In the finals Saturday, April 29, at the SPC Track field, Sudan won the Regional Meet with 46 points. Amherst was runner up with 45.

The Hornets sprint relay win gave the team 20 points; Williams, 2nd place in the 100 and the mile relays 3rd place win added enough points to edge out Amherst and Roby.

The sprint relay team, Steve Ritchie, Bob Graves, John Miles and Joel Williams had a time of 44.3; Motley County had 44.4 and Amherst 44.5. Last years state was 44.2.

Joel Williams placed 2nd in the 100 yard dash and qualified for state with a time of 10.16. John Miles placed 4th with 10.43. John Miles came in 5th in the 220 with 23.0. Klondike was 1st with 22.2.

Sudan's mile relay, Mike Jones, Ricky Stanford, Joel Williams and Edgar Tomplin placed 3rd with 3:32.55, just barely missing the chance of going to state. Amherst placed 1st with 3:21.7 and Roby was 2nd with 3:28.25.

SPS Survey

According to Sam Thomas, manager of agriculture development for Southwestern Public Service Company, 4,373,850 fat cattle were produced in the SPS service area for 1977. This production, revealed in a recent survey conducted by SPS, is the third highest in the history of the industry.

The survey which has been conducted since 1963 is quoted throughout the United States as the most authoritative source as to production of fat cattle in the southern great plains area.

"During the 1977 period, the feedlot capacity came to 2,734,740 head and is barely 10,000 head under the peak year of 1974 when 2,742,250 capacity was in use. This dropped to a low of 2.6 million in 1976 and present indications are that the 1978 year will see a new peak in feedlot capacity use," stated Thomas.

The survey also revealed that the 1978 feedyards doing custom feeding was one less than the preceding year but that this represented the consolidation of reporting yards. The total number of yards surveyed continued to fall with a reduction of six from last year. This too, reflects a consolidation but is the eleventh year it has occurred. There were 274 yards counted in 1967 as compared to 153 in 1978.

"The total impact of the feedyard industry on the business community reached 8 billion dollars in 1977," Thomas stated, "and the farm sale value exceeded 2 billion dollars."

The survey also showed that the packing plant

annual slaughter capacity jumped from 4,990,680 to 5.4 million head and the number of plants increased from

17 to 20. Thomas also stated that 589,000 of this capacity is not in use but that this industry has made another estimated 8 billion dollar contribution to area business.

"The future of the feedlot industry appears to be the brightest of any period in its history, and this may not be good. Too many people believe this and with great majority acting together adverse reactions can occur. The price being paid for feeder cattle is a case in point," emphasized Thomas.

Eventually the customer must be considered as to what he will do and we could have poor profits along with good prices if the customer refuses to go along with all this enthusiasm, Thomas said.

This survey has made a major contribution to the development and growth of the industry and has been especially valuable in the vertical integration that has occurred in the SPS service area, concluded Thomas.

