Sudan Rally Falls Short; Lose 8-6

Sudan fans that journeyed to Wolfarth Friday night cheered the Hornets on as the Friendly Tigers gained a narrow two-point victory over the Hornets in the second game of the season.

The Friendly Tigers were disappointed of themselves following the first two quarters of play

after having gained an eight point lead over Sudan. This feeling of expectancy, however changed in the second half of the game when the Sudan Hornets came back to outplay the Tigers.

Harriet H. Corley Baker received the kick-off from the Tigers to open the game in the Friendly stadium. In the first three downs of the game the Hornets gained only four yards and had to punt on the fourth down.

When the Friendly Tigers got the ball for the first time, their offensive team started out like a house on fire and marched from their own 45 yard line to the Sudan 21, then lost the ball in a fumble. Sudan recovered the fumble, but could move the ball only 2 1/2 yards. The Tigers held possession of the ball during the remainder of the first quarter, but could not manage to score, although they did manage to penetrate into the Sudan 20 yard line during latter part of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Friendly was able to score the first six points of the game when QB Brent O'Donnell completed a 10-yard pass to Norman Shirley who stepped across the goal line for a Tiger TD. Dale Cook then ran across the goal line for two extra points making the score 8-0 with Friendly leading.

In the second quarter, the Ti-

gers came again focused on the door of the goal line following a long 40 yard run by Joe Linn. The Tigers control the ball with one foot of the goal, but the Hornets in a fine defensive effort were able to hold back the Tigers for three tries to gain a foot.

The second quarter was again credited to the Hornets defense when Frank Coats intercepted a Tiger pass with only 28 yards left in the first half. QB Harold Hill of the Hornets tried his passing arm to complete two passes to Baker for a gain of 45 yards before the clock ran out ending the first half.

During the second half the Sudan fans saw the Hornets fighting spirit as they gained a total of 166 yards to 42 yards for Friendly.

The Sudan Hornets opened the second half of the game by kicking off, but quickly gained possession of the ball on their own 30 yard line and marched down to the 8-yard line. Here they were held back by the Tigers who prevented them from making a touchdown. During the match, Hill completed a 7-yard pass to Hector Salas and Larry Morgan made a spectacular 25-yard run before being pulled down by a Friendly Tiger.

The remainder of the third quarter was a battle between the Hornets and the Tigers with neither team able to score a touchdown.

The fourth quarter was a spectacular for the Sudan fans as the Hornets had possession of the ball during the majority of the quarter and were able to score one touchdown.

The fourth quarter was credited largely to the fine passing arm of QB Hill who completed 6 out of 8 passes and gained 92 yards. The most spectacular play of the game occurred in the fourth quarter when Hill threw a pass for 20 yards and left the final score of the game standing at Friendly 8 - Sudan 6.

Corley Baker in one attempt dashed across the goal line for the first Hornet touchdown of the season. The try for the extra points was stopped short of the goal and left the final score of the game standing at Friendly 8 - Sudan 6.

Statistics for the game were: Sudan Rushing, 110 yards; Friendly rushing, 157 yards. Sudan passing, 144 yards to Friendly passing 10 yards. Sudan gained 10 first downs to Friendly's 5. Both teams penetrated inside the 20-yard line twice during the game.

Sudan meets Amherst here tomorrow night in a revenge contest. Sudan defeated Amherst last season by a score of 14-12 in a hard fought game. The Bulldogs are expected to have a strong team with seven regular returning this year. They defeated New Braunfels last week for a season opener. The Sudan-Amherst dual will begin at 8:00 p. m. tomorrow night in the Morris Stadium. All local students are urged to be out and support the Hornets.

Mrs. J. M. Farmer, member of the state council, was guest speaker and discussed the subject, "Integrating the Dynamic Role of PTA".

