Do you remember four years

assassinated. For some time we have intended to put on paper what we were doing at the time, and what our reactions were to the announcement of the tragedy. Since we all like to relate ourselves to important dates, maybe you'll enjoy comparing your recollections to ours.

The noon hour that Friday was drawing to a close, and we were preparing to go back to the office. I had joined Carol in catching up on the latest episode of that great noon-time soap opera "As the World Turns," whose ending usually signals the return to the work.

However, like most Fridays after we have published a paper, I had gotten off to work in a rush that morning, and hadn't taken time to shave. I decided to do so before returning to the office.

It was while tending this menof the shaving cream on my face, that the first announcement was made on television,

The announcer broke into the program, about 1:10 p.m .-- and we knew by the tone of his voice that it wasn't an ordinary "bulletin." Being aware of the president's current good-will visit to Texas, we were fearful of what we were about to

And our fears were quickly verified as the announcer said "Ladies and gentlemen, we have received word that President Kennedy has been shot by a sniper while riding in a motor- Mrs. Elvin Wilson of Friona, cade in downtown Dallas. He has been rushed to a Dallas at Tech, where he also has been hospital."

Immediately we began praying "Lord, grant that this not be a fatal wound. Let it not happen here in our home state."

But it happened, and President Kennedy was dying, or perhaps already dead at Dallas' Parkland Hospital. We switched channels on the TV set in search of later news, The other networks were just putting on their first bulletins. It seemed that CBS had "scooped" the others by a few minutes.

We stayed with the television ers. set, rather than going back to the office. Our first impression in the seed analysis division, about the tragedy was soon reflected on TV. The program in progress had stopped for all practical purposes, and the moderator and his guests discussed the awful announcement,

One of the guests was from Texas, and the announcer said, perhaps for all Americans "We know that this is disturbing news to you, since Texas is your home state." And the TV guest replied "Yes, and we can only hope that it will not be a bad wound, and that the president will be all right."

All of our hopes were soon dashed, however, as the announcement of the president's death was not long in coming. We've forgotten just how long, in the intervening years.

We went on back to the office, and from thence to the office of Plains Publishers, which had an Associated Press news wire for use of the Lovington Leader, which it printed,

In that manner we followed the bulletins, which were coming thick and fast by this time, Shortly a bulletin told of the fatal shooting of a Dallas police officer, and then of the capture of Lee Harvey Oswald in the Dallas movie theatre.

We remember how upset the townspeople were, as we went for a cup of coffee at Bi-Wize Drug. Several were still gathered around the TV set there. as news was still coming from Dallas and the assassination events were falling into place,

The next two days were like a nightmare, with all the TV coverage of the event, I had planned to go to a bi-district football game at Muleshoe that night, Muleshoe vs Denver City. But Carol, caught up in the anxiety of the event, urged me to stay home.

It was as if we had been under attack by the Martians, She was fearful that something else dreadful might happen. So we



J.H. Boyle Finds Paper Dated 1831

How the newspaper came to be in the package, and how it survived for more than a century is a mystery.

The paper, called "The Genius of Liberty", was published in Union Town, Pa., dated December 27, 1831. It is remarkably well - preserved, printed on paper made of high rage content, not at all brittle, and highly readable.

The newspaper's advertising rates were given as \$1 for three insertions not exceeding a "square", and 25 cents for each subsequent insertion.

It was the maiden issue under new ownership, and the new editor apologized for the delay in the current issue, saying "Having been disappointed in the receipt of the new type, which is on the way frozen up somewhere on the Ohio river, we are compelled this week to issue the paper on the old type."

He gave a report of a "Democratic meeting" which was "Large and respectable and composed of the stoutesthearts and strongest patriots of the party. There were no Tories, no perjured villians, no cutthroats; they were as far as every week, and includes light we can judge, honest men.

An obituary was carried, steeped in the flowery style of the times. It stated in part: "In the 74th year of his age, after a severe illness of two weeks, which he bore with silence and Christian fortitude."
