BICENTENNIAL TRAIN PASSES THROUGH SUDAN

A Santa Fe Railway diesel unit (5700) painted red, white and blue in honor of America's Bicentennial was in Sudan Wednesday, June 4 around 1:30 p.m.

Units 5700 and 5701, two of five with patriotic paint themes are touring this territory of the Santa Fe System.

The 391,000 pound rolling salutes to the nation's Bicentennial also are adorned with the Great Seal of the United States on their stowed and striped sides. The 3600-HP units regularly operate on Santa Fe's "Super C", the world's fastest freight train, between Chicago and Los Angeles.

Rites Held

Funeral services for George William (Tokie) Doty, 57, of Morton were held at 3 p. m. Monday in the Second and Taylor Street Church of Christ with Clyde Mansfield, minister, officiated.

A resident of Morton for 26 years, Doty was dead on arrival at Cochran Memorial Hospital about 6:35 p. m. Saturday. He suffered an apparent heart attack at the Bob's Roping Arena.

He was owner of the Doty Battery and Electric Company. A native of Gainesville, he lived in Sudan several years prior to moving to Morton. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and a veteran of WW II.

The Sudan Masons were honorary pallbearers and conducted graveside rites. They were assisted by the Morton Masonic Lodge members.

Beware Of Research Phonies

Have you ever been approached by a phony "market researcher" — by phone, in person or through the mail — whose real object was to sell you magazines, insurance, expensive books or a piece of land in Arizona or Florida?

Most likely you have, and the experience probably has left a bad taste in your mouth. "Con artists" who pose as market research interviewers in order to deliver high-pressure sales spiels continue to make things difficult for legitimate researchers, according to the American Marketing Association, Chicago.

1. A legitimate researcher will be able to identify himself and the research firm he or she works for. You won't hear things like, "This is so-and-so from the office of the publisher" or, "corporate headquarters." Many researchers who make house-to-house calls carry ID cards.
2. If you are too busy, a real researcher probably will want to set up a future appointment, rather than simply going next door or calling another phone number at random. This is because your name has been so carefully selected.

Questions will be detailed, and the interview may take considerable time — a half-hour is a good average. By contrast, a "phony" will ask two or three simple questions which require little or no thought, then shift into high gear on the "sales pitch."

If you feel you've been "victimized," or suspect a phony, the AMA suggests contacting your Better Business Bureau. Your action may discourage those misusing the term, "market research," and make the task of the "real McCoy's" a lot easier.

The AMA is an individual member professional association dedicated to the advancement of the science of marketing and marketing practices in the field. It has a worldwide membership in excess of 18,000, including marketing professionals from business and industry.
