School Board Meets

The Sudan School Board met Monday, July 10 in a regular meeting. The invocation was given by Glen Cardwell.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The Superintendent's financial report for the month of June was approved. The Tax Collector's report was given and a report as to the state of the delinquent tax collection was given.

The preliminary budget for 1978-79 school year was discussed and some areas of work were added to the planned budget. The tax rate for 1978-79 was set at \$1.75 per \$100 evaluation.

The bond purchase for the beginning of the school year was approved, as was the purchase of supplies and equipment for the science department.

A report was given to the Board as to the cost of the driver education program for the summer.

It was reported to the Board as to the work progress in the bus barn and the elementary plumbing of the steam lines.

The teacher in-service expenses were approved for the 1978-79 school year.

The plans for the construction of a ticket booth area were approved for the football field area.

The decision to enter into a lease plan for the equipment to teach the computer mathematics for 1978-79 was made and the program will be taught this year in the Sudan Schools.

It was the decision of the Board to replace the scoreboard in the gymnasium with a new Fair Play Scoreboard.

Services Offers Film Tips

Camera buffs are urged to properly prepare film being sent through the mail for processing to help preserve those precious summer photographic memories.

Each year, according to Postmaster Joan Ford, thousands of film packages end up in dead letter offices throughout the country because of careless wrapping and addressing, often resulting in a missing pictorial record of vacation trips.

The following tips will help ensure safer handling of film while in the mail stream.

Place film cartridges in sturdy envelopes. When possible use the envelopes usually supplied by film processing companies.

Make sure that the processor's mailing address as well as a return address are written legibly on the outside envelope. Use Zip Codes.

As an extra precaution, tape your name and address to the film roll or cartridge before inserting it in the envelope. Your name and address should be written also on the back of any photographs being sent in for retouching, copying or other purposes, Postmaster Ford said.

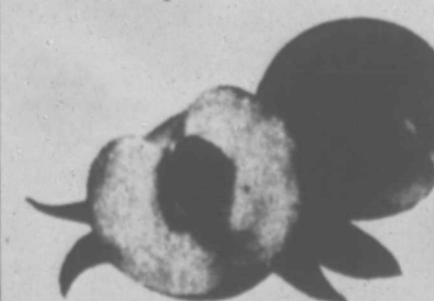
