One doll, says the AP, is called Stacey, and says things like "I think miniskirts are smashing." Stacey reportedly is less than a foot tall.

Another, called Randi Reader, spels off 15 nursery rhymes, then says a bunch of stuff about sitting still while you draw her picture. It takes seven minutes to quiet her down, and this is about as realistic as you can get.

Who needs a doll that rattles on for seven minutes without a break? Sounds like the kids, except the dolls are unimpressed with even the wildest threats.

If they will get these dolls just a little bigger, and a little bit more controllable, maybe by next Christmas we can do away with people.

I can vaguely remember some of the girls in the sorority. When I visited my grandmother in Sudan, some of the girls use to visit one of my aunts. Mrs. Joe Wilkinson is my grandmother. Before my granddad died he owned the Palace Barber Shop there.

I was born in Lubbock, but I have lived in Casper, Wyo. since about age 9. I haven't been back to Sudan for a few years now. We get down there for Christmas once in a while.

Today is Thanksgiving but it is just another day over here. I imagine that Christmas will be the same way. I will be leaving Vietnam on May 18. One of those days, I'll get down to Sudan again to see everyone. I'll be sure to stop by and thank you personally for the package.

Well, I have to close and get

some more work done. Thank you again from all of us. Good luck and Merry Christmas to you and all of yours.

The Regional Champion Sudan Hornets went down fighting as they were defeated by the Sonora Broncos Friday night, 26-20, in the class A quarter-finals game at Odessa.

The 1968 Sudan Hornet Football Team is certainly to be congratulated on their successful season, winning District, Bi-district, Regional, and Quarter-Finals Runnerup Trophies. This writer and newspaper offers their congratulations to the boys for their fine team, excellent teamwork and sportsmanship, and their cooperation with both the coaches and referees throughout the season. Congratulations also to a very fine Hornet coaching staff, Coach Cain, Adams, Laceywell, and Gray. All these, the team and the coaches, working together with a great

desire to win was a great part of the reason why the Hornets were there to play in the quarter-finals.

The Sonora Broncos scored first in the game Friday night, and took the lead on a 50-yard touchdown pass. They missed the try for point, and were leading, 6-0. The Hornets started moving, and taking the ball on their 40; QB Steve Martin rolled out to the Sonora 45 yard line. HB Jerry Bellar went around end for a 14-yard gain to the 31. Then FB Larry Hanna went up the middle, broke two tackles, cut to the left and outran everybody else as he went into the end zone for a 31-yard TD. Bellar kicked the point, and Sudan led, 7-6. (If the many Hornet fans were cold, this really warmed them up as demonstrated by their joyful noise).

The Broncos fumbled on the 33 yard line, and Hanna was there to cover the ball for Sudan. Seven plays later Martin blasted over from the two for another touchdown. Bellar had already been into the end zone for a TD, but it had been called back on a Hornet offside penalty. Try for point failed, and the Hornets

were leading 13-6.

The second quarter scoring went to the Broncos as they made 20 points in this quarter. One of these was due to a Hornet fumble on their own 26, and Sonora covered the ball. The Hornets fought hard to get on the scoreboard again before the half, followed by a Martin pass to Hanna for a 14-yard gain to the Sonora 21. On the next pass, Sonora intercepted on the 1-yard line, fumbled the ball and Sudan recovered on the 3 when the clock ran out with Sonora leading Sudan at the half, 26-13.

The third quarter was a defensive battle with neither team scoring. The Broncos attempted a field goal which failed when all they could see was Hornet Guard Monte Roberts as he recovered the ball for Sudan. In the last quarter, End Joe Hines received a pass from Martin, operating on the Broncho 23, at the 7 and went on over for the TD. Bellar kicked the point, and the score was 26-20, Sonora. The Hornet defense really went to work, hitting hard as they forced the Broncos to fumble on the 38 yard line when Roberts again covered the ball for Sudan. The Hornet hopes were high, as they had the ball with four minutes left in the game. But the heartbreaking play came, when they fumbled and Sonora recovered the ball. But the fighting Hornet defense held the Broncos, forcing them to punt on 4th down, with 2:07 left on the clock. The Hornets got a clipping penalty on the punt, which put them back on the 5 yard line, 95 yards from where they wanted so much to be. They tried desperately to get away a pass and also a running play completed, but had to give up the ball with only 6 seconds remaining, and Sonora won over the Hornets, 26-20.

