School Trustee Vote Slated

Terms of three members of the seven-man Sudan School board are expiring this year, and an election has been set for Saturday, April 4, in the district.

The board of trustees Monday night set the election date and deadline for filing, and took

note of the changes in the election law this year.

One change made by the state legislature provides that a candidate for the school board (or any other public office in Texas) must sign a "loyalty affidavit" before he will be certified as a candidate. This stipulates that the candidate is a loyal American. Another change is that a candidate must file personally instead of having his name placed on the ballot by petition of other (this actually is a result of the aforementioned ruling, which says the candidate must sign the loyalty affidavit.)

Still one more switch is that anyone wishing to vote absentee in the school board election may do so at the school office in Sudan, instead of having to go to Littlefield.

Terms of office on the school board are scheduled to expire for Lee Roy Fisher, W. C. Masten and Billy Gore. Those elected are to serve for three years. Fisher is president of the board now, and other members are Nolan Parrish, W. B. Jones Jr., Wiley Mudgett and Guy Walden.

At the board meeting Monday night, the members voted to extend the present contracts of principals Ralph Stewart and Bernard Wilson for another year, giving each of them two more years.

HORNETTES BID FOR DISTRICT TITLE

The Sudan Hornets boosted their season record to 25 wins against a single loss Tuesday night as they finally overcame Springlake 46-30 in the first game of the district tournament at Farwell.

The Hornets took the court just after the Sudan boys closed out their season by losing 71-45 to Hale Center.

Both games were closer than the score indicates, especially in the first halves. The Sudan boys trailed by only one point, 28-27 at halftime, but fell far behind beginning about the middle of the third period. Tommy Thomson led the Hornets with 23 points.

The high-flying Hornets had plenty of trouble in the first half, trailing Springlake 9-8 at the end of the first, and settling for an 18-18 tie at halftime. Sudan's forwards never really got going until the final half, and in the last quarter scored 18 points to 7 for the Wolverines.

Coach Hank Brown used two sets of guards, and all six did a good job. There were other substitutions, but for the most part, he used Nancy Hayes, Kathy Barnett and Linda Logan in the first half, and Kandy Miller, Linda Williams and Sonja Ford in the last.

The Sudan scoring was led by Candace Mudgett's 19 points. Jackie Norman hit 13, and Beth Dent of Springlake had 25.

Next foe for the Hornets in what Sudan fans hope will be a trip to the bi-district and possibly on to regional and state, will be the winner of the Kress-Hale Center game. Kress beat Farwell girls 38-35 Tuesday night. Sudan barely edged Kress two points in the two teams' last set-to.

The Hornets wrapped up the round robin part of the district championship last Friday as they toppled Farwell girls 50-34 behind the tremendous effort of Nancy Williams, who scored 26 points, 18 of them in the first half. That win gave Sudan an 8-0 record in district, and should they lose out Friday night, would have a playoff shot at the tournament winner in order to determine the champion.

If the Hornets win district, the bi-district will not be played for two weeks, and the Sudan team probably will arrange a game with the unbeaten Priona Squaws, Coach Hank Brown indicated. This game would be held next week, possible on a neutral site, and should be a crowd-getter. The two teams are in different divisions, as Priona is Class AA and Sudan Class A, so they would not meet in the playoffs.

WOODWORK BY DALTON

THE LEGISLATURE passed a law last year which may make it tough for school districts like Sudan and Amherst to get candidates for seats on the school board of trustees.

By inserting a "loyalty affidavit", which the new law requires must be signed personally by the candidate before his or her name can be put on the ballot, the legislature apparently has stopped the longtime practice of "drafting" candidates for the job.

Usually when a man is elected to the school board, his friends get together and make up a petition of names and present it, and his name is put on the ballot. If way acts like he job, if elected.

It has always made it easier for the candidates, because most of them would prefer to take the position that they don't really want the job, but would take it if enough people wanted them to. And, in actuality, most of them don't want the job, whether it is on the school board, city commission, or president of the men's auxiliary of the Ladies Bible Class.

Now, if a man's (or woman's) name appears on the ballot, he's going to have to indicate first that he will take the job, and that he is not a communist, and such stuff.

It's too bad, but understandable, that most people view an announced candidate for public office on the small local level with suspicion. They figure that anyone who actively seeks a non-paying, thankless job like the school board or city commission, must have some personal ax to grind, otherwise, they'd be out of their minds to consider it.

It's hard for most of us to realize it, but some folks actually are interested enough and public-minded enough to want to do their part in governing such affairs.

SPORTS NOTES

THE VIEWPOINT that the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal sports department takes toward girls' basketball in general, and apparently toward the Sudan team in particular, is a shame.

I realize that to the big-time sports editors, perhaps, that girls' basketball is a minor sport (it isn't even played above Class AA, and they don't play in college, except for Wayland). But in the classifications where they do play girls' basketball, the schools go all the way to the state championship, and more often than not, the girls' champions come from the South Plains area.

