AT N F I -- What Is It?

You almost always get the better and better day with the...

and yet this is still a very mixed-up and unconfused word: Faith -- what is it?

If you stopped reading here, you probably said, "Well, I certainly know that faith means to believe something."

Saving faith is faith to believe in Christ, but not just with your mind (as one might turn on a light switch in faith, that the...

light would come on. This kind of faith is perhaps best said as trust, deep trust in a person to...

Saving faith, then, involves at least two things from man, as evidence that he has it, which are repentance and commitment. You might say here that "he hasn't said anything new about faith". True, but as we look at the meaning of repentance and commitment I hope it will give us a basis for considering and estimating our own personal faith.

These always "comes a time when we become more aware of our need to have faith, the faith we thought we had until the "testing" came. Remember, too, that testing (both by study of God's Word and by trials) only proves the truth (the evidence) of faith. Yet, it is not the darkness or light that proves faith, it is how you react to either of these.

So, what is repentance and action in commitment? Briefly, repentance is being sorry for your sins and determining to turn from them to Jesus Christ. Now, being "sorry" is an emotion -- as love and joy are emotion -- but fact and reason come in when we look at God's word for why we should be sorry for sin, and why we could trust in Jesus to save us from sin and death. So, faith is not just blind acceptance of all things, it is based on the truth, on Christ, who said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life." Commitment is turning from self to give that self into the keeping of Christ, believing in what He is and what He is saying; giving yourself to Him to do as He wills to do in you and with you.

The story of the prodigal son (Luke 15:11-32) is a good example of this, repentance and commitment, and the saving nature of this testing is based on the story. When you really started saving something that, and living with your father in the daily cleaning of his word and His presence, and at His loving direction? Then you have begun to prove the commitment and truth of your faith.

So, what is faith? Faith is part emotion, but is based on Christ Jesus, who is the author of it, and also the Father of it. (He made, made, shapes, and sustains as we live by Him, and He keeps us eternally!)

"How faith is the substance (made of) of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen."

How can you get faith? If you want truth, if you search for it you must do it by faith. But saving faith in God is more than intellect (although reason and faith should go hand-in-hand), more than knowledge, more than evidence that God exists; saving faith finally is giving one's spirit into God's Spirit in perfect love, trust and conviction that He is willing and able to keep what one has committed unto Him. "Faith, hope, love" -- but to have hope and love, you must also have faith. Saving faith is a daily saving help.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ? For by God's "grace are ye saved, through faith".



Turn to God in prayer for the fulfillment of your needs and prosperity will come to you in the form of rich, productive usable ideas. God will show you how to use your ideas to bring abundance into your life, for ideas are blessings from God.

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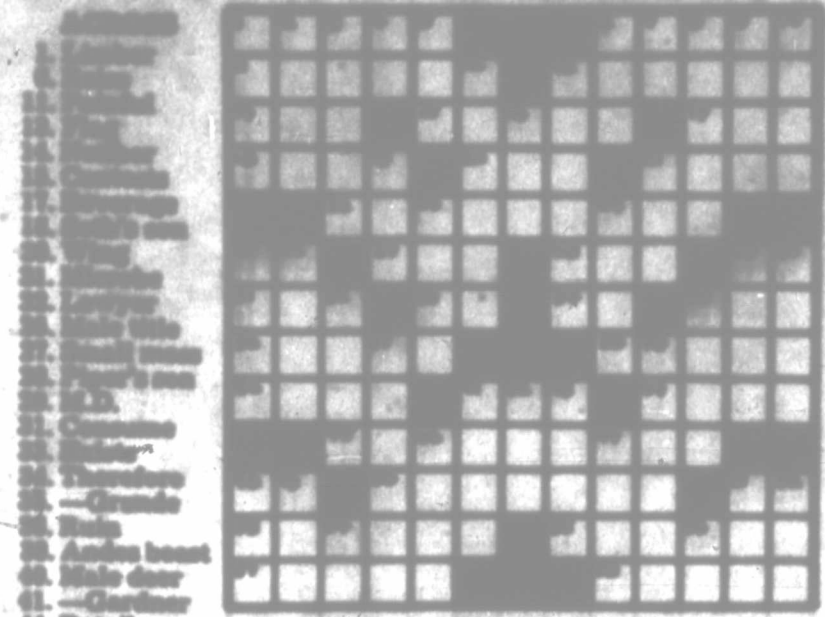

