Mr. Johnson Rites Today

A NEW BOOK has been published which sounds like it might be fun to read—a rarity in these days when books, like movies, are dirtier than ever. The book has the unlikely-sounding title of "Jump-Rope Rhymes," and is edited by Roger D. Abrahams of the University of Texas.

Robert E. Ford of the Associated Press recently reviewed Dr. Abrahams' book, and gave it some good plugs. He included some excerpts from the book. For example:

I had a little brother
His name was Tiny Tim.
I put him in the bathtub
To teach him how to swim.

He drank all the water.
He ate all the soap.
He died last night
With a bubble in his throat.

This sort of thing, supposedly is typical of rhymes little girls recite to match the rhythm of skipping rope.

Dr. Abrahams also includes:

Marilyn Monroe
Fell in the snow
Her skirts blew up
And the boys cried "oh!"

Professors are not allowed, by the rules of the game, to write things for fun. So Dr. Abrahams follows procedures and cites where the rhymes came from and the year and sometimes who published them before he did.

It is a good thing, too, for without such attribution no reader, at least not the males, would believe little girls, all sugar and spice and that sort of stuff, would ever create such material.

For instance, says Ford, some of the rhymes are painfully candid about human relations and human anatomy, leading to the conclusion that we don't need sex education in our schools but sex de-education instead.

Try this:

As I was walking by the lake,
I met a little rattlesnake.
I gave him so much jelly cake,
It made his little belly ache.

Among cynical ones:

I should worry, I should care,
I should marry a millionaire.
He should die, I would cry,
Then I'd marry a richer guy.

Oh, one more, if you insist:

Ladies and gentlemen,
To tell you the facts,
I lost my britches
On the railroad tracks.
They flew so high
Into the sky
They didn't come back
Till the Fourth of July.

The book is of obvious worth to teachers, sociologists, ministers, and particularly to child psychiatrists.

It makes good column material, too.

FARM BUREAU AGAINST PAY TV

Texas Farm Bureau organization has asked Texas Congressmen to oppose efforts to institute a nationwide system of pay television.

Sidney Dean of Victoria, Texas Farm Bureau President, in a letter to members of the Texas delegation to Congress, said, "We are greatly concerned about recent news which indicates that the Federal Communication Commission is going ahead with the intention of licensing such stations to begin pay television operations in the near future."

Dean asked the Congressmen to vote for proposed legislation which would amend the Communications Act of 1934 to provide that the FCC would not have the power to institute a nationwide system of pay television unless specifically authorized by Congress.

"Our Farm Bureau members in Texas have consistently been highly vocal in their objections to pay TV," Dean wrote. "Frankly, we didn't really believe that it would ever happen—or that

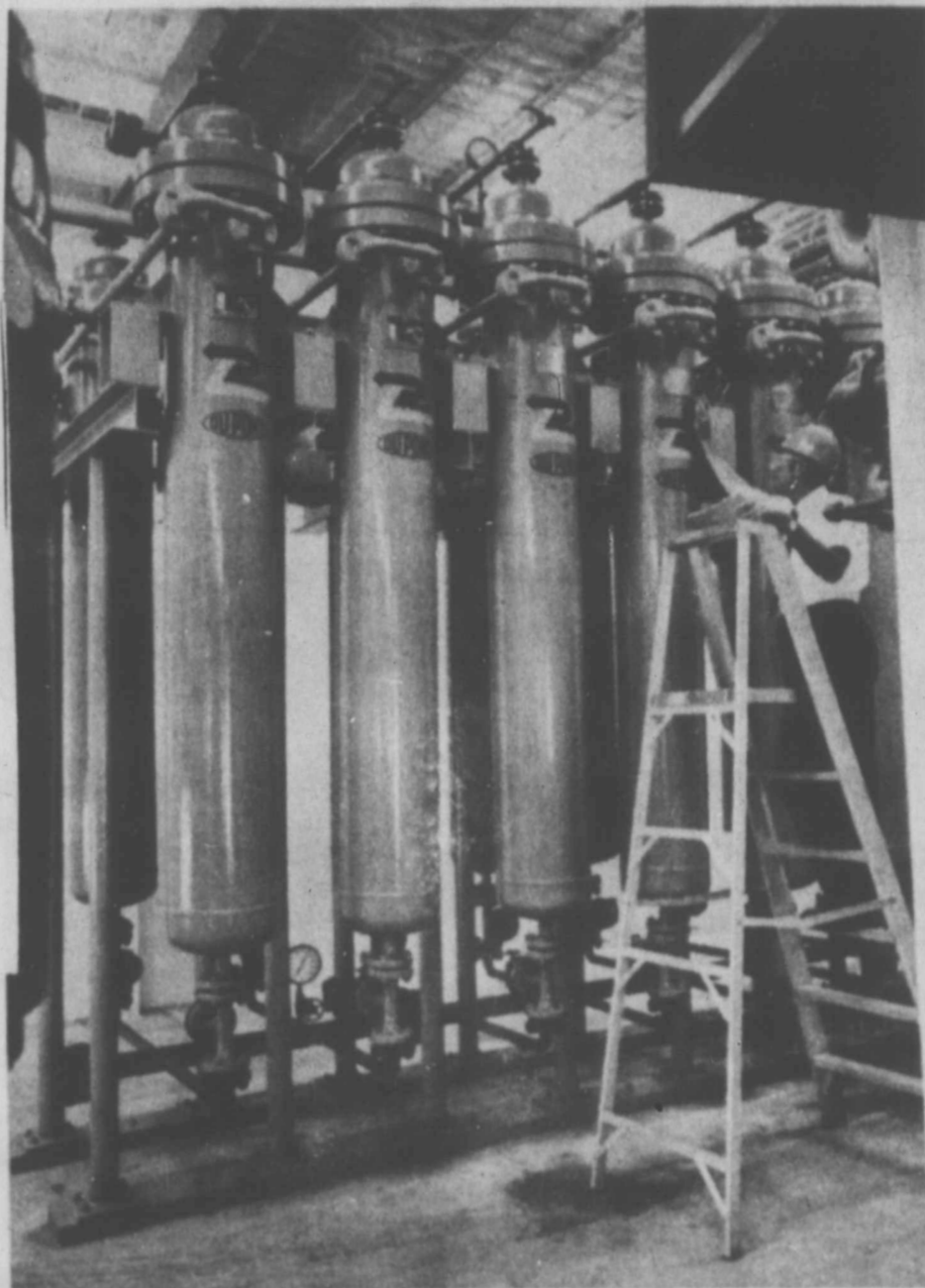
Congress would let it happen." Unless Congress intervenes, Dean said, the FCC's actions "may well mean the end of the kind of television programming our rural viewers now enjoy."

