IF YOU haven't done it already, you have one more week to pay your poll tax. Me too, because I haven't yet paid mine.

One of the best reasons for paying your poll tax this year is because there will be a school board election in April. A lot of folks might figure on not paying the tax this year since there won't be any big state or national elections. But actually, your vote might count more on the local level than it would on these other elections.

I totally disagree with Lamb County Tax Assessor Herbert Dum (who not only is in favor of the poll tax, but would prefer that the rate were higher) and I feel that the tax should be eliminated. Regardless of all the arguments to the contrary, there should be no price tag on the privilege of voting.

In spite of this, you'll have to pay the tax if you want to vote in any kind of election this year.

ONCE UPON A TIME, the story goes, the churches of the nation traditionally would see some of its members only at Christmas and on Easter Sunday, and a lot of jokes were made to that effect. The expectation was that churches would be filled with all the regular, faithful members on Easter Sunday, plus some visitors, plus many members on the roll who come only occasionally, if at all. However, the situation just hasn't been true for some years in these parts. In the first place, churches don't seem to attract the crowds they used to at any time of the year. The result is that many churches could save on the fuel bill on Easter Sunday by having the services in the pastor's study instead of the sanctuary. In many cases, this would be literally true, if the few regular members present weren't bolstered by some visitors from out of town.

Amherst churches last week took a unique move to keep folks at home on Easter Sunday. The preachers all got together and talked the school into not giving any Easter holidays, but delaying the holiday until just after Easter.

Sounds like a pretty good idea to us.

Sudan's boys took a first half lead on Kress Tuesday night, but the Kangaroos came back to win the contest 54-48. Sudan's girls also went down, 33-28, making it the third straight double loss for Sudan basketball teams.

Since there will be no district tournament this year, both Sudan teams have only an outside

chance of winning the title now. Larry Fields of Kress had 24 points and Mike Smith of Sudan 15 in Tuesday's game.

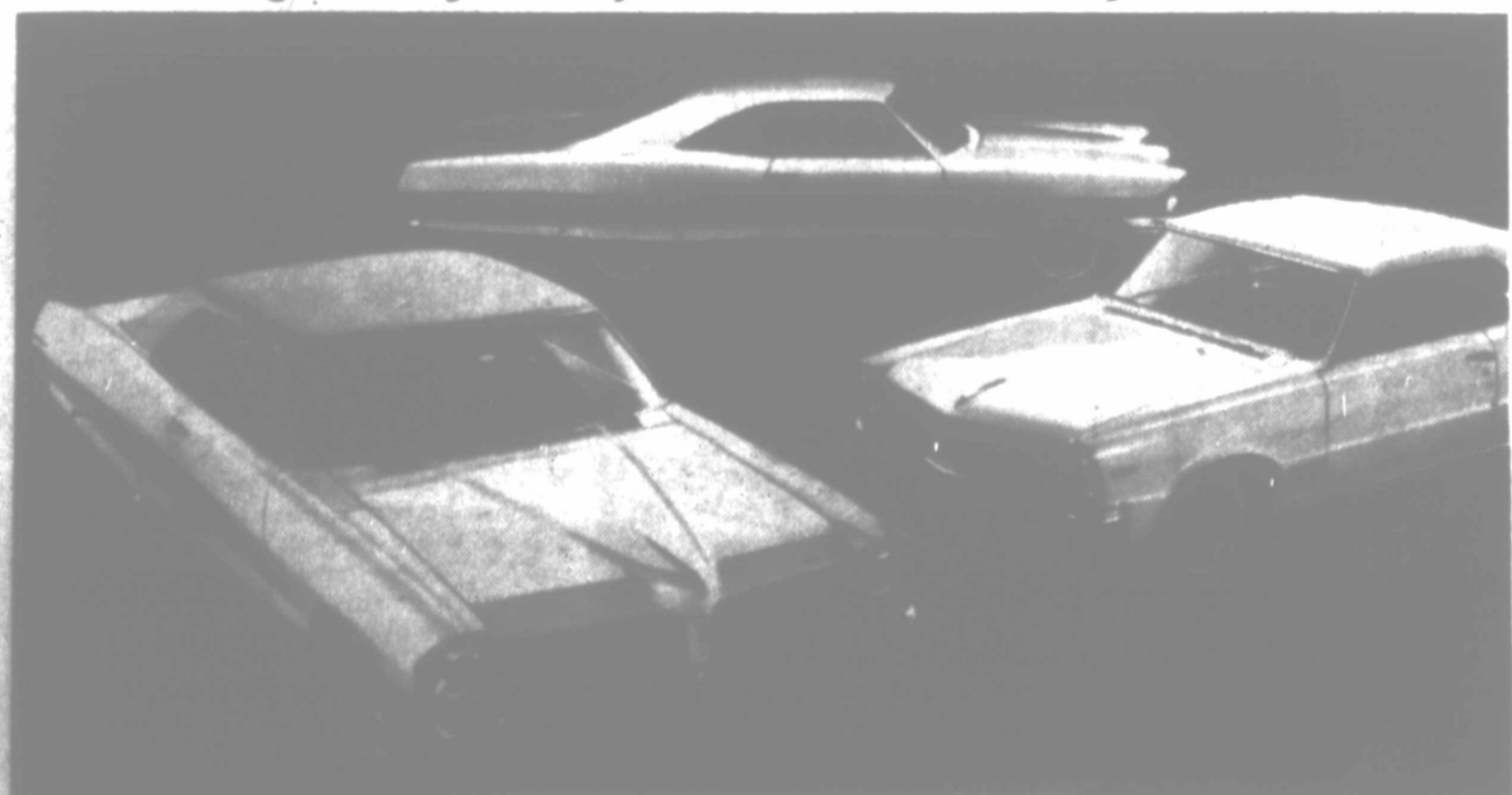
