The Sudan Cardinals lost their third game of the season this week, but won two more to stay in first place ahead of the Sudan Angels.

The Cards edged the Amherst Braves 5-3 in a makeup game Sunday with Bobby Drake going the distance for the winners. Ricky Miller was the losing pitcher. At one point Card Catcher Steve Edwards made two successive put-outs at home plate, which could have affected the score considerably. For

the Braves, first baseman Bub Clayton pulled off a difficult double play unassisted.

Amherst Cubs split games with the Cards this week. In the first game, Brent Whiteaker was the winner for the Cardinals, who triumphed 16-9 after falling behind 9-6 at one point. Eddie Moates was the losing pitcher, and Gary Robinson hit a two-run homer for the losers.

The Cubs took a 4-1 lead in the first inning of the second game and went on to win 10-5 behind the fine pitching of Robinson. Terry Wood was the Cards' losing pitcher, and was relieved in the last inning by Richard Tamplin.

The Cubs beat the Braves 14-0 the previous week in a game which had not been reported, with Robinson again the winning hurler.

A grand slam home run by Johnny Lopez and a 3-run homer by Rocky Sharp aided the Angels in a 14-3 triumph over the Dodgers Monday, as Allen Black was the winning pitcher, while Steve Smith and Shawn Potter tossed for the losers.

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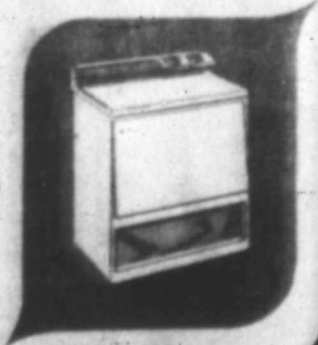

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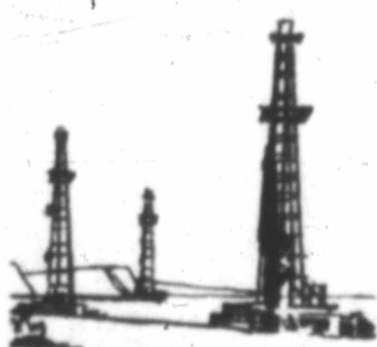

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**Nancy Williams Near Top In Essay Contest**

Nancy Williams of Sudan was named runnerup for the \$400 scholarship offered in the Historical Essay Contest by the Bailey County Electric Cooperative Assn.

The 1964 graduates from seven area schools were invited to enter. Nancy was the only entry from the Sudan school.

The text was to be a minimum of 1000 words, in narrative style and historically accurate.

The subject Nancy chose was, "What Rural Electrification Has Done For My Community."

Her essay began with the Plains pioneers and their gift of, "A Garden Spot of the World," to leave to their descendants. The desperate need at that historical

time was POWER, a problem solved by the aid of electricity made possible by Electric Cooperative Associations.

Seventy-five points were given on the essay for construction, grammar, clarity and human interest. The remaining twenty-

five points were on personal interviews, on which Nancy ranked highest.

Miss Williams was defeated by a small margin by Kathy Moore of Muleshoe.

Miss Moore's essay will compete for the \$500 scholarship given in statewide competition.