"There is no question in our minds that pay TV stations will outbid commercial stations for major sports shows, the best general entertainment programs, and movies which we now enjoy free of charge, the agricultural leader said. "This is the old foot-in-the-door approach with a very predictable and distasteful conclusion for most of us."

Dedication Of Desalting Plant

Brief ceremonies in Plains Tuesday marked the dedication of a 100,000-gallon-per-day desalting plant which will supply this small community with its first good drinking water from its own wells.

Mayor Roy Edwards, along with officials of the Office of Saline Water and the Du Pont Company, opened the plant, which converts brackish well water to potable drinking water.

Dr. Chung-ming Wong, Director of the Office of Saline Water, Washington, D. C., participated in the opening and referred to it as the culmination of 15 years of research and development.

Dr. Wong said that work on plants of this type was begun in 1954 under contracts granted by the Office of Saline Water, and has also been conducted by other firms working independently.

Mayor Edwards referred to the event as a milestone in the history of Plains and a point of departure for future growth of the city.

The desalting plant uses Du Pont "Permasep" permeators. They convert brackish water to potable water by reverse osmosis.

In a "Permasep" permeator, brackish water is pumped around

the outside of millions of nylon tubes, each smaller than a human hair. Each of these tubes has the ability to allow good water to pass through its surface, but to eliminate most of the dissolved solids which make water brackish.

Good water inside the tubes is collected and put into the distribution system. The dissolved solids are disposed of as a concentrated brine.

The permeator is a highly technical development, but its use in a plant operation is simple. Brackish water is pumped into the permeators at a pressure of 600 pounds per square inch, is desalted inside the permeators and placed into the water supply system.

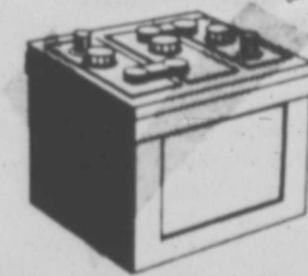

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of its issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

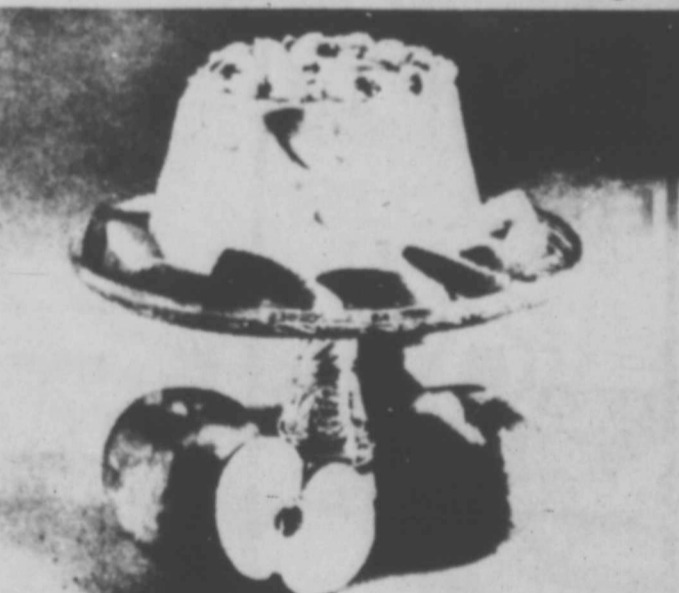
