Deputy Sheriff Homer McLauray said the boys admitted taking a variety of items, including tools and gasoline, from different spots that night when they went from Circle Back to Amherst, then to Levelland where they reportedly unloaded some of the stolen goods.

The Sudan Hornettes have made it to regional again.

A spot in the regional tournament at Lubbock this Friday was nailed down by Coach Hank

Brown's girls Monday as they came from behind in the second half to even up some old scores

with Idalou, winning 48-39 at Abernathy.

Sudan will play Gruver in the first game of the regional meet at Lubbock, with the game scheduled for 8:30 a.m. in the coliseum.

Finals in the regional tournament will be at 7 p.m. Friday, when the winner of the Sudan-Gruver game will play the winner between the Big Bend district representative not known at press time and Wylie, which upset Sundown 45-43 Tuesday night, in a double overtime.

Gruver defeated Wellington 49-37 Tuesday night as two terrific forwards scored most of the points. LaNetta Blankenship had 19 and Anita States 27 for the winners. Coach Brown viewed the game at Amarillo.

Sudan's top scorer, Candace Mudgett, led the way with 29 points Monday at Abernathy, but it was not until the second half that she was hitting on all cylinders. Jackie Norman had 11 points for Sudan, and Sharon Walters scored 8, shooting rarely. Sandra Foreman led Idalou with 22.

Much of the credit for the bi-district win however, must go to a trio of Hornette guards who surely played the finest game of their lives. It was in the third period, when Idalou was leading Sudan by 7 points, that Coach Brown put in a combination of Kathy Barnett, Kand Miller and Sonja Ford, and these three really did the job. Miss Barnett played her usual good game, and then some, but Miss Miller and Ford acted as though Coach Brown had threatened them with the rack if they didn't put out a superhuman effort. Ford went for the rebounds with a sudden astounding ferocity and Miller and Barnett passed the ball around like the Globetrotters to give Sudan a number of extra scoring opportunities. In the last three and a half minutes of the third quarter, Sudan made 13 points while Idalou was held scoreless, and with a 35-29 lead at that point, it was a matter of staying ahead.

Sudan took a 12-6 lead midway of the first quarter, but suddenly cooled off and Idalou tied it 12-12 at the end of the first quarter, with guard Alice Sitton doing a fine job of defending. In the second, Idalou took a lead which lasted until Sudan's third-period spurge.

Guard Nancy Hayes fouled but in the third period, and Miss Mudgett played the last five minutes with four fouls, a situation which did little to help the nerves of Hornette fans.

## Ex-Peace Corpsman Tells Of Venezuela Experiences

The work of the Peace Corps has a better chance than increased military preparations for stopping the worldwide spread of communism.

This was the opinion voiced Monday by Mickey Rudd of Sudan and Bula, who recently was

a member of a Peace Corps agriculture team in Venezuela. Rudd, now a college student, spoke to Sudan Jaycees and guests regarding his work while he was in the Peace Corps.

One of his listeners asked Rudd the following question: "Do you think it would do the free world more good to take some of the men going into the armed services and put them into the Peace Corps instead?" Rudd's answer was, "Very definitely, yes."

Rudd told the group how candidates for the Peace Corps were given rugged tests, including swimming 50 feet under water, staying afloat 45 minutes with hands or feet tied, and taking a 3-day hike through a jungle with practically no food—just a little sugar and a few dried prunes—"a real good way to lose some weight," he smiled.

Rudd reported that the team was cut to 35 members by the time they entered the interior of Venezuela to be dispersed, and 12 girls were included on the team. Rudd said he was taken to a small village and left on his own, not seeing his companions for two or three months. In the village, his job was to form S-V clubs, similar to the 4-H clubs in the states, training

youth to be better farmers. He explained that it was easier to teach the adults through the younger people, because adults would not listen to many suggestions.

Although many of the students profess to be communists, most have only a hazy idea of what communism stands for, Rudd reported. However, he noted, the professors and teachers are for the most part fully indoctrinated communists.