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**CHICKEN LIVERS WITH HOLLANDAISE SAUCE** (Serves 6 servings)

4 tablespoons butter	2 tablespoons lemon juice
2 tablespoons flour	1 tablespoon chopped parsley
1/2 teaspoon salt	6 English muffins, split and toasted
1 cup evaporated milk	12 cooked chicken livers
2 egg yolks	1/2 cup evaporated milk
1/4 teaspoon paprika	1/2 cup butter

Heat 1/2 cup of the butter in a saucepan over medium heat. Add flour, salt and pepper. Stir until smooth. Slowly add evaporated milk, stirring constantly until thickened. Remove from heat. Stir in egg yolks. Stir in remaining butter. Add remaining evaporated milk and lemon juice. Cook over medium heat until thickened. Top with the remaining butter and parsley. Garnish with lemon wedges.

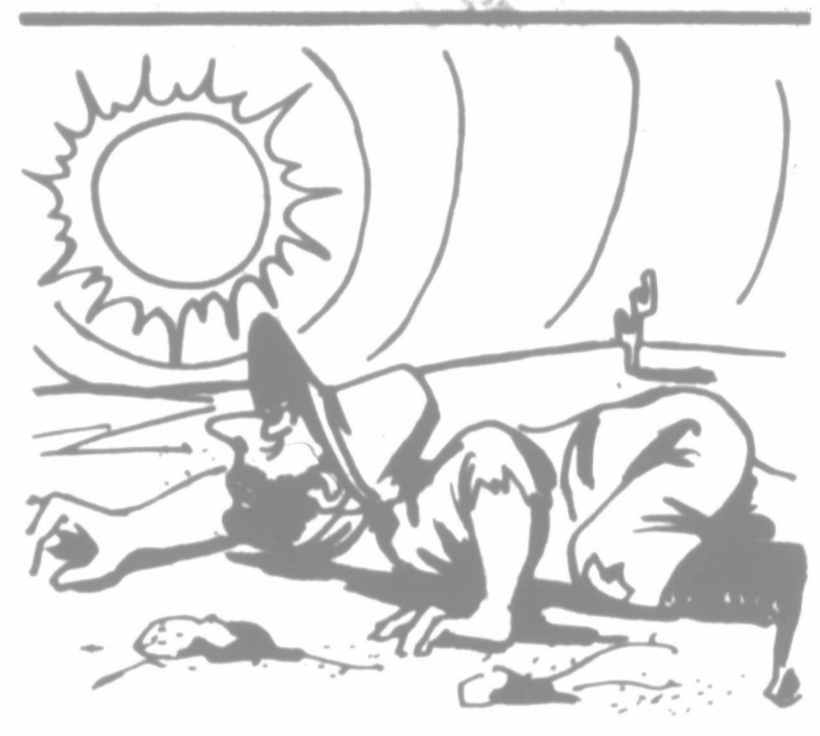
The society will begin the study of the Book of Genesis on Monday, April 5.

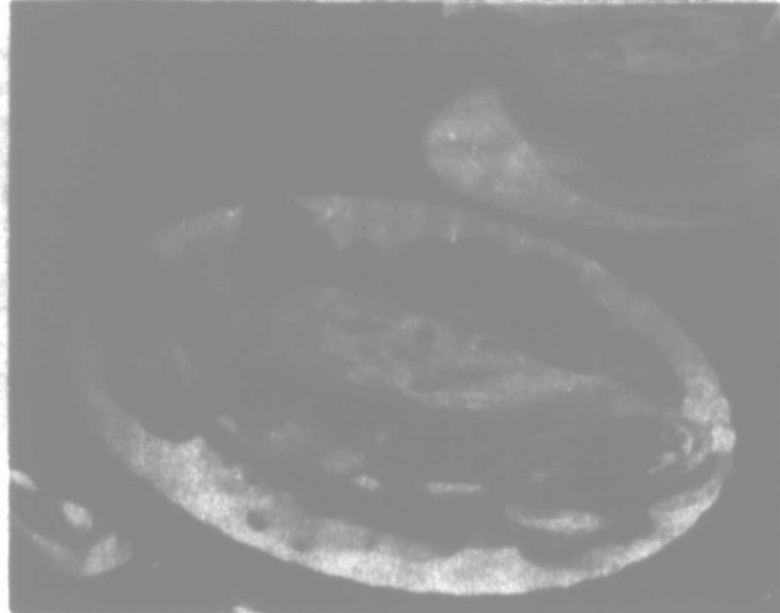

### GLAMOUR IN AN OMELET



Frozen artichoke hearts lend elegance and fine flavor to a puffy omelet - an excellent choice for a meatless meal that is easy to prepare and satisfying.

