This week we received a news release from the Census Bureau, with the notation that "This local news item was prepared by a Census Bureau electronic computer and typed at 10 lines per second, . . . "

I counted the words in some of the lines and the average line has about 14 words in it. This figures about 140 words per second, or 8,400 words per minute. That should get anybody an A in typing class.

An accompanying story explained that the Census Bureau's computers "are extrating retail trade data about each county in the United States from tabulations of the 1963 Census of Business, inserting the figures in news stories and typing out the stories at eye-blinking speed, . . . "





The survey in Louistans and Tonnesses found fewer hismating weevils, but the Carolines, Mississippi, Alabama and Texts (over the whole state) yieldtid incleases ranging up to over 850 percent. This phenomensi increase was recorded in four Control Texas counties, a jump from \$17 to 4,406 weevils

The reduction of hibernating weavils in the Plaint area just below the Caprock without doubt is the result of the dispusse control carried out last fall, and the 89.2 percent reduction is in close agreement with estimates made by entomologists evaluating the percentage of kill during
