
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

11/2 cup sifted all purpose flour

1 % tsp. belving powder

1/2 tsp. self.

1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg

1/2 cup sugar

1/2 cup shortening 1 egg, beeten

1/4 cup milk


1 cup grated raw

apple 1/2 cup melted butter or

margarine

1/2 cup sugar 1 tsp. cirinamon Sift together flour, beking powder, salt, nutmeg and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar. Cut in shortening until mixture is fine. Mix together egg, milk and apple; add all at once to dry ingredients and mix quickly but thoroughly. Fill greesed 21/2 x 11/4 inch muffin tins 1/4 full. Belse in 350 degree moderate oven 20 or 30 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pens; immediately roll donuts in melted butter and then in cinnamon and sugar that have been mixed together. Serve warm.





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

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Better Storm Doors At Reduced Costs

The stainless steel storm door market swings wider with new fabricating methods and design techniques to bring good news to home owners wanting a better door at over-the-counter prices. A growing market of 75,000 tons of metal today stands ajar for stainless steel. This totals five million storm doors sold annually. Producers of the shiny metal can't get all of this, of course, but they can get more than the small percentage of the market they have now. Stainless steel for storm doors

started shortly after World War 11, but was on a limited scale and commanded premium prices. New approaches in making doors has now reduced the basic cost. To tap this big market, producers and fabricators approached the problem two ways.

First, they used stainless steel as a cover over existing alumimun doors. This applique or veneer gave a new dress to existing metal doors and a new look for their sales and marketing approach. Several fabricators have been selling these stainless-aluminum doors for the last five years.

The veneer door has a number of advantages but the marketing people at the fabricating firms felt the American buying public was ready for an all stainless steel door if they could get the price of it down. The public. their investigation shows, is more quality conscious now.

Second, Allied National Products, Inc. of Chicago, a storm door fabricator, and Allegheny Ludling Street Corporation, a lending hasie statulées producer. came up with the idea of fabricating all sections of the storm doors by roll-forming the stainless steel on a continuous linele.
