Have you ever been approached by a phony "market rson or through the mail whose real object was to sell you magazines, insurance, ex-pensive books or a piece of land in Artsons or Florida?

Most likely you have, and the experience probably has left a bad taste in your mouth "Con artists" who pose as mar order to deliver high-press things difficult for legitimate researchers, according to the American Marketing Associa tion, Chicago.

1. A legitimate researcher will be able to identify himself and the research firm he office of the er'; or, 'corporate headquarters'." Many researchers who make house-tohouse calls carry ID cards. researcher probably will want to set up a future appointment, rather than simply going next door or callng another phone number at random. This is because your name has been so carefully selected.



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
