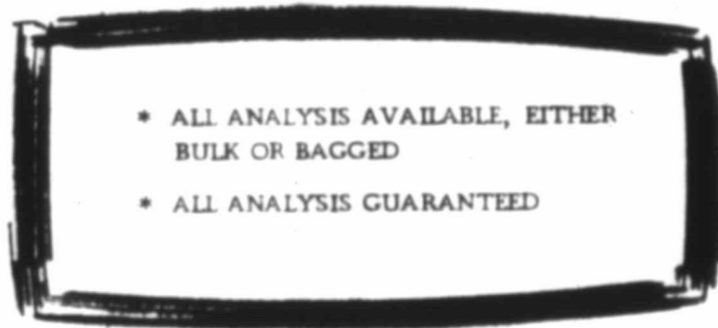

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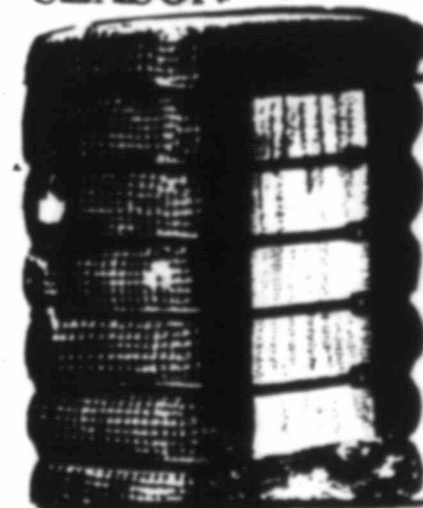
