The only problem I can see there is that in a battle where both armies had this gimmick, you could hardly tell hue is hue.


WHEN a bunch of boys in New York recently announced plans to shoot a mouse-carrying rocket into space, they touched off quite a controversy.


First the Federal Aviation Agency said the rocket might endanger passing aircraft, and this








LOADING — Missile canister is lowered into place over the hull of the USS GEORGE WASHINGTON, at a Navy pier in Charleston, S. C.

Scripture: St. Luke 12: 4-9; Acts 2:37-39; 5: 32; 10: 34-35. Power — "Power never made a man good (or great) but in accepting the responsibility of using the power, his goodness was developed and revealed—or useing the power his evil was revealed."