In the village, Rudd reported he was regarded highly, even called "the king", and said that he was treated well during his tenure in Venezuela—except perhaps for the one time a misunderstanding in language at a police road block caused him to get his jeep shot full of holes.

Scripture: II Chronicles 33:9-16; 5C Luke 12:37-40.  
Repentance is a word we seldom hear, except from the pulpit of some churches, but I want to write of repentance, asking you to remember that the message which made straight the way for Jesus' coming was "Repent, for the Kingdom of heaven is at hand."

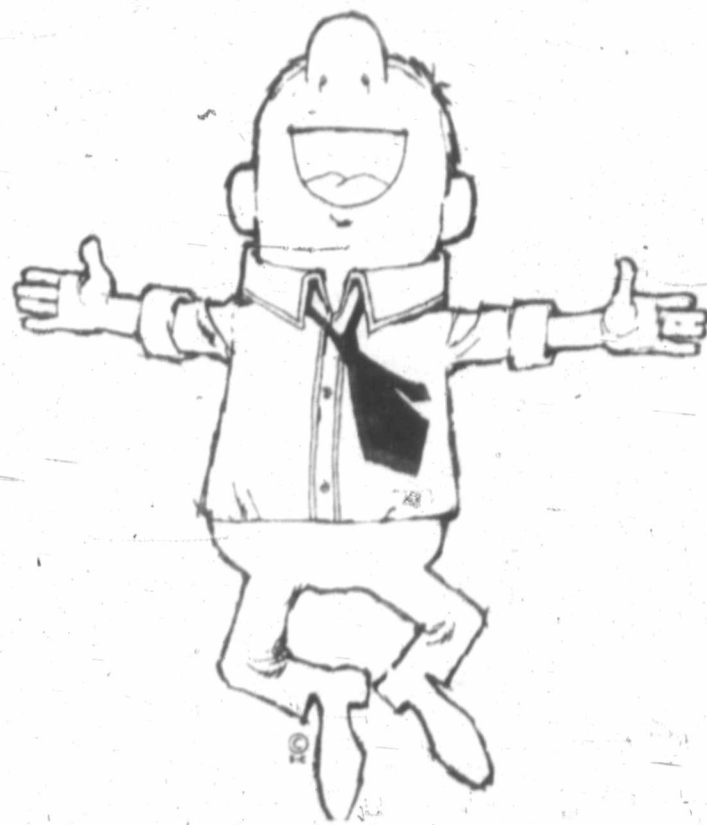
# New Tax Rules Affect Farmers

A number of new rulings significant to farmers who are filing income tax returns this year are in effect, and farmers who are not aware of the changes may be cheating themselves out of money they could quite legally claim in the form of deductions or in other ways.

A different procedure for reporting income from cotton sales is involved in some of the changes, according to Bates Witt, certified public accountant.

Witt, who has an office in the Sudan First National Bank building, added that another important change is concerned with reporting methods of depreciation of equipment, always a major factor in reporting of agricultural income.

The accountant pointed out that it will almost certainly benefit farm operators to keep abreast of the latest developments in income tax reporting, as well as in related bookkeeping procedures.

