The legislators and the federal congressmen, in their zeal to give away all the money they can, to boost every conceivable aid program, are pretty free with our money. Here are a couple of developments during the last week alone:

Smith said he favored making the 2 per cent tax a blanket tax on everything sold. Other lawmakers are in favor of making the (Ha-ha) "temporary" state sales tax 3 per cent now, but some favor waiting a year or two. Probably the legislature will railroad through a state income tax on top of the other in the next session or the one following.

On the national level, the House, with little opposition, voted to raise old age pension benefits by \$6 or so a month, and to increase the accused social security to 10 percent! Right now it is 7.25 per cent, already at such a level that it tends to make the small businessman reluctant to hire help if there is anyway at all he can get around it.

Several other Sudan players are playing in consolation brackets.

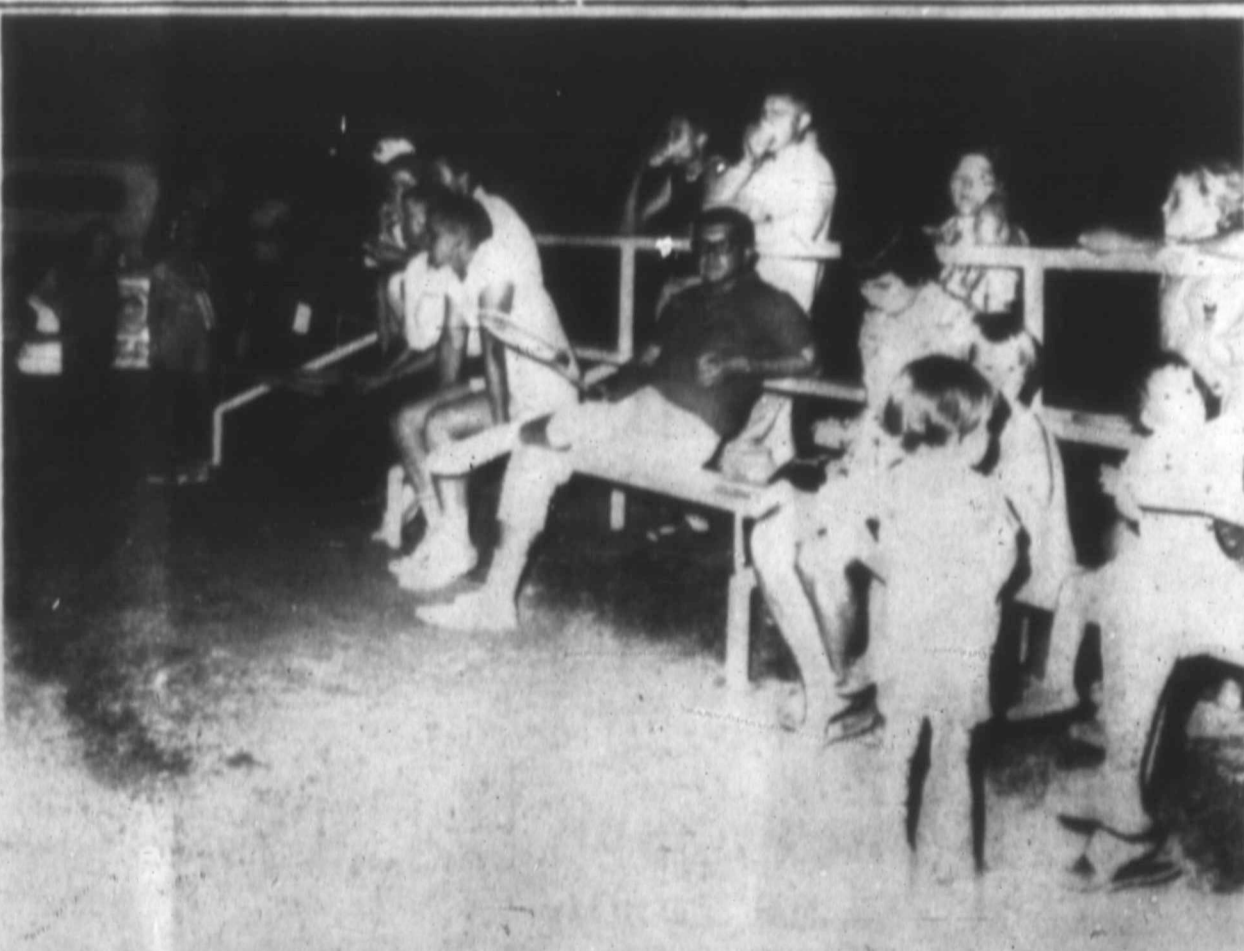

Scripture: Joel.

Have you read the book of Joel? When I began to read God's Word today, I did not know I would use for our scripture basis this book of Joel, but when I read "Tell ye your children of it, and let your children tell their children, and their children another generation," I saw more clearly than ever before how God is de-

pending on you and me to tell our young people and children His words of warning and prophecy, as also to tell of His love and forgiveness through our Savior, Jesus Christ.

How long has it been since you heard anybody telling about the great and terrible day of the Lord "and who can abide in it?"

