"To secure additional account numbers means possible loss in benefits to the individual as well as causing the government unnecessary expense in establishing a new account," he said.

"Since no one number can be assigned to two different individuals, any employee for whom two accounts are established prohibits forever the Board using the extra account number assigned for anyone else."



#### Q. When may turkeys be vaccinated for fowl pox?

A. The vaccination is easily given when the birds are removed from the brooder house when they are between six to ten weeks of age.

#### Q. How much fresh water does a dairy cow need?

A. A cow should drink a minimum of about five gallons of water for each gallon of milk she produces, although many cows will drink more. Even when dry, dairy cows need a regular supply of clean, fresh water.

#### Q. How does the value of wool produced by the angora rabbit compare with that of sheep?

A. On a dollar-and-cents basis, the angora rabbit out-produces the sheep. The rabbit clipped five times per year will produce about twelve ounces of wool, which would have a value of approximately six dollars on today's market.

#### Q. How many pigs must be marketed from each litter to pay for the production costs of the litter?

A. Long-term records from the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company indicate that when farrowing two litters per year, the returns from five pigs per litter are required for payment of production costs of the entire litter.

#### Q. How great is the financial damage caused by weeds?

A. The extent of financial loss caused by weeds is indicated by the fact that seeds of cockle and bulblets of wild onion and garlic annually cost Southern Illinois wheat growers \$350,000.

#### MOVED BY THE PLIGHT OF EUROPE'S MILLIONS, GOVERNMENT SUGGESTS WAYS OF HELPING THEM

Washington—Mindful of the plight of the hungry millions in Europe the Federal government Sunday offered these suggestions on how you could help them:

1. If you're a housewife—  
Never throw a piece of bread or a teaspoonful of fat away.  
Make sure the garbage consists only of bones, eggshells and the inedible parts of fruits and vegetables.  
Don't overeat.  
Never over-serve a guest.  
Don't fry meats, poultry, fish. Bake, boil or stew them.

#### Fresh Fruit Recommended.

Use fresh fruit for dessert, not pastries.  
Serve homemade salad dressing, vinegar or lemon juice, not rich salad dressing.  
Use meat drippings to flavor vegetables, dressings, sauces.  
Store bread in moisture-proof wrapping in refrigerator. This retards mold.

Use dry, leftover bread in toast, puddings and stuffings.  
Serve open-faced sandwiches. Or better still, serve a vegetable salad, such as potato or bean, in its place.

Give each person only one small slice of bread at a meal.  
Cut out dry cereals as much as possible. Use potatoes (a fine breakfast dish) and oatmeal.

#### Proposals for Men.

2. If you're a man—  
Don't overeat.  
Eat all they serve you at a restaurant.  
Stay away from pastries. Order fruit instead.  
Plant a vegetable garden.  
Be a one-man information bureau. Spread the word around that the world food situation is critical and will remain that way for at least three months.

3. Everybody—  
Cut down on waste. The Department of Agriculture estimates that one slice of bread in every loaf is wasted. This alone would give 2,500,000 people in Europe three-fourths of a pound a day.

And remember that that help can only come from you.

