COUNCIL MEETING

Annual City Budget Is Given Approval

The Friona City Council approved an annual budget for 1966-67 amounting to \$220,205 at its regular monthly meeting Monday night. The budget approved for the coming fiscal year is \$13,110 less than that for the fiscal year just ending.

In other business, the council approved the tax roll, levyed taxes, and approved an ordinance exempting certain nontaxable properties from taxa-

The group approved the contract for auditing of the city's books by the local firm of Glover, Graham and Brown. The council also voted to purchase a new computing machine from Connell Office Supply of Amarillo at \$640 and the trade-in of th office's old machine.

A payment of \$1,264.67 to the city engineer representing fees for supervising work on water and sewer improvements in Western Addition last spring was approved. Arequest by Lewellen Brothers for water serve tial alleys impassable, Special ice outside the city limits was

In his monthly summary of activities, City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland pointed out that four buildings permits were issued during August, two additions to residences, estimated cost \$4,600 one shop building, \$3,000 and a storage shed, \$500; for a total month's building of \$8,100.

In the water department, records showed that 24,224,300 gallons of water were pumped an average of 807,476 gallons per day, down from the previous month, since a total of 6.83 inches of rain fell on eleven different dates.

Sewer records showed one new tap during the month, bringing the number of active

taps to 975 at the end of the month.

Only one fire alarm was sounded during the month; that for an automobile fire at the Buske farm.

Police department records showed 34 arrests during the month: 15 for traffic violation. eight for illegal entry, three each for minor consumption and drunkenness; two for disturbance and once each for throwing of glass, illegal sale of liquor and discharging a

Investigations included three reports of theft; three of vandalism; four domestic disturbances; two runaways and two traffic accidents. There were 15 man-nights of jail.

The street department painted crosswalks and sweeping of streets around the schools prior to the beginning of school.

Trash collections were seriously hampered by the weather making several of the residencalls and the use of pick-up trucks alleviated the situation.



Dobie Writes About Martin Parmer

In 1957, Joe Osborn sent The Star a clipping from the Austin American that had to do with Martin Parmer, a signer of the Texas declaration of independence, and for whom this county was named.

History books we have read don't have much t'say about Parmer, and it falls to the lot of J. Frank Dobie, the best "stone - turner" the Southwest has ever had to dig up some interesting facts about this man. Do bie, who often writes with tongue in cheek, had a lot of fun finding out about Parmer, who seems to have been quite a character. Here are some parts of Dobie's article:

OF AN OLD TEXIAN AND HIS BEAR DOG

While Vrginia-born, Tennessee-whetted Martin Parmer was living 50 miles above the highest county that had been formed in Missouri Territory, he paid \$50 for a bear dog. That was a notorious price for any kind of a dog in those days, but this bear dog became more notorious. His name to the best of my fancy, was Bear Meat.

Parmer was in a game country hunted over by Iowa and Osage Indians. He had desperate fights with them but in time gained such influence over them that he was appointed U.S. Indian agent. This influence was to a considerable extent due to Bear Meat.

There was no market for meat -bear or venison-but Parmer was as "wrathy" to take it as Davy Crockett was. He had no trouble getting it away to the

> Anybody who looks at a map of Texas showing county boundaries will be struck with the haphazard shapes of those in the eastern part of the state -the first part settled in -- in contrast to the checkerboard arrangement of those, 30 by 30 miles square, to the west. They look like the county maps of Kansas laid off in townships.

In 1876 the Texas Legislature by a single act "created" 54 counties out of lands entirely unsettled out on the Plains. They were surveyed on paper and given names. The lawmakers were hard put to it for names. At that time a man was supposed to have achieved money in order to have a public institution named for him, handle-one county out of the

54-was named Parmer. According to the record, "It was named in honor of Martin Parmer, an eccentric Texan of the olden times, and one of the signers of the Declaration of Texas Independence.

When Bear Meat died Martin was not too consumed by regrets to pay the respects he considered due his old hunting companion and fellow-conqueror of so many bears. "Jesus Christ and General Jackson," he said, "I've taken shots at white men not near so deserving of a Christian burial as old Bear Meat." It was 50 miles to the nearest preacher and Parmer sent for him. It would not have been seemly in an olfactory way to keep the corpse exposed to the air all the time necessary for the messenger to get to the preacher and for the preacher to come, It was buried in a regular grave and there the fresh earth was mounded up in a regular way.


