"Most of the affluent around the nation are able to take their time paying their bills. Some occasionally don't pay them at all. Many of the rich build up huge charge accounts and pay no carrying charges on overdue bills, as most middle-class wage earners must."

There are some obvious reasons for this, such as the fact that the merchants don't want to lose the business of customers they know can pay for anything they order. Another reason is that many wealthy persons are oblivious of other people's financial problems. Still another is that the really rich travel a lot over the world and just finding them is sometimes a pretty good trick.

I started to say that I don't envy them their money, but that I do resent the fact that they don't have to pay late charges like I do. But I can't say that, I do, too, envy them their money. I wish I had it, all of it.

The Morton Indians went on the warpath Friday night and scalped the Sudan Hornets 13-3 at Morton. The Hornets scored first late in the first quarter when Jerry Bellar kicked a 29-yard field goal after the Hornets had attempted several unsuccessful drives into Indian territory.

The second quarter began as a defensive battle but the Indians began their scoring rampage about midway when QB Keith Embry tossed a 60 yard touchdown pass to Elton Patton. Mike Bryankicked the point after to give the Indians a 7 to 3 lead.

The Indian 25-yard line proved to be an invisible wall for the Hornets as they again drove to this point and lost the ball on downs late in the second quarter.

Coming back after half-time, the Hornets again went into Indian territory but were unable to gain the necessary yardage for a first down. The Indians had another piece of good luck as they blocked a Hornet pass and recovered the ball on the Hornet 21 yard line. However the Hornet defense tightened up and prevented the Indians from scoring.

Rex Boyles intercepted an Indian pass to start another Hornet drive as the third quarter ended. The Hornets did no better on the other end of the field as they were unable to get past the wall and lost the ball on downs.

The Indian line opened a hole for FB Ralph Soliz midway in the fourth quarter and he ran 52 yards for six points. Although the try for extra points failed, the Indians led 13-3.

The Hornets began another drive late in the fourth quarter when Johnny King recovered an Indian fumble on the 42 yard line. Again the Hornets failed to capitalize on the drive and lost the ball on fourth down around the 30 yard line.

Bellar was top ball carrier for the Hornets with 108 yards rushing. Larry Hanna was next with 94 yards. Sudan had 12 first downs to Morton's 11 and also outgained them in yardage 254-203.

The Hornets came home a dejected team after losing 13-3 and need the support of all the local fans as they go against the high-flying Seagraves Eagles here Friday night.

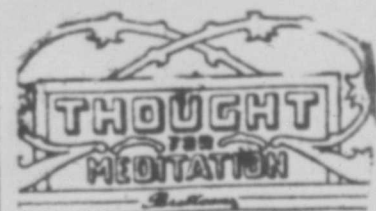

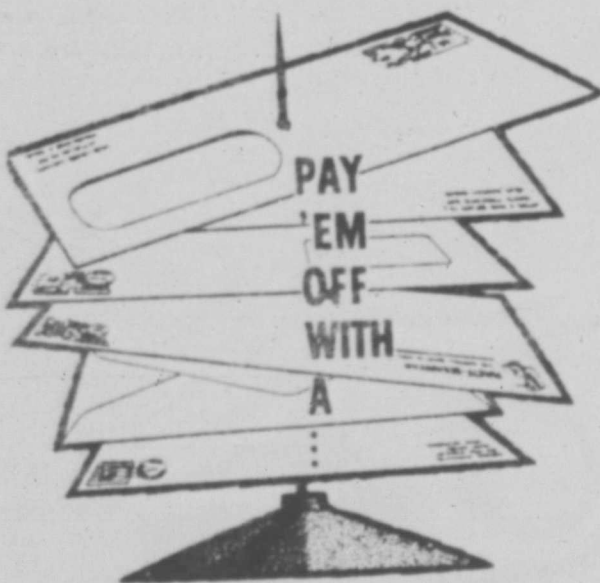

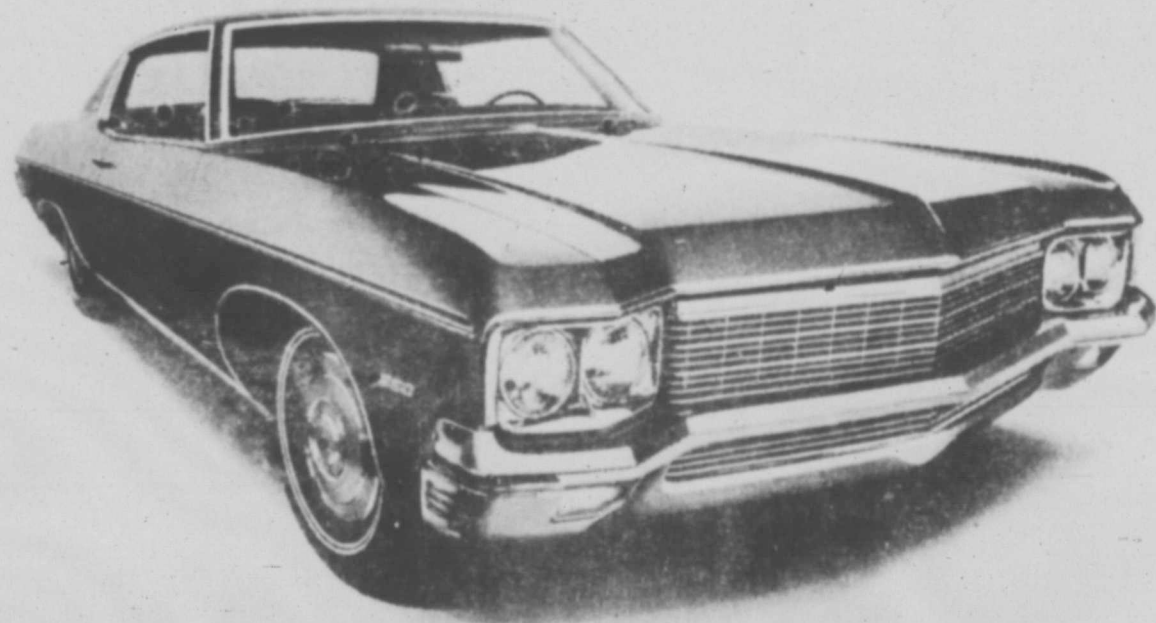
