WOODWORK

THE STAID old Associated Press is getting pretty liberal, or daring, it seems to me. Since the AP has seen fit to offer thousands of newspapers over the country the following, I guess it's okay for the Woodwork, although I admit I've seen lots of things in print which I wouldn't want to insult Sudan-Amherst readers with.

Never end a sentence with a uno what. Oh, well.

Anyway, in an AP story about the names for federal programs, such as Head Start, Upward Bound, and the like, writer Frank Cormier pointed out that some of the programs are intentionally named so that the initials of the program spell something significant.

As an example, he cited Job Opportunities in the Business Sector (JOBS), and Cooperative Area Manpower Planning System (CAMPS). But Cormier comments:

"Acronyms of this kind are not encouraged in all cases, of course. As an example, Johnson last month proposed a new program that he labeled Partnership for Education and Earning, which qualifies as both inspirational and catchily descriptive. It does not lend itself, however, to abbreviation."

I WAS thinking of commending Dr. Peale on his slap at Dr. Spock, but since the following editorial expresses my sentiments too, I may as well just reprint it.

The editorial, entitled "Never Too Late?" appeared in the Plainview Herald and was written by Jim Servatius, managing editor. It follows:

DR. NORMAN Vincent Peale, famed minister, columnist and common-sense philosopher, is not known to mince words and that he certainly did not in a sermon delivered Sunday at Marble Collegiate Church in New York.

Urging a "national disciplinary crackdown" to avert what he termed a "vicious rebellion" he says the nation faces this summer, Dr. Peale not only criticized Dr. Benjamin Spock for his encouragement of young men to resist the draft but even took him to task for his theories on baby care, the field for which Dr. Spock was best known until recent times.

Spock currently is under federal indictment with four others, accused of encouraging young men to resist the draft.

Dr. Peale indicated he believes a definite connection exists between unrest on the campus and the raising of infants by principles for which Spock is famous, described by the minister as "feed 'em whatever they want, don't let them cry... instant gratification of needs."

While the small minority of students who reject authority on the campus and seek to spark disturbances of all kinds tend to give college students in general a bad name, it is true few suggestions have come forth as to why such behavior has come to the forefront in recent years.

Norman Vincent Peale told his

congregation "Two generations of parents who abandoned the old American home quality of discipline have caused our universities to inherit neuroses, neglect and permissiveness, creating a student generation that thinks it can get what it yells for, even control of universities themselves."

Whether this is true or not is beside the point in regard to the relationship between current campus misbehaviors and school authorities.

Some student attitudes may be the result of a heretofore lifetime of "feed 'em whatever they want and don't let them cry" philosophy but that's no reason why colleges and universities should turn from their traditional responsibility and role or relinquish their traditional authority.

More institutions of higher learning should realize that perhaps even for college seniors it isn't necessarily too late to say "No!"



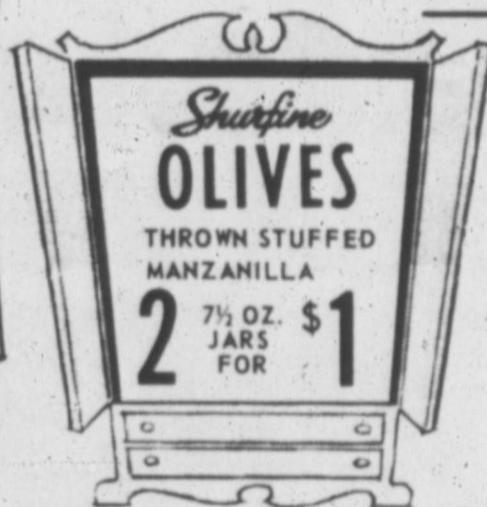
