The only problem I can see there is that in a battle where both armies had this gimmick, you could hardly tell hue is hue.

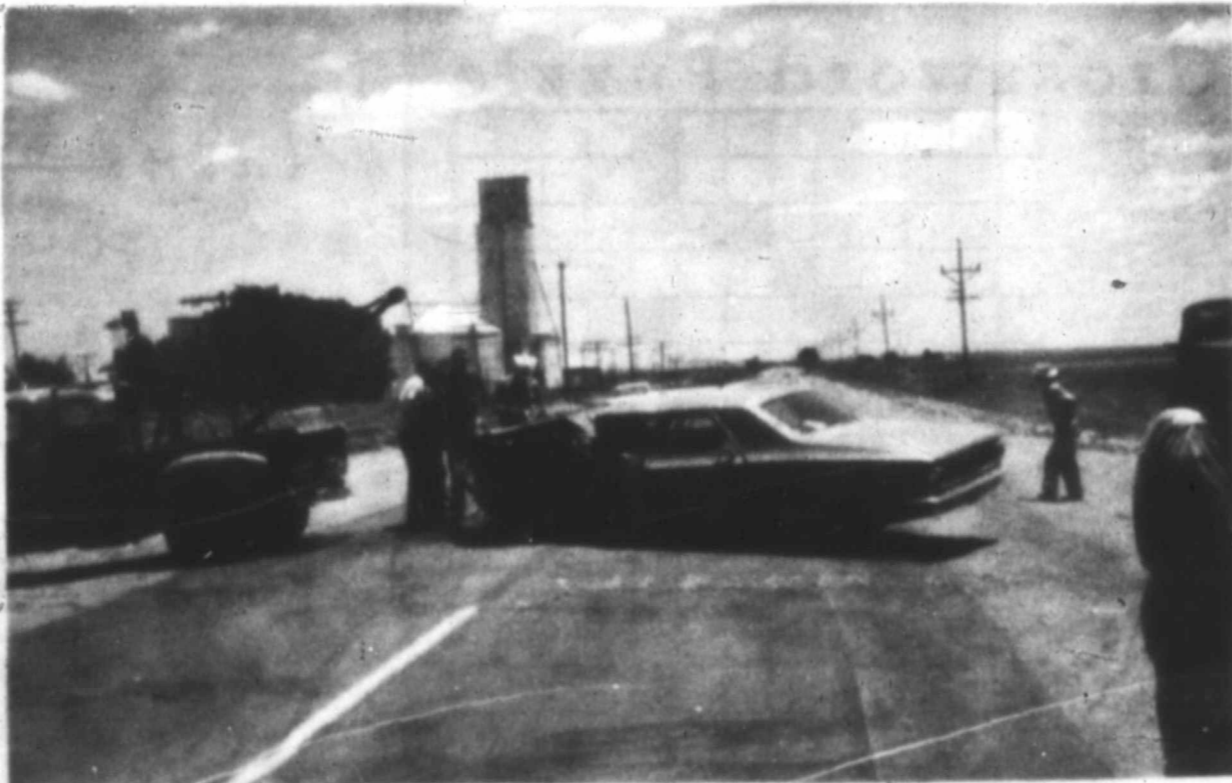