Friona has more success in get-

ting publicity for their girls than Sudan, Idalou, Cotton Center, or any of the other topnotch girls teams in the area. We don't begrudge Friona their publicity, for they obviously have a fine team, but the other good teams should get something like equal space.

A good example of what happens when you call in a basketball story to Lubbock was in last Saturday's paper. A fellow came up to me during the game here with Farwell and said this: "I understand you are the one who calls in those write-ups to the Lubbock paper. Just one time, I wish you'd brag on the girls team a little, instead of starting out with the boys game

and just barely mentioning the girls at the last."

I explained to him that I didn't have anything to do with the way the story is written—I just call in the information. And I added that I know from my own experience as a newspaperman that they won't be dictated to. However, when I called in the story, I pointed out that the girls clinched the round robin by win-

ning their 8th straight in district without a loss, and that for the season they had won their 24th game with only one loss, an early 2-point non-conference loss to Morton girls which Sudan twice avenged. I also gave them the names of the high scorers for both teams in that girls game with Farwell.

Again let me say, I don't be-

grudge Friona their publicity. They have an excellent team, and there's a chance that if both teams win their district titles as expected, Sudan and Friona (Class AA) will play each other in a playoff game prior to the playoffs. That should be something to see, if the game ever develops. Anyway, here is a comparison of stories in the Avalanche-Journal about the two schools Saturday.

was in their failure to mention Nancy Williams' 26 points scored that night. Of course, they didn't know that it was the highest total she ever has scored in a game, but I'm sure that she and her parents and friends were highly disappointed that her name wasn't even mentioned after playing such a great game (18 points in the first half). The girl deserved some notice, at least.

The Amarillo paper Saturday did have Nancy's name in small type, which was as much as they gave any other girls team (or boys, in Class A).

Monday the A-J had an interesting story on Friona's record. Sundown probably could come close to matching that, and Sudan, too. I don't know how long they have won it every year in the five seasons I've been here, and that they went to the state finals in 1959.

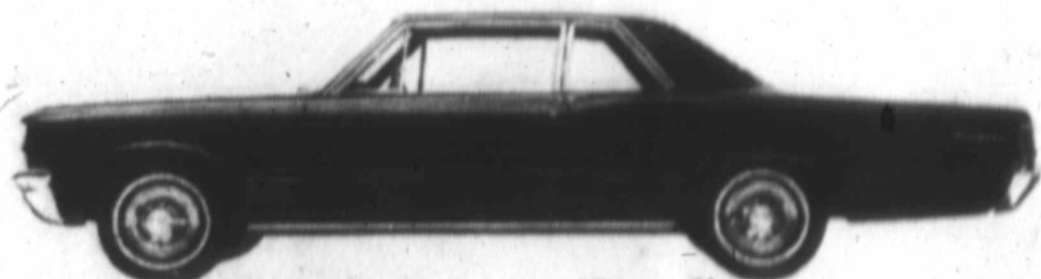

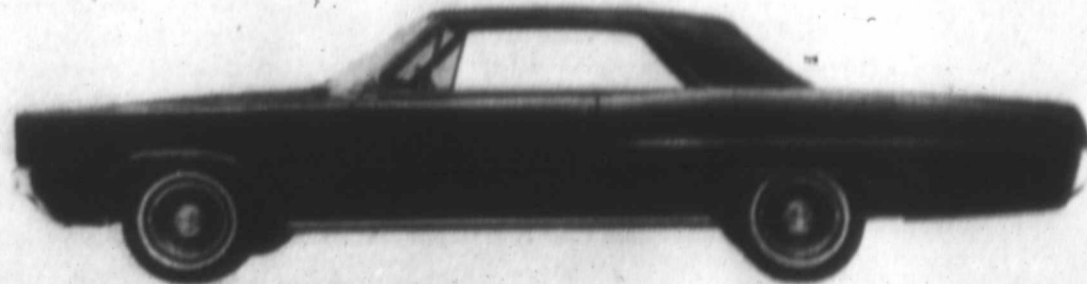

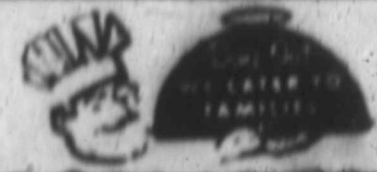

Scripture: St. Matthew 12:50; 18:14; St. John 1:13; 4:34; St. Luke 19:10; James 1:18-22.

"For whosoever shall do the will of my Father which is in heaven, the same is my brother and sister and mother."

Whenever you think of the will of God, do you think of joyful service, or do you shrink from praying "Thy will be done" for fear of a cross, a tragedy or pain or sacrifice you may be called on to endure?

Then what is God's will? Let's do some Bible searching (ye are sanctified by the washing of the Word) and see if we can learn something about God's will.

"This is the will of God, so I must endure it". How many times you and I have heard this statement. But, remember, the sunshine is God's will, too, (as Charles L. Allen once said).