Sudan Community Improvement Program

TWENTY MOST IMPORTANT IMPROVEMENTS ACCOMPLISHED THIS YEAR

1. The annexation of seven acres of land into the corporate city limits.
2. Construction of a ten unit housing complex is to begin in the very near future. This housing will be located on the seven acre tract annexed into the City. Other new houses are currently under construction in the City, as well as the rural area of our Community.
3. Our new Post Office facility is under construction at the present time with completion anticipated by July, 1978.
4. Southwestern Public Service Company is in the process of beginning construction on its new Coal Powered Electrical Generating plant, located some ten miles to the Northwest of Sudan. This plant will require the building of a paved road to the site as well as a railroad spur for the unloading of coal at the new facility. Present plans call for an additional coal powered plant to be built at the same location as soon as the first is completed.
5. The runway at the City Airport was reworked and repaved this year.
6. The opening of six new businesses in the City of Sudan this year, including Chester Irrigation, Lance Cotton Office, Nix and Humphreys Gallery, Nix Department Store, West Elevator, and Bandy Trailer Park. Each of these involved businesses has accomplished either major or minor remodeling and cleanup.
7. The sponsorship of a monthly music festival which provides a wide variety of musical entertainment for the entire family and has attracted much interest and enthusiasm from area residents as well as local townspeople.
8. The organization of the Sudan Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture which has already become a vital part of our Community's life and activities.
9. The repairing and painting of the old Hotel Building, which is the new home of our County Museum.
10. Repainting of art work on fronts of vacant buildings along the Main Street, as well as the local canine restrooms -fire plugs).
11. The participation of every church in Sudan through varying degrees of remodeling.
12. Cleaning of a portion of the vacant lots in town-some of which have since had houses moved on them from the rural area.
13. The painting, exterior and interior, and installation of paneling at the Community Center; a project completed through the efforts of our local Lions Club.
14. Installation, by the City, of new stop signs.
15. Along Highway 303 North, Central Compress did extensive repairs to cotton warehouses-this greatly enhanced the view on that side of town.
16. The Sands Cafe at the East edge of Sudan was given a complete fact life when it opened under new management. Cardwell Flying Service built a new combination hanger and office building; while our local convenience store, under new management is presently in the process of remodeling its building.
17. The local Volunteer Firemen's meeting room has been remodeled.
18. Installation of Dempster Dumpsters throughout the entire town was completed in February 1978. This project's completion not only caused trash to no longer be burned in alleyways; but collections from dumpsters is removed to another town to be placed in a Sanitary Landfill, increasing the number of years for which our city's landfill can be used.
19. Our local school system continued its policy of remodeling and repairing the physical plant, keeping it the best maintained school in this area.
20. A 21'x9' mural, depicting the history of the Sudan school system was painted in the School Library in March, April and May. Mickey Stephens, of Sudan, a nationally known sculptor and watercolorist donated the mural.

 1 jar (12 oz.) apricot preserves
 1 envelope (1.37 oz.) dehydrated onion soup mix
 3 tablespoons original Worcestershire sauce
 2 chickens (2-1/2 lbs. each), cut in serving pieces
 Preheat oven to 350° F. In a small bowl combine apricot preserves, onion soup mix, and Worcestershire sauce. Place chicken in a shallow baking pan. Spoon sauce over chicken. Bake, uncovered, for one hour. Increase oven temperature to 450° F. Bake 10 minutes longer. 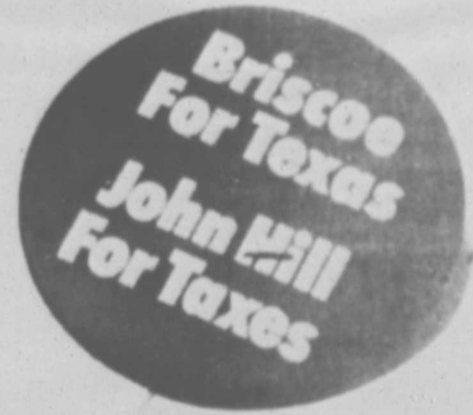

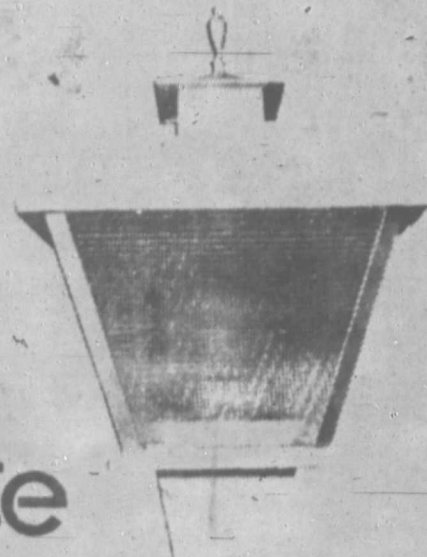



Refreshments of sandwiches, assorted crackers, cookies, lemonade and coffee were served.


