I remember well the summer of 1956 when we lived in Throckmorton and the skunks were out in force. Throckmorton is completely cut off from the rest of the civilized world. It's 25 miles or so to a movie. There is no bus service (unless they've added one since 1956) to or from anywhere. It's the county seat, and there were some nice folks there, but you've just about got to be going there on purpose to see the town, because it's off the main highways.

Anyway, the skunk population was booming that summer, and they were hungry and thirsty, I guess, because that was one of the driest summers I remember anywhere. The jackrabbits and there were plenty of them—got so thin you couldn't see them if they faced you head-on.

The skunks were everywhere; one woman even found one in her kitchen after the back door had been left open. It was quite an operation getting it out of the house without an eruption.

I got a real scare one night when my car broke down and I was walking back to town in almost total darkness. I saw something moving and there were two skunks about 10 feet away at the edge of the road. I moved out rapidly but quietly.

I've heard that unless you excite these animals, or make them angry, they won't spray you. But I never did care for this theory. It stinks, in fact.

City Indefinite About Summer Athletic Program

Mayor Joe Rone stated this week that plans for a city sponsored Summer Athletic Program are indefinite. He said that at this time the City would have to raise city water rates to obtain the revenue needed to sponsor such a program and due to citizen opposition the program was tabled at a council meeting Monday afternoon.

He stated that the city is operating on a very close budget and if the revenue from the water meters continues to drop, either city taxes or water rates will have to be increased in order to pay the city employees for services rendered in maintaining the city water, garbage collecting and sewage systems now offered to Sudan residents.

Rone stated that the water revenue decline is caused by the drop in the number of water meters in operation and because Sudan residents are using less water.

He continued that Sudan's water rates are one of the lowest in West Texas at this time, and the City Council is in favor of keeping them as low as possible and still have the revenue necessary for maintaining full city service.

The city council is examining the tax roll and a meeting of the equalization board is slated to discuss the city taxes.

Rone invited any local citizens who wish to discuss the summer athletic program with the city council to contact him, and a meeting date will be set.

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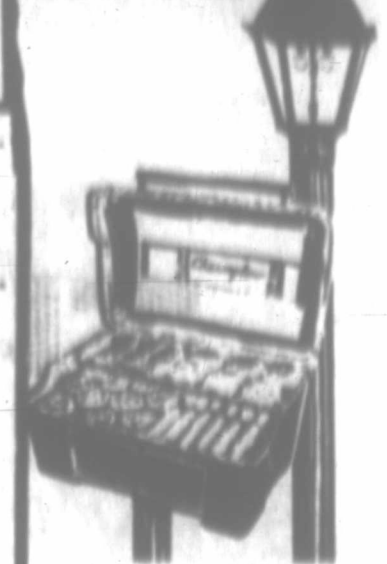

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PIONEERS OF YESTERYEAR

Joseph (Joe) W. Stark, son of John Franklin Sr. (Boston, Ky.) and Martha (Woods) Williams Stark, (Randolph County, Mo.) was born March 7, 1893 at Yates, Mo. where he started to school. The Stark family came to Texas in 1901 and settled in Iowa Park and in 1910 moved to Wilbarger County making their home in the small community of Oklaunion, Texas. Both parents, John Franklin Sr. and Martha Stark, are deceased and buried in the Stark family plot at Vernon, Texas.

Joseph W. Stark and Eva Blanche Greathouse were married March 23, 1916 at Oklaunion. Eva Blanche, daughter of Paul Early and Mary Eliza both (Teague) Greathouse, was born Oct. 23, 1898 at Cookville, Texas. Her first school

was Lone Star in Titus County. After Joe and Blanche were married they resided in Wichita Falls where their only child, Billie Joe, was born May 7, 1923.

In 1925, Joe Blanche and Billie moved to Sudan. Joe rode in an emigrant car with the livestock and household possessions while Blanche and Billy came by car driven by Frank and Ben (Greathouse) Stark.

Their first home was on a farm near the Fairview Glen that now belongs to the heirs of the late Calvin Wiseman. While living there Joe purchased land from the Furness Bros. and built their home, staying until his health forced his retirement, then moved into town the fall of 1943. Billie's first and only school was in Sudan, graduating in May, 1940. On Feb. 8, 1943, Billie was inducted into the Army and went overseas as

a Lieutenant.

He took part in several major battles in the European Theatre until he was seriously wounded at "The Battle of the Bulge" in Belgium. His right arm was almost severed, held only by a small piece of flesh. After many operations, he was discharged with a usable right arm.

Joe and Blanche moved to Wichita Falls in Feb. 1944, and it was there Billie met Johnnie Sue, daughter of John and Jane Davis of Olney.

Billie and Sue were married July 16, 1946 at Olney. After his discharge from the army, he entered Texas University at Austin and graduated with a pharmaceutical degree.

Air Conditioning Has Major Role As Nation Grows

The United States has rapidly become an "urbanized" nation—that is, most of its people now live in cities rather than in the country. The tendency of people to move to cities will continue for some time, and it is resulting in some new forms of urban and suburban housing.

The basic problem, of course, is land—its scarcity and cost. As the population of cities increases, it becomes necessary either to spread the city out farther and farther, or to house more people on smaller amounts of land.

Actually, both of these things have been happening. The suburbs have expanded mightily, and planners have devoted considerable effort to the devising of ways to "shape" suburbs and make them more attractive, comfortable, and efficient. At the same time, architects have worked on ways to increase population density within the city, without giving up the individual privileges of comfort and privacy.

In the development of these separate ideas, air conditioning has come to play a major role. Air conditioning makes it possible for dwellings to be built closer together.

If it is true, that hospitals can't pay their expenses, why are we who are farmers embarking on another losing enterprise? I suppose it was legal to annex our land to the district without our knowledge but how would you have liked such action against you? I resent it.

If the possession of a hospital within a town assures its growth why isn't Amberst any larger? I didn't notice a marked increase in the size of Olton when the old courthouse was being used as a hospital; and for a time there was an MD on its staff.

The initial rate of the proposed taxation is 30¢ on the \$100 valuation, but we all know that can be increased to 75¢ and that the evaluation of our property can also be raised. We all know these possibilities and they were confirmed by a representative of the office of the Attorney General when I called him at Austin, Friday, May 19.

Forty years ago when I was visiting in Indian I was surprised to hear people say they were selling their land because they could not pay the taxes. I now appreciate their position. The doctor and the lawyer were buying the land.

I have never voted against a bond issue, but I do not see how the proposed erection of a hospital will ultimately be beneficial to anyone.