There is something I can tell you by experience about God: My heavenly Father Always wills

what is the best for His children, (and He knows His children, each one). (Roman 8: 28.)

Fresh Corn in Winter—From Florida

Fresh corn on the cob in the winter! A few short years ago this would have seemed impossible. Now, sweet corn in the husk is shipped from Florida fields while snow still covers much of the nation. Jet fast cooling methods, used within minutes after picking, keep this corn tender and sweet though it may travel long distances to market.

FRESH TIPS ON FRESH CORN

IN FOIL: Place each ear of corn on a square of aluminum foil. Top with 1/2-inch slice butter or margarine. Wrap securely by making a double lengthwise fold on top of the ears. Turn ends up and fold smooth against the corn. Bake 20 to 25 minutes or until tender in a preheated hot oven (400° F) or over the grill, turning to cook uniformly. To serve, open the foil and turn back, crimping it to make attractive.

ROASTED CORN IN HUSK: Loosen husk on ears of fresh corn only enough to remove silks. Pull husks back in place and tie in place with a strip of the husk. Place over grill and cook 20 to 25 minutes, turning to cook uniformly. If desired, cook corn by this

method in a moderate oven (350° F). The baking time is the same as for barbecue grill.

CHIVE BUTTER:

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 2 tablespoons chopped chives
- 1/2 teaspoon fresh lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/16 teaspoon ground black pepper

Soften butter or margarine and blend in the remaining ingredients. Serve over hot corn. Yield: 1/2 cup.

CORN BUTTERS: Soften 1 stick (1/2 cup) butter or margarine and blend with either of the following spices:

- 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon chili powder
- 1 teaspoon curry powder

Most Cars Still Lack Inspection

Motor vehicle inspections are lagging behind with fewer than 30 per cent of the required vehicles in Region 5 displaying a 1964 inspection sticker, according to Capt. Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection supervisor of this area for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"With the deadline for obtaining inspection stickers drawing near only 30 per cent of the vehicles in Lamb County have been inspected," he said. "If this trend continues, vehicle owners can expect to have to wait in line in order to get their vehicles inspected by the April 15 deadline."

Captain Johnson called atten-

tion to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program, vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13 per cent to 4 per cent.

The captain noted that Texas had its worst traffic fatality record in history last year. The count has already exceeded 2700 lives lost, by far the greatest toll in history, and is expected to go some higher before the books are

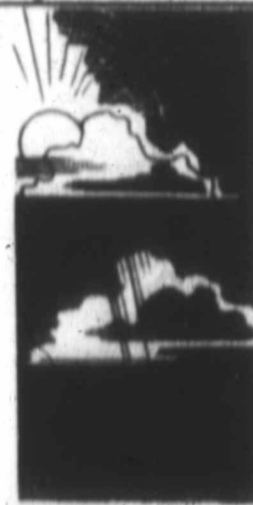
closed on the official 1963 traffic fatality count. Vehicle defects were involved in some of these fatal accidents.

SOIL NEWS

A conservation cropping system may be defined as growing crops in combination with needed cultural and management measures. The SCS terms such a cropping system as necessary to meet the needs of the soil for improvement or maintenance of good physical condition and to protect the soil from erosion.

The necessary components of a good conservation cropping system are: soil improving crops, high residue producing crops, crop rotation, the utilization of all crop residues, and emergency tillage if needed.

Anyone who desires assistance in developing a conservation cropping system should contact the Soil Conservation Service office.

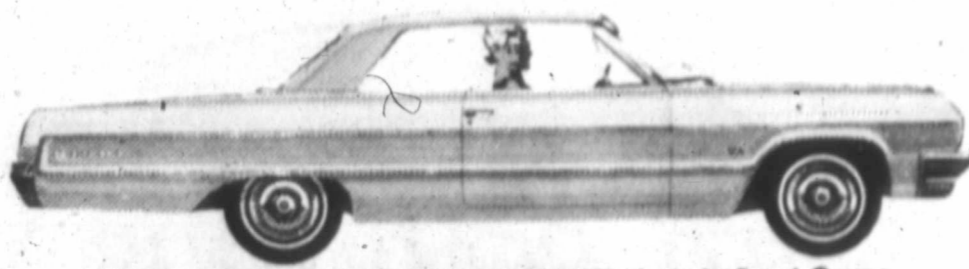

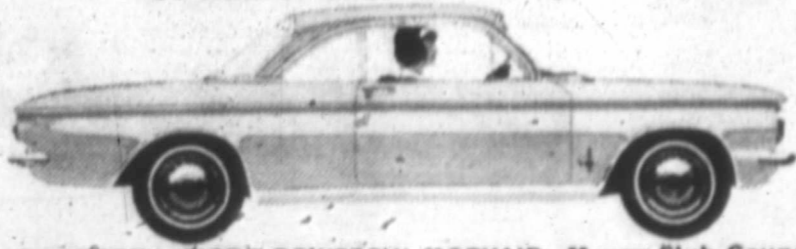