#### Puffy Omelet with Artichoke Hearts

1 package (9 oz.) frozen artichoke hearts  
1½ tablespoons lemon juice  
½ to 1 teaspoon garlic salt  
2 tablespoons butter, melted

4-egg puffy omelet

Creamy Sauce

Cook artichokes as directed on package, adding lemon juice and substituting garlic salt for salt before simmering. Drain. Coarsely chop about ½ of the artichokes; reserve remaining artichokes for garnish. Add 2 tablespoons butter to chopped artichokes; stir until melted. Keep all artichokes warm.

Prepare omelet as directed in your favorite recipe. When omelet is well puffed and delicately browned on the bottom, place pan in a 375° oven for about 4 minutes, or until top of omelet is firm.

Spoon chopped artichokes over half of omelet. Fold omelet in half and slice onto warmed serving platter. Garnish with reserved artichokes. Serve with Creamy Mushroom Sauce.

**Creamy Sauce:** Dilute 1 can (10½ oz.) condensed cream of mushroom or cream of chicken soup with about ½ cup milk. Heat and serve over omelet.

# WOTTON TALKS

High praise for existing results was the order of the day March 17 and 18 to Lubbock when officials of the High Plains Boll Weevil Control Program met to review the 1964 spray program and lay plans for spraying in 1965. Both field evaluation during the program and winter trash surveys in January of this year revealed a reduction in the over-

wintering weevil population of about 50 percent, a record set by Dr. Fred L. Adkins of the Texas A & M Department of Entomology to be "almost unbelievable."  
D. H. Wotton, Lubbock Supervisor of the USDA's Plant Pest Control Division described the results as "phenomenal," especially considering that no program of this scope and nature had ever been attempted before and that sprayings were hampered from the start with adverse weather.  
Field evaluation was made during the actual spraying by comparing weevil counts in untreated fields, and winter trash examination was compared with a similar study made at the same time of year in 1963.

Reporting on the physical activities of the program, Wotton said that about 200,000 acres of cotton belonging to 2,000 farmers across 9 counties was sprayed from four to six times for an aggregate total of 1,121,654 acres, 125,025 gallons of insecticide in untreated form (a new material used extensively for boll weevil control for the first time in the High Plains program) was applied, 20 spray aircraft and five observation aircraft operating from 21 airports were used, and over 200 men were employed full time during the mid-September to mid-November spray period. Preliminary accounting figures set out of 1964 sprayings at \$1,163,778.28.  
Dr. J. C. Gaines, head of Texas A & M's Entomology Department, told the group that weevil research efforts will continue through the spring, summer and fall, and should furnish answers to some of the questions about the High Plains weevil's biological processes. These answers, he said, could prove highly beneficial to the High Plains control program.  
Ed Deen of Plains Cotton Growers, gave the program financial report and stated that over 97 percent of the 50 cents per bale collections were retained, with less than 3 percent of producers requesting refunds. He said: "This shows beyond all doubt that the High Plains farmer is solidly behind the program and is willing to do his part to make it a success."  
Total effective cotton allotment for the 23 High plains counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. has been increased by 119,619.6 acres received through the Release and Reapportionment program, according to figures released to POC by the State ASCS Committee.  
The additional acres come to the High Plains as a result of the

1960 law which permits unwanted acres to be reallocated within a state, and brings the area's total effective allotment to 2,255,243 acres, slightly below the 2,272,649 acres available for planting in 1964. Base allotment for 1963 was 3,125 acres more than the base allotment for 1964, but in 1964 the area got 140,150 acres from reapportionment — 21,531 more than were received for this year.  
The ASCS Committee first used released acres to fill requests for additional acres within the county and some where they were released and the excess acreage is then available for filling applications for increased acreage in other parts of the state.  
No county or individual farm could be given reapportioned acreage that would bring total acres in cotton to more than 50 percent of the total land in cultivation, nor could a county's base allotment be increased by more than 50 percent.  
In Lamb County, the 1965 base allotment was 186,102 acres, the 1965 reapportioned acres received were 9,123.6 acres; total 1965 acreage 195,225.6, and total 1964 acreage was 195,707.