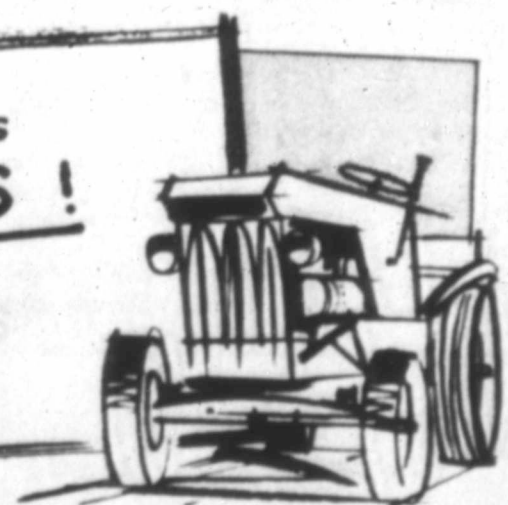

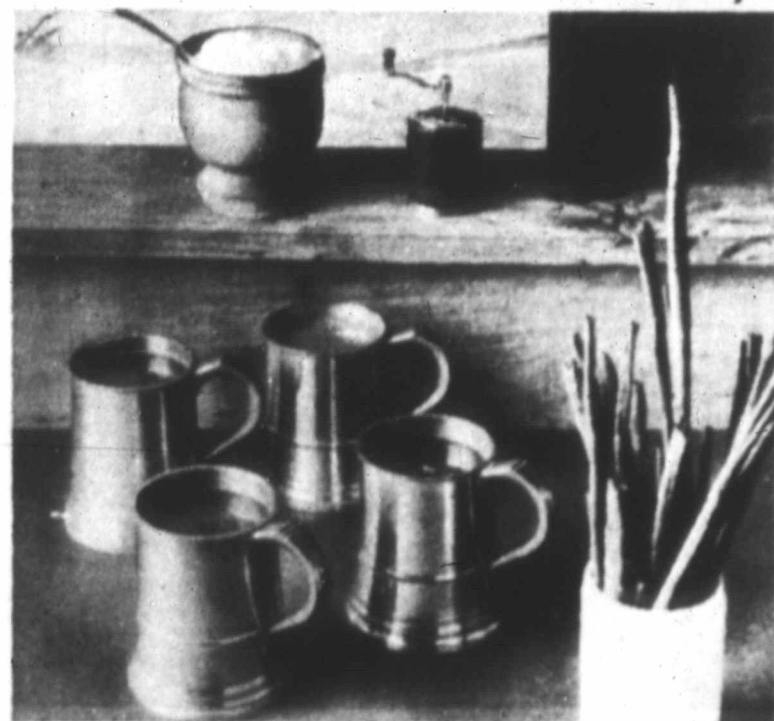

### Coffee's Natural Partner—Chicory

The history of chicory, which has been coffee's natural partner for centuries, goes back into ancient history. It was mentioned four thousand years before Christ in Eber's Egyptian papyrus, and ancient and modern medical men have proclaimed its healthful virtues.

If your friends are coffee lovers, surprise them some evening with "Spicy Whipped Topping Coffee." They'll love its strong, yet delicate flavor and praise your coffee-making virtues. First, prepare a fairly strong coffee with chicory, either drip or percolated. Prepare the whipped topping by mixing 1/2 cup instant nonfat dry milk crystals with 1/2 cup ice water in bowl. Whip 3 to 4 minutes, until soft peaks form, then add 2 tablespoons lemon juice. Continue whipping for 3 to 4 minutes, until stiff peaks form, gradually adding 1/4 cup sugar. This makes about 2 1/2 cups topping.

Pour hot coffee into mugs, top with whipped topping and serve with cinnamon sticks.

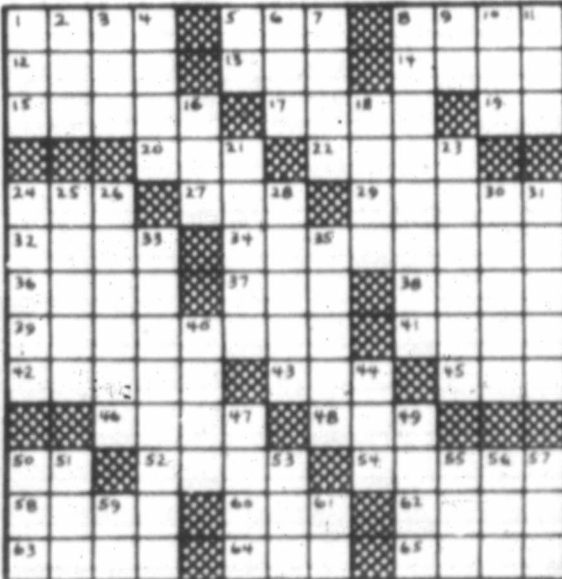