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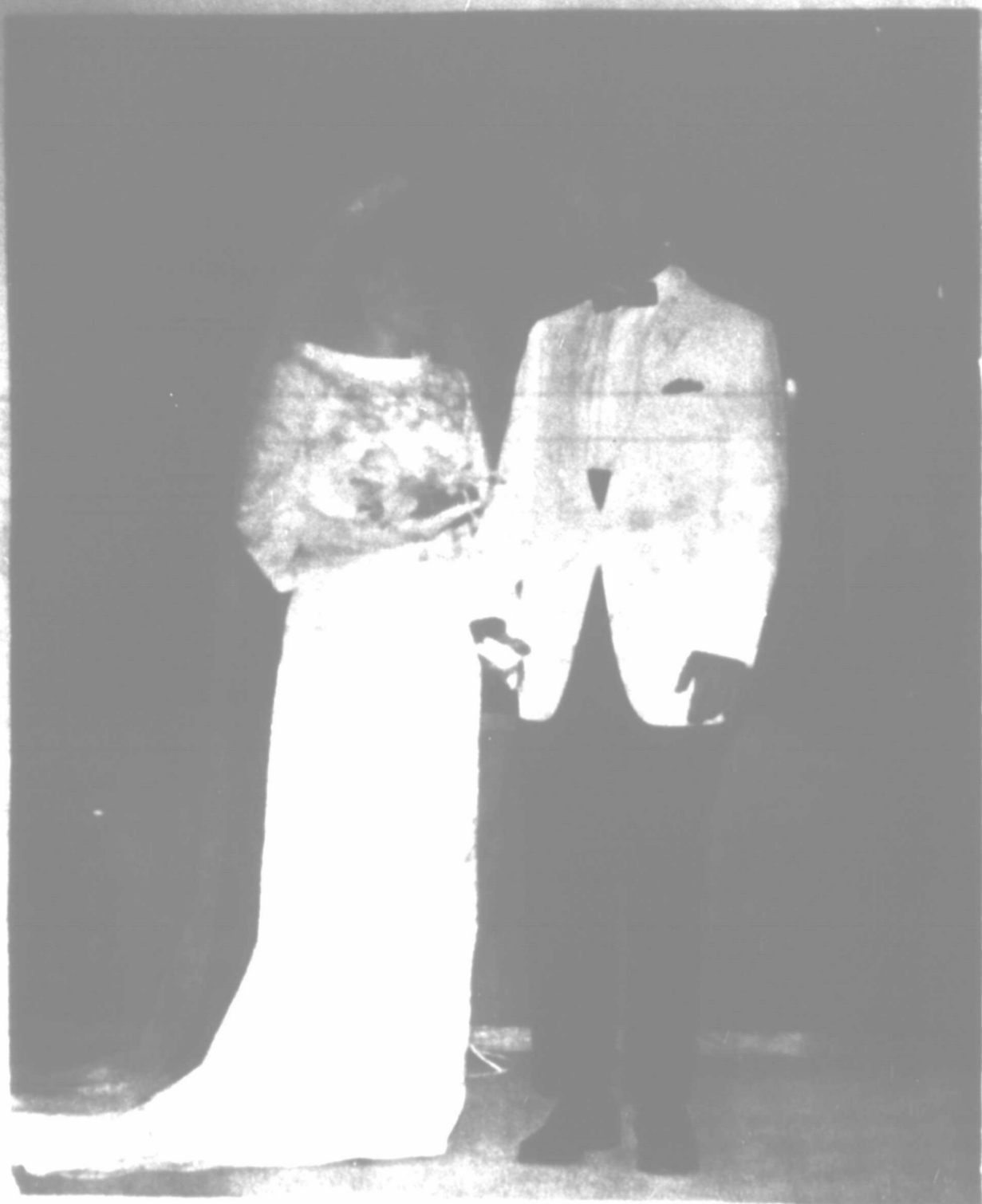

From Stone to Stainless Steel



The ancient Romans used public fountains for their wash and stones for their scrubbing boards. The wooden tub and the corrugated iron washboard served our more immediate ancestors. The rotary washer, however, was known before this century.
