THERE'S no parent who hasn't had the frustrating experience of carefully explaining something to a child, only to discover later that the child doesn't even remember discussing the topic at all.

Students and wives, too, often find that in talking with each other they might as well have been addressing the TV set. In fact, there's a similarity there, between some people and a TV set. Some people are all ears and no receiver. There's a habit talking they never hear a word you say. But I digress.

What I intended to say is that your child, wife, or husband may not be as dense as you feared. It may be that his mind is just out of him. No, I didn't say he was out of his mind, rather, you can believe Dr. E. E. Bernard, a North Carolina State University psychologist, many persons either actually project their minds outside their bodies, or their minds involuntarily go wandering off somewhere.

He is convinced the minds of many persons can leave their bodies and drift away, unimpeded by physical barriers or distance. The phenomenon is called astral (out-of-body) projection, and is described by Dr. Bernard as "like lying on a sofa, getting up and seeing your body still lying on the sofa."

The mind, he said, may remain in the same room or be projected thousands of miles. Separation of mind and body may last from a few seconds to a few hours.

[This may explain the astounding concentration of my brother, who used to lose himself so far in his reading that I could speak to him from just a few inches away and he never seemed to hear me. I always wondered why he never did turn a page. His body was sitting there with a book while his mind was off traipsing around somewhere. There's some question as to whether it ever did come back.]

Anyway, Dr. Bernard cited one case where an individual experienced astral projection while

sitting at a desk. The mind was projected to a distant city the person had never visited, he said. After the experience, the individual described in detail a street, an office building and the person he saw. Dr. Bernard claimed he investigated and found the street, the building and the person.

The psychologist emphasized that evidence he has gathered indicates the mind projection causes no harm to the individual. He did say that many who have experienced this phenomenon only once or twice are afraid they are losing their minds and refuse to tell anyone about it because they fear they may be committed.

He takes it seriously. And so I, to the extent that if any of my readers has ever had such an experience, I would like very much to hear from them, in complete confidence, if desired.

Meanwhile, I can't help thinking that if the CIA had any men who could control this mind projection, they could make James Bond look like a bumbling idiot.

The Hornet defense did an outstanding job in holding the Amherst Bulldogs scoreless when another chapter was added to the inter-city rivalry between the Hornet and Bulldog football teams Friday night in Amherst.

Sudan defeated Amherst 9-0 with FB Mike Bellar kicking a field goal in the third quarter and scoring a TD in the final period.

The Hornets kicked off to the Bulldogs to open the game which was played in cold, damp dismal weather; although the spirit of both fans and team members were anything but dismal.

At halftime, the game remained scoreless with neither team penetrating inside the 20 yard line. Sudan had five first downs and Amherst three, with Amherst trailing Sudan in yardage gained. Sudan had 82 yards rushing and one pass completed by QB Ronnie Hill to End Danny Martin for 17 yards.

Amherst had 65 yards rushing and QB McAdams threw 3 passes

The determined Hornets began the ball in the third quarter and after making four first downs, Mike Bellar booted a field goal from the 30 yard line to put Sudan on the scoreboard, 3-0.

Gary Gatewood, Hornet FB, carried the ball 23 yards for one of the longest runs in the ballgame, to aid in setting up the 3-pointer.

Jerry Bellar intercepted a Bulldog pass in the fourth quarter to start the Hornets toward the goal line. Morgan toted the ball and gained 41 yards, making 3 first downs in succession, to enable Bellar to go over from 6 yards out.

Bellar's kick for the point after was partially blocked and the score remained 9-0 in favor of Sudan.

The Bulldogs put on a rally in the final minutes, but were halted by the Hornet defense on downs after making 3 first downs.

Amherst's leading gainer was Leon Hardwick who pushed 65 yards on 17 attempts. Mike Slate also did outstanding work for the Bulldog defense.

For Sudan, you could name all the defensive team as outstanding with Eddie Boyles and Van Seymour as exceptional.

Larry Morgan was the top gainer with 89 yards in 15 carries, but Bellar, Gatewood also carried their load and QB Ronnie Hill completed 2 out of 7 passes to Danny Martin for 27 yards.

Sudan is the only team in the 3A district that remains undefeated. Top district contenders Springlake and Farwell were defeated by Hale Center and Dimmitt. Another of Sudan's long-standing rivals, Plains, has been defeated by Sundown, whom Sudan smothered in the season opener.

This gives Sudan fans an optimistic view of the season ahead, but lest we become over-confident, remember that Anton, the Hornet's Friday night opponents, also remain undefeated and are reported to have a strong team.