The Hornets lost this game, but they played a good game, and the Sudan School and community can be justly proud of this team. This game with Sonora could have gone either way, with only a 6-point margin.

McWilliams Rites Held

Funeral services for Louis Thomas McWilliams, 87, a retired Lamb County farmer, will be held at 3 p.m. Thursday at the First Baptist Church.

Burial will be in Sudan Cemetery under the direction of Payne Funeral Home of Amherst.

McWilliams was found dead about 3 p.m. Tuesday at his home on First St. He lived alone and had been ill for some time. Justice of the Peace W. T. Vereen ruled that he died of natural causes.

Coming to Lamb County in 1929, McWilliams moved into Sudan when he retired from farming.

Survivors include six sons, T. C. of Sudan, W. P. of Portales, N. M., C. B. of Littlefield, G. L. of Fort Smith, Ark., E. C. of

Cleburne, and the Rev. I. H. McWilliams of Amarillo; four daughters, Mrs. Vesta Richards of Sudan, Mrs. Frances Enloe of Amherst, Mrs. Ava Henry of Abernathy, and Mrs. Ada Bates of Clarksville, Ark.; a brother, L. H. of McAdoo; and a number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

**Dad Presses
Quest For
Missing Girl**

Redlands, Calif. — The
father of a teenage girl who
vanished last March has mailed
letters to more than 10,000
newspapers in the United States
and Canada, asking help in
finding her.

Norman Ernstein says the effort
to contact every paper in the
country cost about \$2,500 and
it would have been twice that
had he not had help from his
church, co-workers and friends.

Elizabeth Lurene Ernstein, 15,
was last seen half a mile from
home, walking from school.
Search by authorities and volun-
teers from a nearby air base
disclosed no trace.

Police ruled out kidnapping
because there was no ransom
try and said the girl probably is
a runaway.

Ernstein offered a \$1,000 re-
ward after she disappeared, later
upped it to \$5,000, advertised
in papers and asked hippie groups
to watch for her.

Ernstein, who works at an
aerospace firm, had to rent a
truck to bring all the letters to
the post office Thursday.

"I still have hope," he said. "I
don't know what the odds are
for the success of this packet, but
no matter how small they are I
still have to play them."

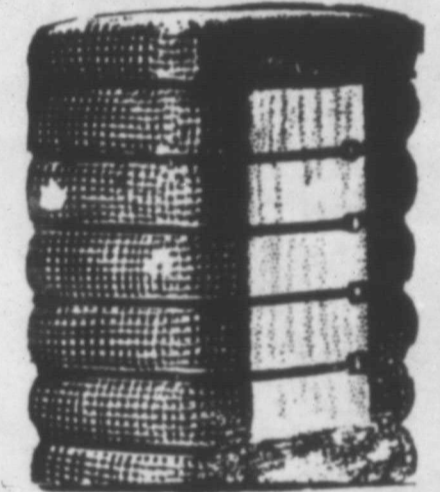

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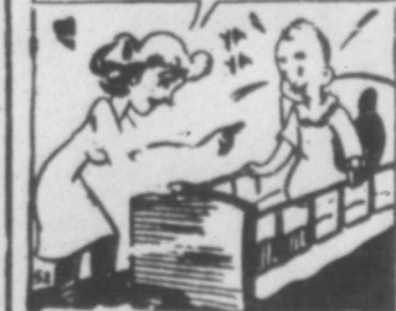