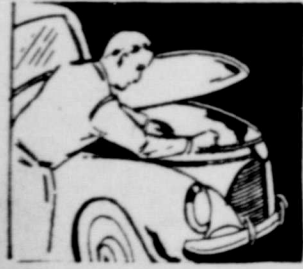

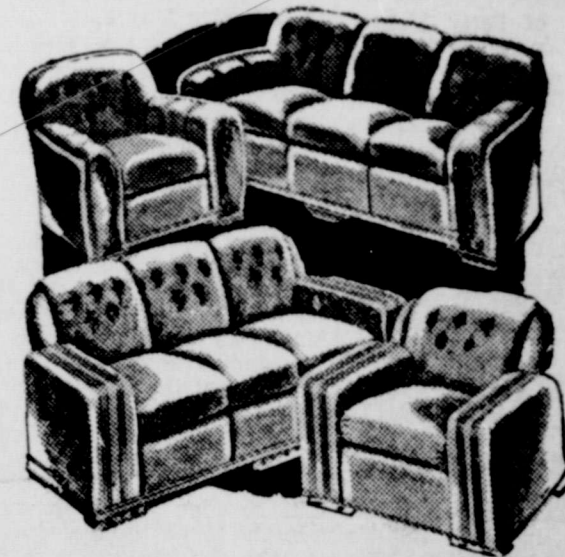

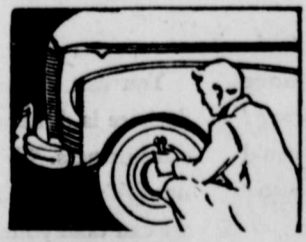

### Cotton Is Texas Chief Hope

Dallas—Cotton offers Texas its chief hope for increased production of feeds critically needed by livestock in 1946, the Texas Cotton Production Committee said today.

Prospective plantings of other major feed crops in Texas for 1946, compared with 1945, indicate reduction of 8 per cent in corn, 10 per cent in all sorghums, 5 per cent in oats, 10 per cent in peanuts and 6 per cent in all tame hay, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

"Increased cotton acreage and production can do much to offset these decreases in feed crop plantings by supplying more cottonseed meal, cake and hulls for livestock on Texas farms and ranches," the Committee pointed out.

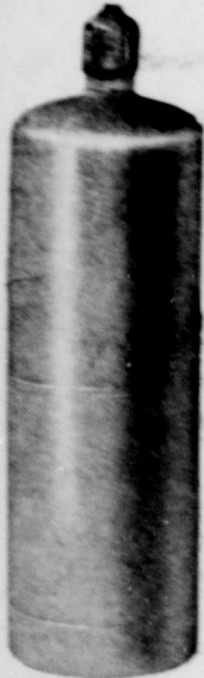

### LOOKING AHEAD

Education, or the lack of it, gets blamed for about all the world's ills. It is pretty generally agreed that the peoples of Earth need teaching, or perhaps re-teaching. Moreover it is not much trouble in any company to start a free-for-all discussion about the science of education. In fact there are some who insist that teaching is an art and not a science at all.

Some commentators crusade for penetrating study in narrow fields of learning while others whoop-it-up for wider browsing ranges. Both philosophies can be run to extremes. Over done, specialization gets people in ruts while versatility, gone wild, leads men's minds a waggish-waggish. Surely there is a happy medium, seeing that both extremes are selfish and quite shortsighted.

George William Curtis once wrote: "While good men sit at home, not knowing that there's anything to be done, nor caring to know, half persuaded that this republic is the contemptible rule of a mob and secretly longing for some splendid and vigorous despotism... remember that it is not a government mastered by ignorance! It is a government betrayed by intelligence."

We have a sad state of affairs indeed when intelligent people realize that things are taking place which they suspect are very bad for the country, yet fail to take a hand in remedying matters. Preserving the personal liberty of all people ought to be every man's personal duty. Those who have been without freedom consider its safety a high moral obligation.

Some men have deep learning in fields that do not embrace history, government or economics. Others have gained far-flung knowledge without sensing the duties of citizenship or any obligation toward other people. Curtis' long life ended before this century began but he saw the political dangers of this day with amazing clearness: "Betrayed by intelligence," he said.

The notion that nation may be governed, not by a ruler but by the people themselves, was not new in Mr. Curtis' time. Our own republic was hardly half as old as now when he began writing for "Harper's Monthly." Otherwise he had all the examples we have. One big difference in his generation and ours is this: They still appreciated their freedom.

Students of this age would not be helped much by a "speaking acquaintance" with more arts. Neither is there a crying need for deeper penetration, for have we not lately opened the potent atom? Consolidating our recent scientific gains and preserving

Clayton, N. M.—His neighbors called Leck Burke as a dour, cautious individual who got a start here years ago with money saved from his pay as a \$20-a-month cowboy.  
Later, as a successful rancher, he shunned participation in community affairs and, contrary to the country custom, was not close with those living near-by. **OPA Hikes Prices On GM Cars**

Washington—OPA Tuesday raised retail price ceilings for General Motors automobiles by \$16 to \$60 to compensate for wage increases in the industry.

The price hikes, effective immediately, ranged from \$16 to \$30 on Pontiac and Oldsmobile models; from \$24 to \$60 on Cadillacs.

