SWPS To Invest \$16 Million In '69

A 1969 construction and improvement program which will add nearly \$16,000,000 to the company's investment in its 45,000 square mile service area was announced today (Thursday) by Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service Company.

"1969 will be the 22nd consecutive year in which we have increased our investment in our service area by 10-million dollars or more a year, with the average annual investment during the last 10 years being more than 20-million dollars. This investment is made for two reasons, both of them customer-related. The first reason is to stay ahead of the demand for electric service, while the second is to keep that service as efficient and economical as possible. Ever increasing inflation is making economy more and more difficult, but we are taking every step that we can to keep our expenses down," Tolk said.

Transmission lines and substations will account for a little more than 6-million dollars of the 1969 program, slightly less than 5-million will be for new distribution facilities, the lines and equipment which bring service to the customer, while a little less than 4-million will be for power plant additions and improvements, including the start of construction on a new generating station near Lubbock with an original capability of 210,000 kilowatts.

The major transmission line project will be construction of a 230,000 volt line from the Tuco Interchange, north of Abernathy, to the South Lubbock Interchange. In addition to providing another major power source for the South Plains area, the new line will be constructed so that it can be used as the first transmission circuit when the new generating station near Lubbock goes into service in 1971.

The new generating station will be called Clifford B. Jones Station in honor of the West Texas civic leader and President-emeritus of Texas Tech, who has been a director of South-

western Public Service Company for more than a quarter-century.

Once again the company will contribute to the water conservation efforts of the area by using sewage effluent purchased from the City of Lubbock as cooling water when the new plant goes into operation. Nichols Station, near Amarillo, was the first of the company's generating facilities to utilize sewage effluent for this purpose.

Highlighting the economy efforts of the company will be the installation of special equipment on two generators at Plant X which will make it possible to shut down the two units during the night hours of low power consumption and yet bring them back into service quickly for peak periods of power usage.

"We anticipate saving about \$30,000 a year on our fuel costs with this equipment, so it will soon pay for itself. Normally, you can't just shut down a generator when you don't need it, because it takes too long to get it back on the line when you do want it. So, normally, you keep the things running with a minimum load, which is the most expensive way of operating, until you need more production.

With this new equipment we'll be able to completely shut down the two generators, load the units still in service at the most economical level and still, and this is the part that's important to our customers, keep adequate spinning reserves in the event that we lose a generating unit for one reason or another," Tolk said.

Speaking of reserves, the company anticipates a 1969 peak load of 1,462,000 kilowatts and will meet it with generating capability of 1,835,000 kilowatts, providing a reserve capacity of 373,000 kilowatts. The largest generating unit on the system has a capability of 210,000 kilowatts, so that the reserve capability is large enough to handle the loss of the largest unit and still maintain a 150,000 kilowatt reserve.

Scripture: St. John 3: 16-19; 14: 23-24; St. Matthew 14: 24-32.

Do you believe in God?

If this question were asked of you, 99 per cent of you would probably answer "Why sure I believe in God". But, do you?

Do you believe in thrift? I heard a man say that in America are had talked about and taught thrift, and almost nobody would say other than that we believed in thrift, but we had not practiced thrift in some 50 years! In fact, our whole economic system is set up so that everyone must spend (not save) 90% of their income, or our entire economic system would collapse. Save for a rainy day? Can't do

it—I have to make a car payment, house payment, etc. But do you believe in thrift?

Then, do you believe in God? Or, do we in America just talk about God... how long since we have "practiced" our Christian beliefs?

What is a Christian? One who believed in God; that He would and could keep His word to hear and answer prayer; that He meant what He said when He said of Jesus, "This is my beloved Son". Then a Christian is one who believed what Jesus Christ said when He said, "I and my Father are one," and when He said, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life."

I repeat, Do you believe in God? Jesus said, "If any man serve me, let him follow me; and where I am, there shall also my servant be." And He said "If a man love me, he will keep my words..." and His words are in the Sermon on the mount, and in only two commandments for us: Love Him, and love one another "as I have loved You". (Enough to die for one another?)

Do you practice your Christian belief? Do you really believe God has the power which He said He has—to give you eternal life through your belief in and acceptance of Jesus as Son of God, your Savior and Lord? Do you believe He has the

power to keep you alive in Him eternally? Are you, then, going two miles when compelled to go one? Or turning the other cheek? Are you loving and praying for them that hate you or mistreat you? Would you, if someone took your coat, also, give them your cloak? Are you living by the rule which Jesus Himself gave His followers: "Therefore All things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them; for this is the law and the prophets?"

Do you believe in Christ enough to go the way of sacrifice, the way of the cross, serving Him? Knowing the servant is not greater than His Lord and Master, do you believe that Jesus is King of Kings and also your elder brother, and that you will share in His inheritance?

Then does Jesus care, when I am weak and have fallen from the "strait and narrow way after Him? Yes, He cares; and the moment we reach out to Him, He takes our hand and lifts us up, saying to us (like He said to Peter) in loving reproach, "O, thou of little faith, wherefore didst thou doubt?"

LAMB COUNTY ACCIDENT REPORT

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of November, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed, three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$5,450.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eleven months of 1968 shows a total of 97 accidents resulting in seven persons killed, 33 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$72,130.00.

"DPS Statistical Services estimates that 19 persons will be killed in traffic accidents in the state during the Christmas period, with 14 fatalities estimated for the New Year's period," he added.

VASCAR, which stands for "visual average speed computer and recorder," is a computerized device carried in some Highway Patrol cars which enables the patrolman to accurately clock speeders moving in any direction, even while the patrol car is in motion.

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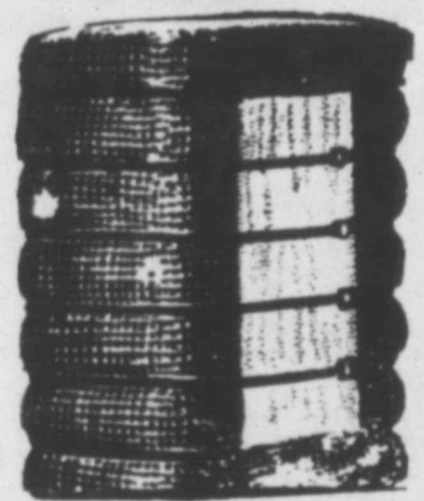