When the preacher arrived he seems not to have asked particulars. He held a regular service, singing a psalm, reading "in my father's house are many mansions," etc. from the Scriptures, and closing with a prayer for the bereaved. Martin Parmer probably gave him all the tried-out bear grease he could carry home and \$5 besides.

In these days of conformity without independence, and of religiosity without a streak of spiritual content, it is a great refreshment to reflect on this "eccentric Texan of the olden One county on the extreme times," and his bear dog,

This action had its beginning within the Friona Chamber of Commerce, and for months, a discussion of how the election might be carried out was the main topic of discussion whenever the group met.

Finally, things came to a head when the county commissioners were petitioned to call an election that would decide the burning question. In several issues preceding the voting, the Friona Star, as spokesman of the community, was filled with messages not only from its editor, but prominent citizens, urging passage of the election.

It would take several pages just to reproduce the text of these messages, but the articles appearing on this page give a sample of the sentiment which the paper reflected.







Rose is a member of Friona Women's Club, and was instrumental in the drive which built the Women's Club House in 1941. She has also been active in P-TA work, local politics (where she has served on numerous occasions as an election ona's Red Cross chairman for 20 years.

In 1924, Rose moved to Friona, became the town's first telephone operator, and met Oscar. They were married that year, and in 1926, "Os" built the house which they still occupy, just west of Friona Methodist Church.

Lange, who is nearing 50 years as manager for Friona's Rockwell Brothers Lumber Company, arrived in Friona in 1919 from Llano (Tex.), where he had previously been employed by Rockwell.

He had just finished a hirch in the U.S. Army when he received a telegram from Rockwell's main office, asking if he would like to have an office to manage at Friona. He replied "yes," and says he has never regretted the decidays to decide that Friona was the place I wanted to settle down, I saw the possibilities of a ed to be a part of it," Lange

He says that in 1919 when he went to buy a train ticket to Friona, the ticket agent in Llano couldn't locate the young West Texas town. He had to wire Austin, to find out how to

After changing trains three times, he finally arrived in Friona. Lange remembers the conductor yelling "Friona!" He looked around, not seeing much, side of the tracks the town was on, "lest don't make no difference," is what Lange re-

A couple of years after Lange became manager of the local Rockwell store, Friona High School, under Dr. Floyd Golden, was organizing its first football team. It was a task getting 11 men in those days, and Lange accompanied the team several times and "filled in" at an end position in a couple of games.

There has always been a lot of grain around Friona, Lange recalls, and remembers the two elevator operators who were here when he came to town. There was John Gischler at the present Wheat Growers site, and the George Maurer-Dick Clennen elevator at the Santa Fe location.

"They were competitive, and kept a good market locally for grain," Lange says. He tells how people used to come from across the state line in New Mexico to sell their grain, They would unhitch their teams and stay all night on the lumber



No history of Friona would be complete without a story about our very first "Miss Friona," According to the best sources of information we have been able to contact the contest conducted in the high school auditorium in the spring of 1948 was our first queen contest. It was held in connection with a community wide pie supper.

At that time the former Syndicate Hotel building had been moved onto its present location at the corner of Seventh and Washington from its original site east of Hub and was being converted into an American Legion. Funds from the supper and beauty pageant were used for remodelling the building.

The following story was copied from an issue of the Friona Star. Headlines of the story were "Large Crowd Jams Auditorium for Pie Supper, Beauty Contest," and "Gene Schults Is Crowned Queen of Show."

Approximately 750 persons jammed the Grade School Auditorium here Monday night to attend a combination pie supper, beauty contest and baby contest, sponsored by the American Le-

Miss Gene Schults, sponsored by the Friona State Bank, was crowned "Miss Friona" in the beauty contest, with Miss Ruby Mae Schaffer, sponsored by Blanton Butane Gas Co., as second, and Miss Dorothy Nell Guinn, sponsored by Foster's Dry Goods as third. A total of 29 girls were entered in the contest and this feature was the highlight of the evening.

Of equal interest was the selection of winners in six groups of a baby contest. Winners in these groups were:

PRINCE CHARMING (one and two year old boys), Keith Lynn Blackburn; PRINCESS BEAU-TIFUL (one and two year old girls), Jo Beth Brummett; LIT-TLE BOY BLUE (three and four year old boys), Max Reeve; LITTLE BO PEEP (three and four year old girls), Mikie Welch; DONALD DUCK (five and six year old boys) Joe Reeve; DAISY DUCK (five and six year oldgirls), Gloria Gayle



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