The increase is \$18 for the only Chevrolet model which had been priced earlier on the basis of manufacturing costs prior to the wage increase of 18 1/2 cents hourly recently granted by GM. The one model given a ceiling previously was the Chevrolet Stylemaster four-door sedan.

On other Chevrolet models being priced for the first time, retail ceilings range from \$51 to \$68 above 1942 prices.

### Vocational Rehabilitation And Farm Security Join Forces In Giving Aid Handicapped Rural Residents

Under a cooperative agreement between the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation and the Farm Security Administration have joined in setting forth policies and guides for pooling State and agency facilities to help physically and mentally handicapped rural residents to overcome their disabilities and enter agricultural pursuits for livelihood, according to a statement from O. E. Benham, local head.

The joint agreement at the Federal level was announced today by Michael J. Lley, director of the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, and B. Lasseter, Farm Security Administrator.

The heads of the two Federal agencies said that formal working agreements between State vocational rehabilitation agencies and field offices of the Farm Security Administration already have been signed in Alabama, Georgia, Florida, and South Carolina.

Informal agreements are in effect in 11 northeastern states and in several other southern and western states, Shortley and Lasseter said.

Georgia, Florida, Alabama and South Carolina, the Farm Security Administration already referred 822 persons to vocational rehabilitation agencies. Of this number 497 were accepted as clients and started on the road to employment as farmers or in restoration such as surgery and artificial limbs was needed in 257 cases," Shortley said.

Under the agreements, rural residents with job handicaps resulting from illness, accidents or

he was ashamed that he couldn't pay for an operation."

Not all defects come to light like Jim Black's, but it is safe to say that many other "lazy" or "shiftless" farm men and women actually have physical or mental defects, Shortley and Lasseter said. They pointed out that the combined services of OVA and FSA are available to these handicapped people.

Joint services of OVA and FSA have been tested informally in the field for a year. Pooling of the two facilities was found to be effective in overcoming the lack of social agencies in remote rural districts and in finding larger numbers of eligible disabled residents.

Vocational rehabilitation services are provided by existing State agencies, and Farm Security Administration services are performed by field representatives. Personnel of each organization are familiar with the services available from each.

The Federal Government finances all administrative expenditures incurred by the States in vocational rehabilitation, and shares with them on a 50-50 basis the costs of medical treatment, vocational training and similar services.

A client may receive without charge general medical examinations by any qualified physician, X-rays, psychological tests, job counseling and training. Physical restoration, maintenance during training, transportation, instructional supplies, occupational equipment and licenses are provided from public funds to the extent that the client is unable to pay from his own pocketbook.

The Farm Security Administration will consider clients for supervised credit to make a new start in agriculture. FSA services include assistance in preparing a sound farm and home plan; providing necessary loan funds for the purchase of farms, farm equipment and supplies, and guidance and on-the-farm training by experienced supervisors on all problems of farm and home management.

Explaining the manner in which their agencies operate under the cooperative agreement, Shortley and Lasseter said: "The State vocational rehabilitation agencies will determine whether persons referred by the Farm Security Administration are eligible for vocational rehabilitation and will notify the FSA. If the individuals are judged eligible, all necessary rehabilitation services will be provided.

"Disabled persons declared capable of farming by the vocational rehabilitation agency and referred to the FSA will be given consideration for loans and other services of the organization similar to other residents of the community.

"The FSA through its field personnel will consult with State vocational rehabilitation personnel concerning training, employment and business opportunities, and aid in evaluating such opportunities with respect to farming and agricultural enterprises."

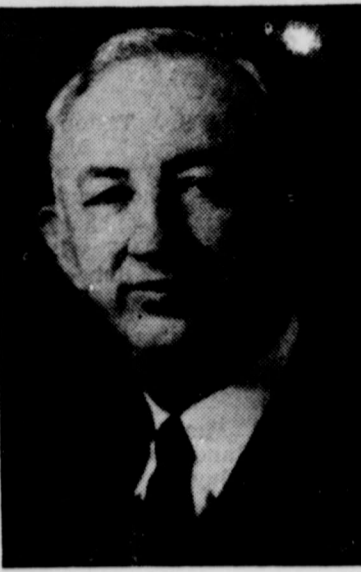
