HEAD START PLANS APPROVED HERE

W. E. Hancock, school superintendent, announced this week that the school has received final approval from the Department of Education on the Head-Start program.

Hancock submitted the plans in Austin on May 2 after receiving approval from the central office at West Texas State University at Canyon. The grant states that under the Title I head start program Sudan is to receive \$15,989 of which \$3,000 is to be spent on equipment and materials for the 6-week program.

The program which will begin June 20 is for economically deprived pre-school children and 75 educationally deprived children, enrolled in school

from grades one through seven.

Hancock stated that the program is strictly voluntary and that students who are at least one year behind in their school work are the first to be registered.

Seven teachers, including the co-ordinator Bernard Wilson, and the school nurse Mrs. Winona Dudgeon will work during the program. Classes will be held five days per week, beginning at 8 o'clock each morning. Classes will be dismissed at 12 noon with a free meal to be served to the economically deprived children. A mid-morning snack will also be served to the first three groups.

Hancock said that buses will run, but due to finances, only three buses will make a 60 mile route each, per day.

LAMB COUNTY RED CROSS MEETING HELD FRIDAY

4-H NEWS

A special 4-H Club meeting was called May 9, 1966, with Rodney Bowling presiding. The purpose of the meeting was to elect a director to represent the Sudan 4-H Club in the Area Livestock Show and Sale.

Lewis Fields was elected to serve as director on the area show board.

The club voted to have a concession stand at the Little Britches Rodeo which will be held in Sudan sometime in June.

Sudan was the scene of an unusual aspect of the Democratic Primary Election held Saturday. It seems no one filed for the Justice of Peace Office of voting Precinct 5. This stirred little attention until the write-in candidates numbered four and campaigning reached a climax. After the ballots were counted Tobe Vereen had received 70, C. T. Wright, 66; Betty Martin, 44; and A. B. Jenkins, 38.

To most people it seemed logical that a run-off would be held between Vereen and Wright, but all votes have been disqualified according to Glenn Batson, Democratic County Chairman who stated that according to Texas State Election Code, provision 13.09, "If no candidate files for the office, there can be no write-in candidate elected in a party primary or run-off election."

Batson stated all that can be done now is for the candidates to be written-in during the November General Election.

To be written-in during the General Election requires no filing fee. The candidate must simply let it be known that he wishes his name to be written-in for the office.

Only one office will be voted on in this county during the June 4 run-off election. That being the office of Attorney General, with the run-off being between

Crawford C. Martin of Hill County and Franklin Spears of Bexar County.

Sudan had 237 votes cast in this precinct. R. D. Nix received 228 for Democratic Chairman, Donnie Cowart received 2 write-in votes for this office; O. J. Mangum received 112 votes for County Judge overcoming J. B. Davis with 108. For District Clerk, Ray Lynn Britt received 95 and Ernest Owens, 113; for County School Superintendent Edwin L. Hall polled 83, C. Roy Stevens, 128, Drew Watkins received 1 write-in vote; Lamb County Democratic Chairman, Glenn Batson 99, C. A. Duvall 84. Other county offices were uncontested.

In the state offices Sudan voted: Governor: Johnnie May Hackworth, 11; Stanley C. Woods, 50; John Connally, 168. Lieutenant Governor: Bill Hollowell, 24; Preston Smith, 208. United States Senator: John R. Willoughby, 27; Waggoner Carr, 202. Attorney General: Martin 121, Galloway Calhoun 29, Spears 72. Commissioner of General Land Office: Jerry Sadler 134, 187; Fred Williams, 32. Railroad Commissioner: P. S. Ervin, 36; Paul B. Haring, 12; Byron Tunnell, 167. Judge of Court of Criminal Appeals: W. T. McDonald, 133; John F. Onion, 69. State Senator of 30th District: Jack Hightower, 48; Andy Rogers, 135; James R. Ray, 45.

In the county as a whole, several of the races were a battle down to the finish line, even with some ballots being recounted. O. J. (Jim) Mangum edged incumbent Lamb County Judge J. B. Davis 1,531 to 1,525 and Ray Lynn Britt overcame the incumbent District Clerk Ernest L. Owens, 1,521 to 1,494. C. Roy Stevens retained his position as County School Superintendent over Edwin L. Hall 1,686 to 1,187.

The county went for Andy Rogers for State Senator, Sadler for Land Office, Tunnell for Railroad Commissioner, and McDonald won over Onion by a narrow majority for Judge of Criminal Appeals.



Shortcake, Anyone?

Who needs spring flowers to get in the mood for fruit shortcakes? And, who needs fresh fruit? Not with today's wonderful frozen and canned fruits. Now glamorous shortcakes come and glow on winter menus, too. I solo the fruit or use them in combination, like raspberries mixed with blueberries. When I'm lucky enough to have cranberries left from the holidays, I heat them up and spoon over shortcake biscuits. Very colorful for a winter day's dessert! Fun to vary the toppings, too, with fresh cream, whipped cream, sour cream or ice cream. And some snowy night, I hope you'll try this summertime thought that's all peaches and cream.

PEACHIE SHORTCUT SHORTCAKE
2 cups Bisquick
1/2 cup light cream or 1/2 cup milk plus 1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted
2 tablespoons sugar
1 can (1 pound 4 ounces) peach pie filling
Whipped cream


Heat oven to 450°. Mix Bisquick, cream and sugar with a fork to a soft dough. Beat vigorously 20 strokes. Spoon dough into 6 portions onto greased baking sheet. Flatten and shape portions of dough into rounds, 1/2 inch thick. Bake 10 minutes or until nicely browned. Serve warm topped with peach pie filling and whipped cream. 6 servings. (Don't forget about shortcakes for main dishes. Make as (above) except—omit the sugar. Top with creamed tuna, chicken or leftover holiday turkey.)