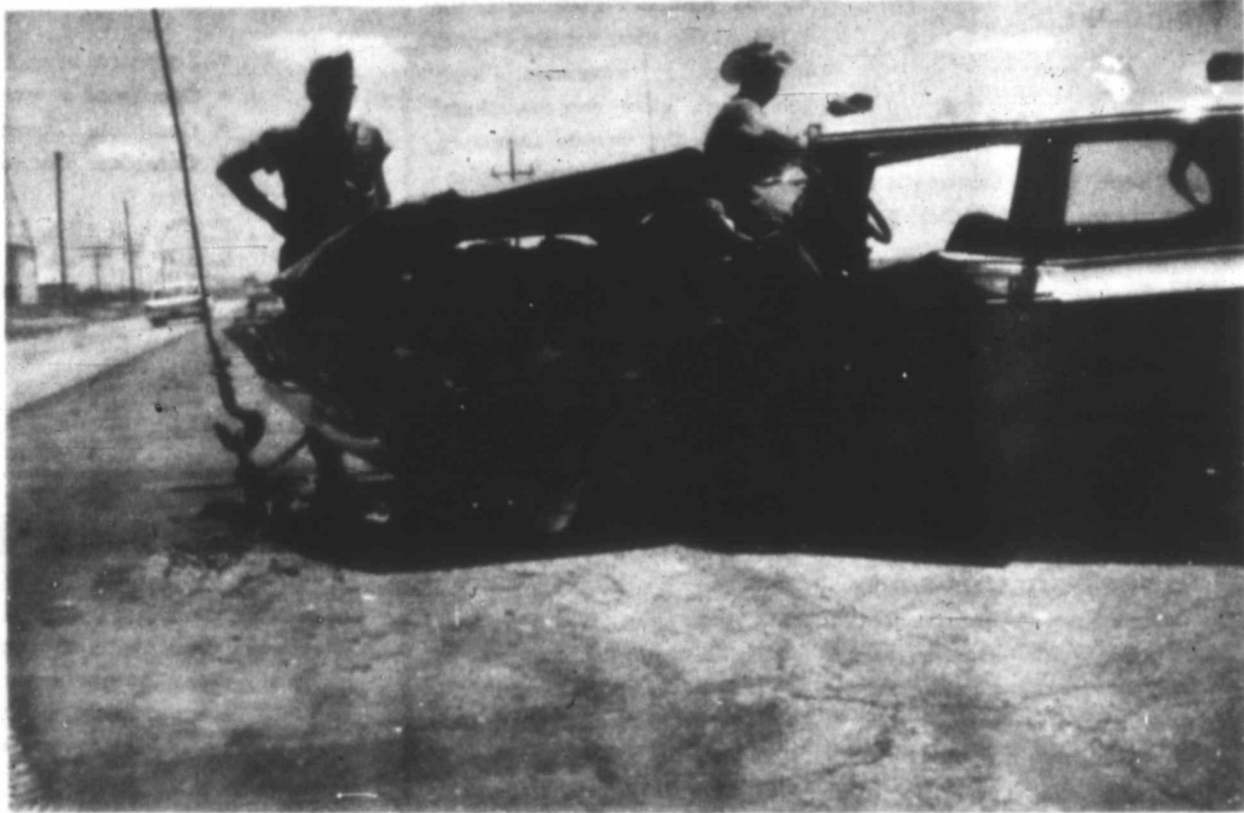
WHEN a bunch of boys in New York recently announced plans to shoot a mouse-carrying rocket into space, they touched off quite a controversy.