But you may say, "people do not want to think about anything so fantastic and so terrible. Besides, it might cause a feeling of fear." That may be, but God said tell it—to whom do you listen? But, God did not say just to tell them about the terrible day, when the sun shall be darkened and the moon turned into blood, but also tell this:

Turn unto the Lord your God, (right where you are and just as you are), with fasting, weeping and with mourning, for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and of great kindness.

And whosoever shall truly call upon the name of the Lord shall be delivered.

The Lord Jesus then is our only home—as we look at the prophecies that have already come to pass as God said they would and look at the prophecies for the future yet to be fulfilled. We surely can realize that man cannot save himself, but must have a super natural power, a Savior, to give us a new life of peace and joy and love, to last through all the "terrible day" and through all eternity. No one has eternal life, only eternal death, (for the day Adam and Eve sinned, mankind died spiritually and became a sinful creature, as God had told him he would) until one has said "I'll take Jesus as my Savior, my Redeemer, from sin." (As in Adam all died, even so in Jesus Christ shall all be made alive) Only in Jesus is there any life, so only Jesus can give life.

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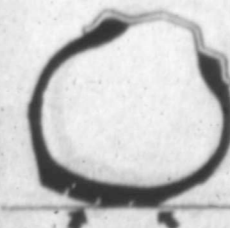
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COTTLE AND KING COUNTIES REUNION TO BE HELD SUNDAY

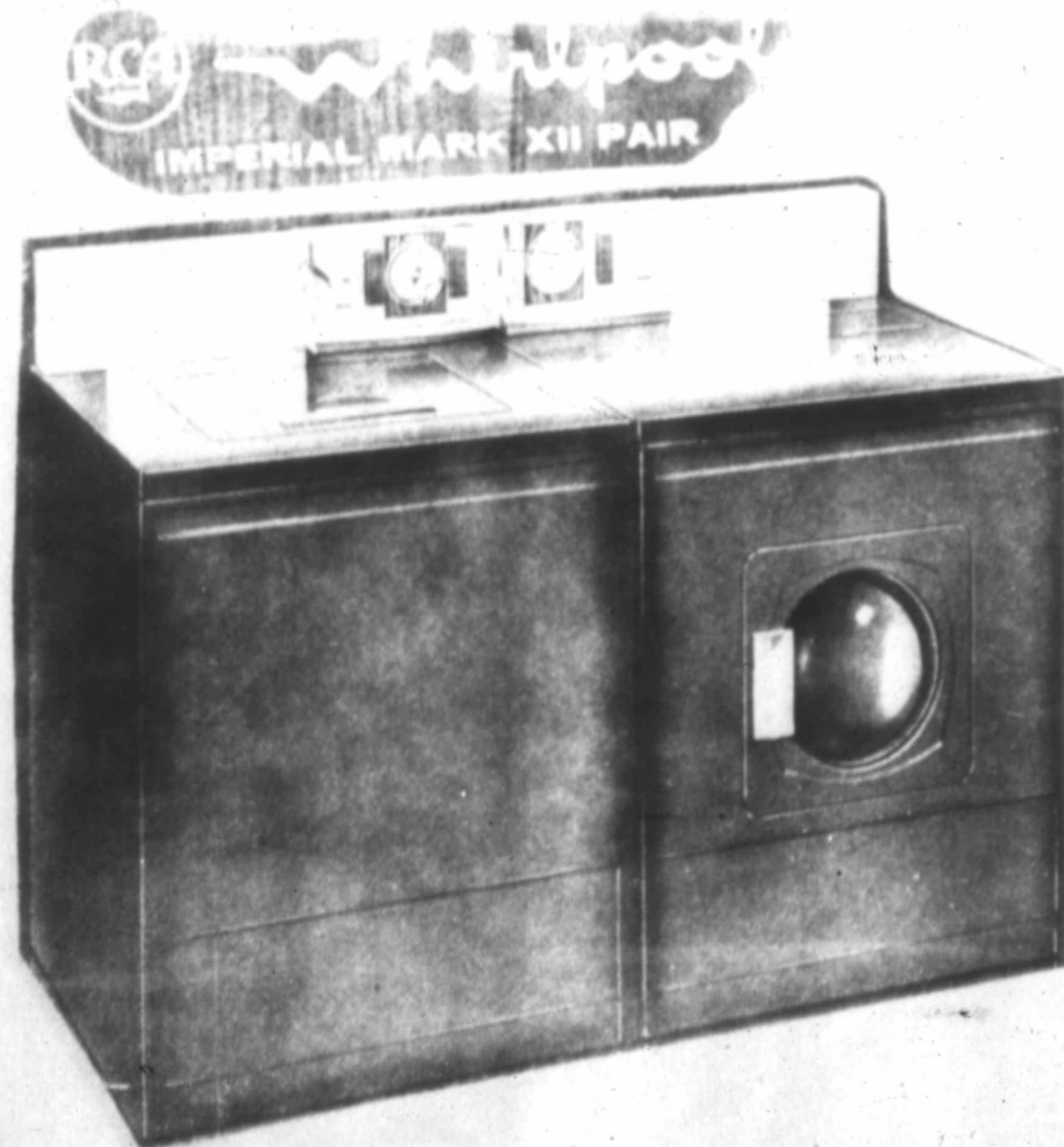
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
