Hornets Revenge Matadors, 30-0

The one-two punch of Bob Graves and John Miles together with an impressive defensive performance by the entire Sudan squad was too much for the Motley CO. Matadors as they fell to the Hornets Friday night by a 30-0 count. The inspired Hornets allowed the Matadors only 123 yards total offense and held them to 99 yards rushing. The defensive secondary had an outstanding night picking off 5 Motley Co. passes. Free safety, Victor King had two interceptions, John Miles, Mike Jones and Odell Johnson, one each.

The first quarter was a defensive struggle until Miles picked off a Motley County pass and returned it to the Matador 38 yard line. A clipping penalty on the play brought the ball back into Hornet territory on the 47. From there the Hornets put together their first offensive drive with Graves getting runs of 12 & 10 yards and Miles 22 & 14, before scoring from the 3. The extra point was wide and the Hornets had a 6-0 lead. In the second quarter, Graves gained 105 of his 148 yards and had a scoring dash of 30 yards. With 5:22 left in the half, Line Backer, Odell Johnson scampered into the end zone with an interception to spot the Hornets to an eighteen point lead. Sudan put the icing on the cake in the third quarter with an eleven yard touch down by Graves and a 15 yard 6 pointer from Miles.

For the second consecutive week, outstanding defensive performances were turned in by Lineman, Mike DeLoach and Ivan Gipson. The Hornets rushed for 430 yards with Miles collecting 197, Graves 148 and Victor King 85.

The win ups the Hornets record to 3-1 with a tough Farwell squad coming up Friday night.

Ambulances Purchased

The communities of Earth, Sudan and Olton will each have new ambulances for emergency service, due to action taken by the Lamb County Commissioners Court last Friday.

Each community will receive a van type ambulance on a 138 wheel base, 40 gallon gas tank and a 54 inch inside clearance from roof to top.

Three bids were received, two from Ford dealers, and one from a Dodge representative. Although the Dodge bid was lower than the other two, the Ford dealers offered longer length, better suited for ambulance service, and in

Commissioners Court Meet

The Lamb County Commissioners were presented a petition last Friday by the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce, asking the Commissioners Court to consider re-districting the precinct within the county.

State law requires counties to periodically re-district precincts in accordance with population. Each precinct must not have more or less than two percent difference with other precincts in the county.

The petition read: "To the Honorable Commissioners of Lamb County, Texas. Whereas, the law of the land is the one man, one vote principle, and Whereas, such principle applies to county precincts as well as the political subdivisions of the State and Nation, and Whereas, it has come to my attention that the precincts in Lamb County, Texas do not comply with the one man, one vote rule and because of the fact that the city of Littlefield, Lamb County, Texas has less than their fair share of the Commission by reason of dilution, therefore, I LeMoine Grissom, a resident of Littlefield, Lamb County, Texas, do hereby request that the County Commissioners of Lamb County, Texas re-district the county precincts in accordance with the law and the one man one vote principle."

Presently the county is divided into four precincts, with each having the same amount of lateral road miles. This leaves 44 percent of the county's population in precinct three, having about 8,000 people. Each other precinct has about 3,000 each.

If the county is re-districted, Littlefield would have two commissioners, while the rest of the county would be divided up between the other commissioners. The law states that not less than four commissioners will serve a county.

Presently money for county use is divided into four ways, in accordance to the road miles, making three precincts with 3,000 people draw as much as as one precinct with 8,000.

Also the county draws revenue sharing money on the number of population. This money is also divided four ways, according to road miles, however Littlefield has less road miles taken care of by the county than does the other precincts.

After some discussion the commissioners stated that the re-districting would not be as easy as just going by population. They cannot divide ethnic groups if it would the re-districting would not be as easy as just going by change all the voting precincts and Justice of the Peace precincts.

The commissioners will have to decide on a plan and send it to the Justice Department in order for it to be approved before they can ever proceed with the plan. Also a public hearing must be held in each community in the county before re-districting can be done.

