LARGEST IN STATE

Missouri Beef Plans \$3 Million Project

Construction of a \$3 million beef packing plant near Friona was announced today by Missouri Beef Packers, Inc., and the Friona Chamber of Commerce.

> Expected to employ 250 people, the plant will be located on a 197 acre plot three and one-half miles southwest of Friona. The land was purchased from Sam Rundell by the Chamber of Commerce's industrial committee.

The beef processing plant will have the capability of being the largest of its kind in Texas and the Southwest. It will have the capacity to slaughter 7,000 cattle per week, or almost 1,500 per day.

Construction will begin in the near future. Officials hope that the plant will be in operation by April 1, 1968.

Addition of the beef plant further solidifies the market for the area's grain sorghum, and enhances the cattle feeding business in the area.

Cattle-feeding, which has just begun to come into its own, received a shot in the arm in Parmer County as two mammoth feeding operations have been announced within the past month.

One, with a future capacity of 50,000 head, is to be built west of Friona, and another with a possible 30,000 capacity, is to be built near Bovina.

The area already had one of the largest cattle feeding operations on the Plains, Friona Feed Yards, which operates at 27,500 capacity.

The new packing plant will add over \$1,000,000 annually in payrolls alone to the economy of the Friona area.


Presently, the largest packing concern in Texas is Neuhoff of Dallas, which slaughters slightly over 100,000 cattle annually. The plant to be built by Missouri Beef expects to slaughter almost 400,000 cattle per year.

The industrial committee of the Friona Chamber of Commerce, spearheaded by Dr. Loyd A. Shackelford, has worked fevershly on the packing plant project for the past six months. Other committee members are A. L. Black, Andy Hurst, Frank Spring and Jack Carrothers.


Missouri Beef Packers currently operates a plant in Rock Port, Missouri, which in slightly more than a year's time has started making a profit, something unheard of in the packing industry. Robert E. Frye, who formerly was connected with Iowa Beef Packers of Dennison, Iowa, is president of Missouri Beef Packers, Harry Nelson is vice-




Ground view of the Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. plant in Rock Port, Missouri.

president.

The members of the chamber's industrial committee, along with other interested citizens, have been in contact with Missouri Beef representatives several times in recent months.

Missouri Beef Packers, Inc., is an independent beef packer, and is comparative youngster in the packing business.

* * * * * * * *

Chartered on November 15, 1964, the young giant set up a company on a sound financial basis unequalled by any new large packer first entering the industry.

They handed the company to a young management team with experience, vigor and foresight. The team was aware that it was entering an industry wracked with adversity, but was fully alerted to the fact that the industry was and is going through its first major evolution in a century, offering tremendous potential for the new challenger.

In its first full year of production, Missouri Beef Packers slaughtered 302,057 cattle, had gross sales of over 84 million dollars (\$84,000,000) and operated at a profit.

The first full year of operation saw the company with a net income of \$325,852, equal to 90 cents per share, or an approximate annual rate of return on invested capital of 10 per cent.

The key to minimizing start-up costs and weathering adverse marketing conditions was to reach an efficient volume in less time than had ever been reached before. The company's procurement organization was supplying over 1,000 cattle per day for its production facilities in the third week of operation, and went on to exceed 1,500 per day. This helped keep start-up costs at a minimum.