In spite of all the publicity about new safety equipment, Pittman reported that drivers continued to be the basic cause of accidents and the 1966 vehicles have proven to be exceptionally safe. Dealers report no problems in financing new cars and their stocks contain excellent selections.

New car showing dates for 1967 models will be September 29 for Chevrolet and September 30 for Ford.

These can be viewed locally at Baccus Chevrolet and Sudan Motor Company.

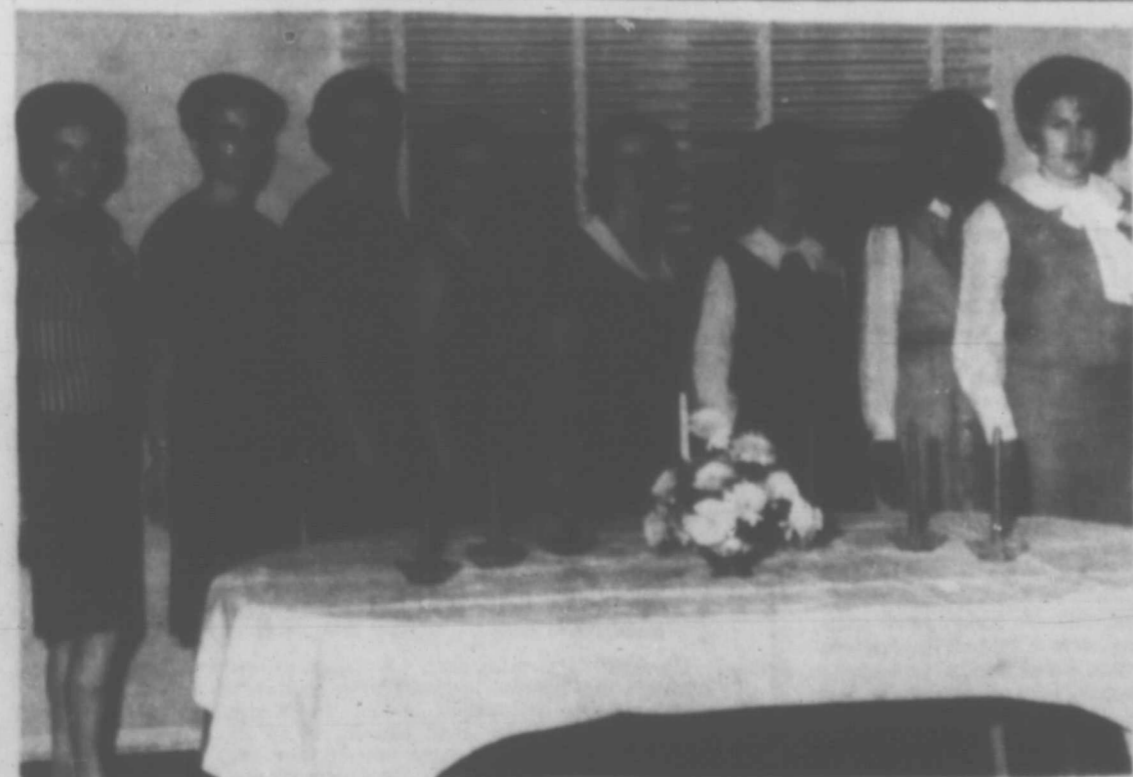

Golden Anniversary

The fiftieth anniversary of the first truck trip between Seattle and New York and the first transcontinental round trip shipment of freight is being observed this month with a commemorative truck run following the original route.

The initial trip in 1914 was made in a 1 1/2-ton General Motors Corporation truck loaded with a ton of Carnation Evaporated Milk. The journey took 73 days of driving time. - 1 can (10 1/2 ounces) condensed cream of mushroom soup
- 1 cup grated process-type American cheese
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon crushed thyme
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 8 to 10 small cooked onions
- 1/4 pound sliced mushrooms

Coat chicken with flour. Arrange chicken in single layer with skins down in melted butter in baking dish (13 x 9 x 2 inches). Bake uncovered in 425° (hot) oven for 30 minutes. Turn chicken; bake until brown, 15 to 20 minutes or until tender. Remove from oven and reduce oven temperature to 325°. Pour off excess fat. Combine evaporated milk, soup, cheese, salt, thyme and pepper. Add onions and mushrooms to chicken. Pour milk mixture over chicken. Cover dish with foil. Return to oven and continue baking for 15 to 20 minutes.

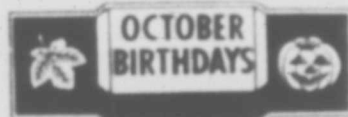