You might keep it straight and report matter-of-factly that "I began losing my stuff in the 30th inning" and hope she buys your story. But, if you are lucky like Eddie King, accounting director for General Telephone Company of the Southwest, the local newspaper along with the New York Times, New York Herald, Newsweek, several other publications and the major wire services will help you out of the doghouse by reporting your whereabouts.

Otherwise you might be in trouble.

King, longtime softball pitcher in amateur softball leagues, had the experience when he pitched 25 innings of the 31 inning game recorded as the longest national tournament softball game. The game occurred during the 19th game of the National Softball Tournament in Clearwater, Fla., Sept. 24, 1963.

During the game, King walked one batter, intentionally allowed only eight hits and struck out 25 in leading the 10 time National Champion Clearwater, Fla. Bombers to a 4 to 3 victory over the Portland, Ore. Beavers.

King started his softball career in St. Petersburg, Fla. and played for the Clearwater Bombers of Clearwater, Fla. 14 years before taking a one year retirement after which he played another two years. The telephone accountant estimates he pitched over 3,200 innings in over 500 games for Clearwater. He first started pitching for Clearwater in 1955.

Highlights of his softball years include an invitation in 1966 by the Venezuela Softball Association to conduct a 10 day softball pitching clinic.

He was named to the Amateur Softball National tournament All Star Team six times during his career with the Clearwater Bombers. He participated in eighteen National Tournaments.

The Hardship of Accounting
Robert Frost, 1930

Intentional or not, Mr. Frost's lighthearted defense of inept accounting was tailor-made for the federal government, especially some agencies of the government. Take Amtrak, for example. Back on May 1, 1971 Amtrak began operating government subsidized passenger trains under the Rail Passenger Service Act of 1970.

The law envisioned limited, interim federal funding. It had two goals: first, to breathe new life into a passenger train system that was failing rapidly and, second, to turn passenger train service back into a profit-making venture.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen shared with his colleagues the dream of revitalizing and rejuvenating passenger train service in this country and worked hard to see that Texans could participate in the rail renaissance.

But the dream has gone soft.

Beyond question the service has improved, in terms of sheer numbers at any rate. The basic Amtrak system has grown from 23,000 miles in 1971 to 27,000 miles last year. But in Texas, and in most other states, there are so few trains running to so few cities that not many people take the trouble to use this mode of travel.

And the cost of even this limited service has mushroomed to the point that there is no way the taxpayer can be asked to foot the bill for an expanded service.

It is time someone stood up for the taxpayer!

In 1971 he was asked to cover a \$22.7 million operating deficit for the infant Amtrak system. Instead of decreasing as the law envisioned, though, the deficit has grown tremendously over the past seven years. Last year the deficit reached \$521.6 million -- a 2300 percent increase!

In 1971, Amtrak passenger revenues covered almost half of total operating costs; today the tickets that passengers buy cover only 37.4 percent of the costs.

In spite of Robert Frost's admonition to "Never ask of money spent where the spender thinks it went," "We think it is time to re-examine the passenger train program and put a stop to the seemingly endless spiral of increasing federal subsidies.

If those in Congress lack the courage to trim back on deficit spending such as this, there is no hope that they will ever be able to balance the federal budget.

The Inter-American has consistently been among the least productive in the Amtrak system, according to the Department of Transportation. Its operating losses last year came to nearly \$10 million. For every \$1 paid by passengers who rode it, taxpayers who didn't ride it paid an additional \$3.72.

Although he worked hard to secure this route for Texas, Bentsen's experience has shown that the revenue customers are simply not there. The only responsible action is to put an end to the enormous taxpayer subsidy of this and other unsuccessful routes.

So few people want to ride a train from Chicago to Mexico City or from New York to Los Angeles these days that it would be easier on the taxpayer if we gave them all a free plane ticket.
