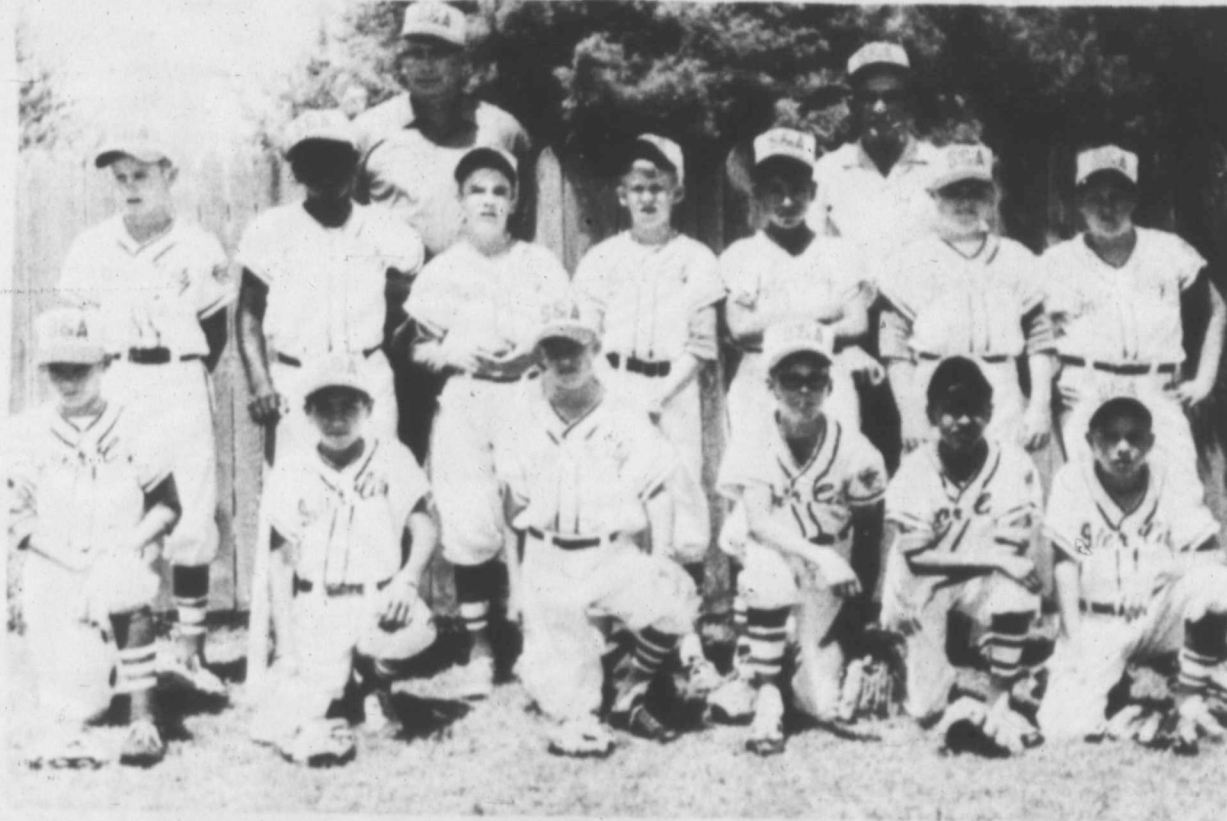

**FORD FOR MORE JOB TRAINING**

Frank Ford, Republican candidate for State Representative, has called for greater effort in providing skills training for the under-employed. Stating that "Jobs are the best answer to poverty," he has proposed a plan to utilize existing school facilities and volunteer teachers to step up adult education in Texas that will meet the needs for those skills that will be required for jobs in the 1970's.

"With increasing mechanization of farm labor and other low skill jobs in Texas," said Ford, "the need for job training is well recognized, and I am not satisfied with the current progress in education."

"Industry must continue to assume a greater role in education, and there must be greater state appropriations for learning as well as increased local effort for education and vocational training. However, with our rapidly increasing tax burden, we find ourselves walking a tightrope. This points up the need for mobilizing those who are willing to volunteer their time and talents to help others become more productive, self-supporting citizens."

"We have many talented retired individuals and others with great ability and a thorough knowledge of a productive skill," Ford concluded, "who have voiced a willingness to offer their services in a well-planned, practical, program to meet this pressing need. With this volunteer teaching corps, the utilization of existing facilities during idle hours, and only a token increase in tax cost

### LAMB COUNTY ACCIDENT REPORT

The Texas Highway Patrol, investigated four accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of June, according to Sergeant Thurman Ketter, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed, one person injured, and an estimated property damage of \$2,735.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1968 shows a total of 44 accidents resulting in five persons killed, 17 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$39,085.

"During the first six months of 1968 in Texas there were 1472 traffic deaths, or four less as compared to the 1476 traffic deaths for the same period of 1967," the Sergeant stated. However, if past trends continue the last six months will probably raise the 1968 total to one percent over the 1967 total of 3,367 deaths.

The Sergeant also stated that a training school for 120 new patrolmen with the Texas Department of Public Safety will start July 30.

To qualify for employment in the uniformed services of the DPS a man must be between the ages of 20 and 35, not less than 5 feet 8 inches tall, have a high school education or its equivalent, be in sound physical condition and be a citizen of the United States.

All interested young men who can meet these qualifications are urged to contact the nearest DPS patrolman or DPS office for complete details concerning the position of a patrolman, training and benefits.