Lamb County Tennis Set



The third annual Lamb County Tennis Tournament will begin July 24 at Littlefield, Charles Farley, tournament director, announced this week.

The tournament is open to anyone in Lamb County or the Littlefield trade area, which also would include Anton and Whitarral. The tournament will continue for two weeks, with play to be after 6 p. m. in the evenings, to allow for more participation by working adults.

Entries must be turned in by July 20 to Farley at Littlefield or to Mr. or Mrs. Dalton Wood at Sudan. Entries will be accepted in these divisions:

Singles and doubles in men's and women's, high school boys and girls, junior high boys and girls (anyone who will be in grades 7, 8 or 9 next fall), elementary, men's veterans (35 and over), men's novice and women's novice. There also will be mixed doubles.

Farley said it would be up to his committee to decide who is eligible for the novice divisions; however, any beginning players, or players who have not previously competed in the county tournament are invited to enter. Also, he said that in order to induce more youngsters in grades 6 and under to enter, some kind of prize will be given to each entry in the grade school boys and girls divisions.

No player will be allowed to

play a match until the entry fee is paid. All singles entries are \$1.50, and doubles teams must pay \$1 per player (\$2 per team). Play will be at the Crescent Park courts, Farley said.

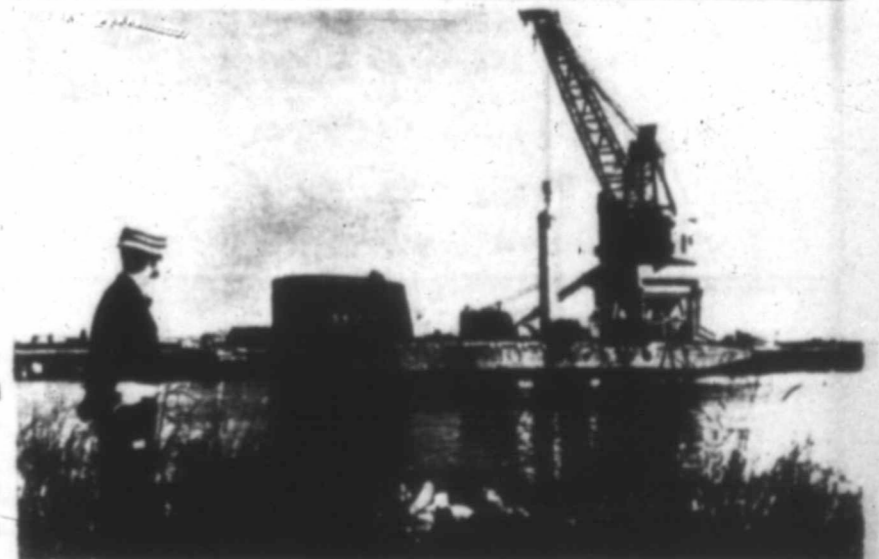

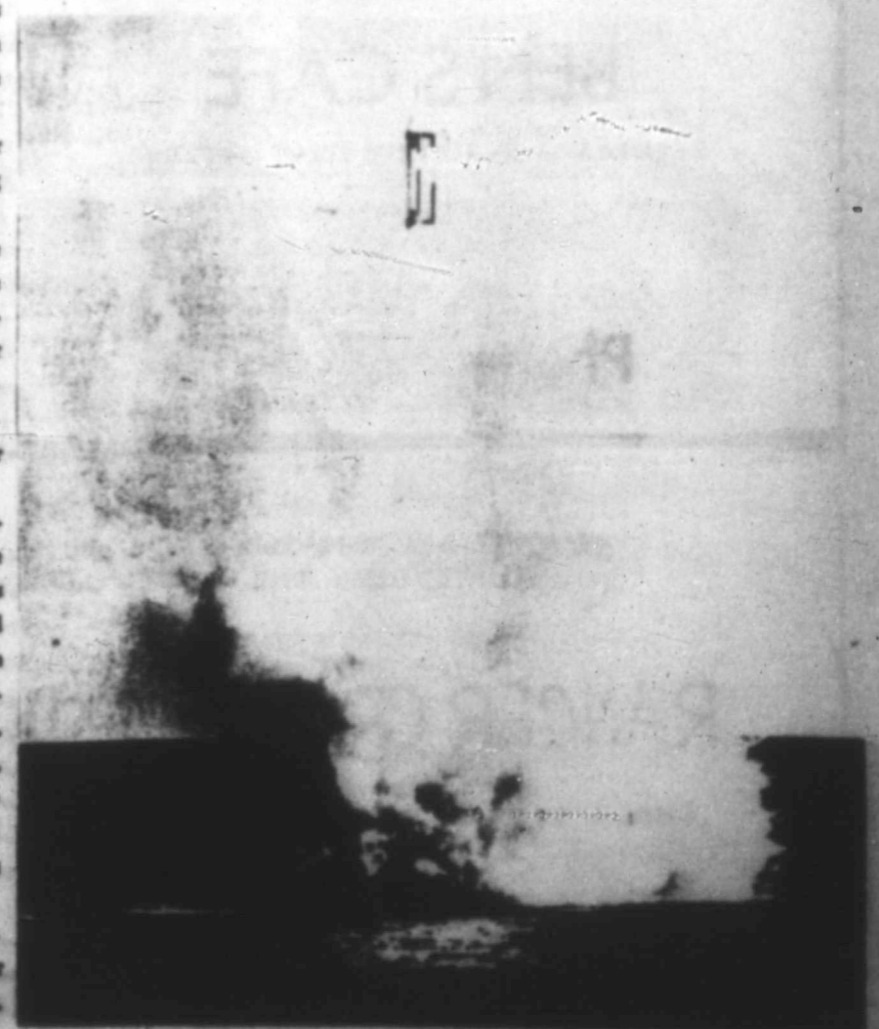
