tra point.


The crowd watched a defensive battle until Morgan again found a hole in the Bovina line and ran 28 yards for the final TD. Bellar kicked the extra point and the final score read

Who is he that is in you? What "power" really works within you?

I think that until the Christian believer gives God's Spirit "room" to operate within his heart, that he is powerless. 


Upon changing ends of the field the Hornets moved to the 5 yard line where Larry Morgan fought his way across the goal line with Bellar adding the extra point. "

WHAT POWER IS IN YOU??

Scripture: IJohn 2:1-2; 3:1-3; 4:4; I Corinthians 3:16.

".. Because greater is He that is in you, than he that is in the world. "

What is wrong with us? Is there something wrong? Why do we not as Christians (the Church) have more effect on the world than we do? Why are so many of the lost not found for Christ? Are you looking, searching for those who are lost without hope?

In the days of Abraham, why did he leave his home, his family and friends and go into a strange country? Because His faith was in God, and when God spoke to him, Abraham went. Moses led the children of Israel out of bondage in Egypt, by faith in God's Almighty power to do what He said. There are many other persons who have lived by faithbut in what do we believe? Even more important, in whom do we believe?

What do you think about? Do you think about God, His majesty and His glory; do you think of His unfailing grace, His forgiveness and mercy toward man? What do you read? With

Three Hundred Years Wiser About Fire

One Sunday morning in September, 300 years ago, fire started in a bake shop on Pudding Lane, London. Five days later 13,000 homes and 87 churches, over almost 400 acres, lay in ashes.

Within two months of that holocaust, the first laws directed at fire prevention were enacted. The City Council of London ruled that all new homes had to be built of brick and stone, not timber and thatch, and that the trades of brewing, dyeing and soap boiling could be carried on in house courtyards as before.

Fire prevention, as we know it, was born. While much has been done over these three centuries toward greater fire safety, there are 300,000 fires in omes each year in this country and almost 4,000 children

A Nuclear-Powered Heart

The scientific and medical professions are pooling their skills to develop a nuclear-powered artificial heart, A radioactive capsule within the artificial heart will furnish the power for a tiny steam engine designed to actuate a blood pump.

This pioneering research subject is being conducted at the Children's Hospital Medical Center, Boston, Mass., and they plan to implant the heart in an animal later this year.

If these tests and the many to follow are successful, scientists believe that they can develop a heart unit that would be the size of a cantaloupe, would weigh about five pounds, could function within the rib cage for up to 10 years and could be a total heart replacement. The use of nuclear power could eliminate one major obstacle to the development of artificial hearts: the need to frequently replace the power source.

The research is being conducted jointly by Children's Hospital and Thermo-Electron Engineering Corp., of Waltham, Massachusetts.

The major technical problems in development of a nuclearpowered heart involve heat and radiation, says Dr. William F. Bernhard of Children's Hospital, the project medical director.

Geraniums From Seeds



You can grow geraniums from seeds for indoor flowering in winter or for bedding outdoors in spring. Buy only the best seeds such as Floradale Fancy Mixed, a bloom of which is shown.

You can grow the geraniums for next year's bedding outdoors from seeds sown during winter. It's easy and it's fun for the results are quite unpredictable. You know in advance if you sow fine geranium seeds from a reliable seedsman that all the plants will be beautiful ones but the flower colors and the exact leaf coloring will vary

from plant to plant. Geranium seeds are very fine. If you scatter them over the surtace of a flower pot filled with 1/3 sand, 1/3 granulated peat moss and 1/3 good garden soil you can sprinkle over them a thin layer of sand to cover. Then, with the palm of your hand, firm

them gently to the soil. Water after planting and as often as is needed by setting the planted pot in a container of water and allowing the moisture to permeate to the soil surface. Don't allow the soil to dry until after seeds have sprouted - from 2 to 8 weeks time of sowing.

The pot should be covered with a sheet of glass or popped int# a plastic bag and set in a shady place in a 60 degree temperature until seeds sprout. After that remove glass or plastic.

As soon as seedlings are large enough to handle, plant each in a 2-inch pot in a mixture of hall granulated peat moss and hall good garden soil. Shift to larger pots as needed.

Four months are required from seed to flowering so time the planting of seeds according to your needs. Geranium seeds may be sown at any time of year and growing the plants from seeds is a real adventure.