Now! Can luscious strawberry shortcake be improved upon? Just try it with Berry Cream. Whip 1 cup whipping cream with 3 tablespoons confectioners' sugar until stiff. Chill just before serving. Fold in 1 package (10 ounces) frozen sliced strawberries, thawed and drained. Makes 4 cups. Remember cream, bowl and beaters are chilled first in the refrigerator.

Tip for thawing frozen fruits. Don't overdo! Fruit is ready to use when ice crystals still linger on.



Composer Sings Out




BURSITIS

PICKEREL POINTERS

"Danged Jackfish!" This utterance is often heard from bass addicts when their favorite pursuits are interrupted by a spray of greenish-gold, followed by a savage encounter with a long, slender fish that seems all head and teeth.

To many, the common pickerel is considered a trash fish, but to those who know his sporting qualities, this small cousin of the pike and muskie is held in high esteem.

While most anglers agree on its dubious table value, the fishing experts at Mercury outboards have no hesitation in praising the pickerel as a top game species.

Found in about half the nation, ranging from Maine to Texas, this bony-mouthed scrapper deserves more attention than it receives.

Since most pickerel run small

when compared with pike, averaging only a pound or two, light tackle offers the most action. Like the pike, the pickerel is a hungry, pugnacious character and is susceptible to about the same artificial offerings, though in smaller sizes.

For top sport, fly casting with streamers and bucktails produces a brand of action that seldom can be matched, yet comparatively few anglers use this method.

Pickerel inhabit locations of heavy aquatic growth, making weed guards on lures almost a necessity. They usually lie concealed near the fringe of a weed bed, facing outward in hope of grabbing a passing meal. Lures retrieved across the open edge or skittered over the weeds are the most productive.

If you get into pickerel waters, take advantage of the opportunity, urge the Mercury authorities. Pickerel cease to be a "nuisance" when deliberately sought.

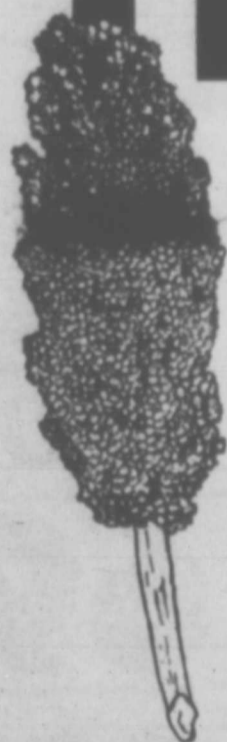

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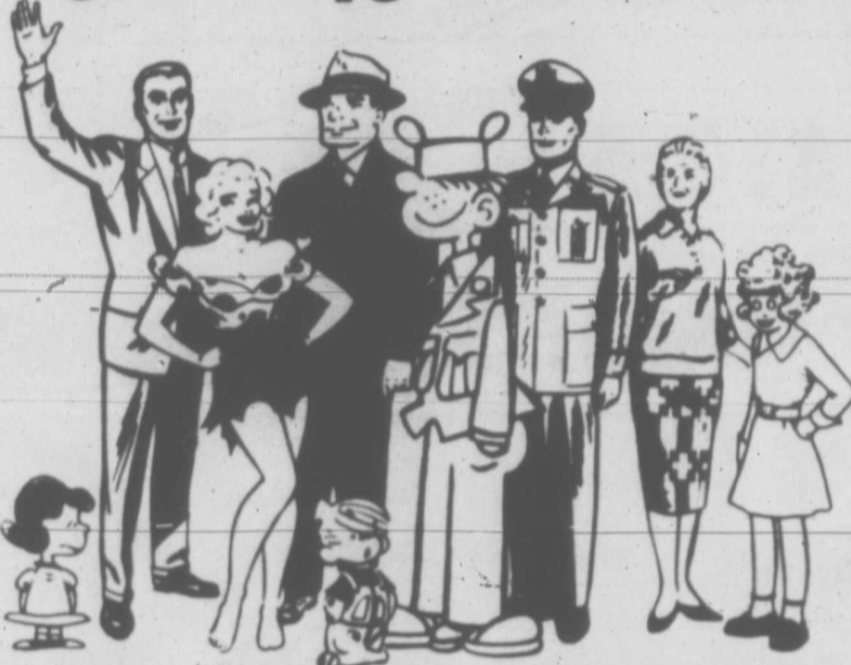
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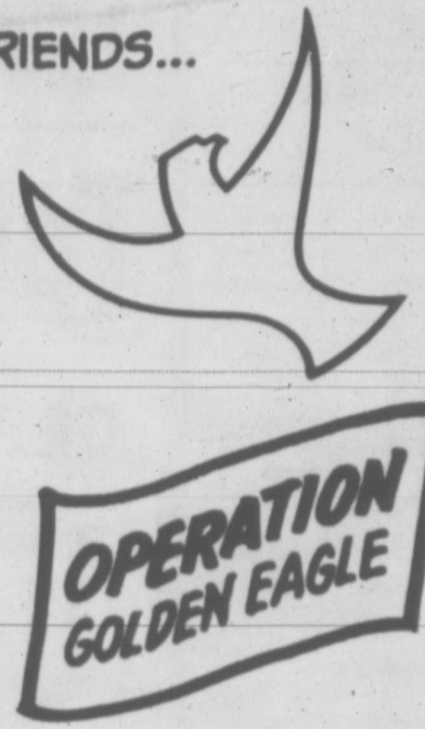
