GRUVER BEATS HORNETTES

It's fun to play, but tough to lose.

This no doubt was the feeling of most Sudan Hornette fans and players as the girls lost a real cliff-hanger in the first round of the regional tournament, 42-40 to Gruver in an overtime.

A last-second shot at the end of regulation play could have extended the basketball season at least one more game for Sudan, but the ball hit the rim and when Gruver got the overtime tipoff, they definitely had the advantage.

For the most part, it was a low-scoring game between two well-matched teams. The first quarter ended up 9-9, and it was 15-15 at halftime. Gruver led 26-25 at the end of the third, and it was 38-38 at the end of the regulation game.

For Gruver, Anita States had 24 points and LaNetta Blankenship 14. For Sudan, Candace Mudgett scored 20 and Jackie Norman and Sharon Walser had 10 each.

Sudan had a dozen chances to win the game, but none of them panned out. With the score 35-34 in favor of Gruver with 3 minutes left, Sudan forwards shot six times, getting each rebound, and failed to score.

It appeared that the Hornettes might have it won when, with less than a minute left, Sudan had a 38-35 lead. But Miss States hit a field goal and was fouled, getting the additional point to tie it up with 35 seconds left. Then Miss Mudgett worked the ball around, holding it so she could get the final shot and Gruver would have no chance to retaliate. But her shot from 10 feet out hit the rim as regulation play ended. Had it gone in, the Hornettes would have won the game right there.

In the overtime, Gruver got the tipoff and States hit a goal. Miss Norman missed a free throw and then Gruver scored two free throws for a 4-point lead with only 15 seconds left. Miss Walser hit a field goal for Sudan,

Gruver lost to Wylie 40-33 in the finals of the tournament at Lubbock Friday. Sudan closed out the season with a record of 27 wins and five defeats.

Brown, Watkins Get New Jobs On Faculty

Sudan school this week was in the market for a new head football coach and head basketball coach after the present holders of those positions were reassigned to newly created posts in the school system.

Coach R. L. (Hank) Brown, head football coach for the last five years, Monday night was assigned to fulltime duty as head coach of the girls' basketball team and in charge of all girls' physical education classes. His duties will include coaching junior high girls, the board said.

In making the move, the board noted that the success of girls' basketball in Sudan has "put the town and school on the map" and members said they feel putting Brown in charge of the entire girls' program at all levels will improve on the system.

Head Basketball Coach Dempsey Watkins has been assigned as head of the mathematics department of the school, with instruction to coordinate the entire math program as well as to teach more math classes himself. This action was taken by the school board Monday at Watkins' own request, made several weeks ago.

Watkins' cagers won district and went to the regional finals at Lubbock in 1960. Brown's football teams twice tied for the district title, and no Sudan football team in history ever has won district outright.

The board previously had extended the contracts of principals Ralph Stewart and Bernard Wilson and Supt. W. E. Hancock, Counselor Thurman D. Knoll is hired by the state, and other administrative help rehired for the next year include Mrs. Lucy Kent, secretary; Winona Dudgeon, school nurse; and Don Dykes, tax assessor-collector.

On Monday night, the board approved contracts for next year for all teachers in the high school and elementary school except four, one of whom cannot meet state qualifications to teach next year, according to Supt. Hancock, and who has already indicated she will not teach next year. Action on the other three was deferred until a later date.

Rehired for next year were Jimmy Akup, R. L. Brown, Don R. Ham, Joann Henry, Calton E. Moore, Delores Moore, Arthur N. Nelson, Richard W. Potter, Kermit L. The board set March 27 through March 30 as Easter Holidays for the school, and agreed on May 24 for high school baccalaureate, May 26 for high school commencement, and May 28 for eighth grade graduation.

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Light, flaky pie crust can be made easily and quickly by this water-whipped method. Just combine oil and ice water, add to flour, stir, and your pastry is ready to roll out.

Safflower oil is used because its natural lightness adds lightness to the pastry. Also, because it is the most highly polyunsaturated vegetable oil available, it adds more of that important quality.

The fresh fruit filling can be replaced, when fresh fruits aren't in season, with whatever your favorite pie filling may be.

CALIFORNIA FRUIT PIE
(Makes 1 9-inch pie)

1/2 cup sugar	1/2 cup quick-cooking tapioca
1/2 cup orange sections	2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 cup fresh strawberries	1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup sliced, pared, fresh peaches	1 cup ice water
2 tablespoons lemon juice	1 cup Safflower oil
1/2 teaspoon salt	1 teaspoon sugar

Combine 1/2 cup sugar, orange sections, strawberries, peaches, lemon juice, 1/2 teaspoon salt and tapioca; mix well. Let stand 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, mix flour and 1/2 teaspoon salt together. Combine ice water and oil (do not stir). Add oil mixture to flour mixture and stir lightly until well mixed. Press into 2 balls. Roll out between sheets of waxed paper to two 11-inch circles. Arrange one circle of pastry in 9-inch pie plate. Fill with strawberry mixture. Arrange remaining pastry circle over strawberry mixture. Trim, seal and flute edge. Cut 5 slits in top of pie. Bake in hot oven (425°) 30 minutes. Sprinkle with 1 teaspoon sugar and bake 5 minutes, or until lightly browned.

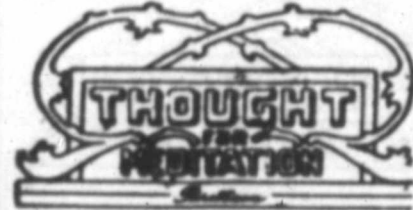
