

Silk Stockings For You— From Texas

The Lone Star State is out to end Japan's silk monopoly and provide America with a new major industry!

The enterprising citizens of Mineral Wells believe that within five years Texas will have about 1,000,000 acres devoted to sericulture—the production of silk. In a June Coronet article, "Silk Stockings For You—From Texas!" Willard C. Haselbush tells that with this revolutionary impetus from Texas, silk will become a No. 1 American enterprise.

The new industry will provide jobs for thousands of wounded and incapacitated war veterans, for the crippled and the blind. Coronet also prophesies that there will be a huge cash crop for farmers who can plant anything from a few rows to hundreds of acres of mulberry trees.

Mineral Wells' unique venture began in 1944—and by last December they had acquired 63,000 leaf producing trees, raised more than 1,000,000 worms, turned out hosiery made of Texas silk, and found up the year with corporate assets \$6,000 greater than the initial investment.

The project's success is due largely to the imagination of Mineral Wells' Chamber of Commerce, Ernest Mims, and the enthusiasm of Walter Scott Roberts, president of the American Raw Silk Corporation. The company now controls a new electronic reeling machine which will do to Japan's world silk

669,000 Yards Of Parachute Silk Offered To Federal Agencies And Veterans

Approximately 669,000 yards of parachute silk will be offered to Federal agencies and veterans in a 20-day sale, running from June 7, 1946, through 27, 1946. War Assets Administration announced today.

Offering of this fabric will be made simultaneously in the Regional offices of WAA to federal agencies purchasing for their own use and veterans purchasing for use in their own small business. It is anticipated that orders from these claimants will exceed the total inventory.

The sale will be at fixed price of \$2.50 per yard F. O. B., Topeka, Kansas, with a minimum sale established at approximately 1,000 yards and maximum sale at approximately 10,000 yards.

The entire lot of silk is stored at Topeka, Kansas, but each of the regional offices will have samples to show prospective purchasers.

Disposal of the lot will be through the WAA regional office, Troost Avenue and Bannister Road, Kansas City, Mo. Purchasers from all regions may send their orders direct to the Kansas City office.

Cash is not to be forwarded at the time the purchase order is placed. Each customer will be notified as to the amount of fabric allocated, an remittance is to be made on receipt of such notification. Purchase orders are to be sent in duplicate, using purchasers letter head or order blanks.

The silk is approximately 36 inches in width. Each roll contains from 300 to 400 yards and is natural, unbleached white in color. It has not been given a "slip-page resistant" finish. The weave is two up and one down twill, and the weight is approximately 1.6 ounces per square yard.

Experts have known for years that mulberry trees could be grown and that silkworms could thrive almost anywhere in the world, says the Coronet article. But no country could compete against Japan's low labor costs. Beckman's machine produces in two hours as much silk as the Oriental system turns out in three days. It's better silk and actually cheaper... even when the costs are based on the white man's high wage and hour standards.

Millions of silkworm eggs now in cold storage at Mineral Wells will be hatched next spring. Already Texas silk has been manufactured into hosiery and fabrics, while applications for raw material have poured in from manufacturers all over the country. Meantime the Mineral Wells business men are looking for more land and more mulberry trees.

They claim that the American silk industry will be nationwide in five years. Their success in Texas, declares Coronet in conclusion, is proof of what can be done almost anywhere else in the United States!

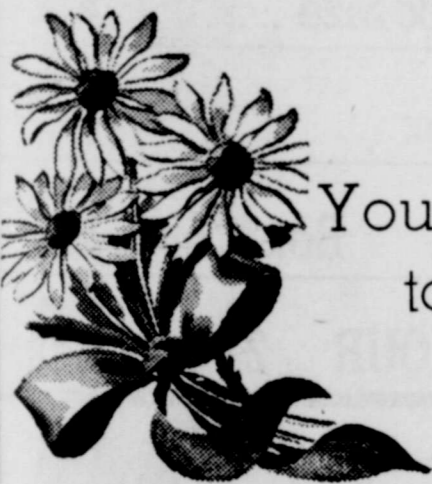

McLEAN Lions Club will spend \$100 promoting a softball program this summer. E. A. Kimmins is chairman of the new program which will include 12 teams.

ANOTHER step has been taken to lower fire insurance rates at Erick, Okla., the purchase of a new fire siren to be installed atop the city hall. Erick recently purchased a new fire truck.

R. F. WILLIAMS, superintendent of Panhandle schools from 1920 to 1927, is retiring from the teaching profession after 57 years in public school life.

LT. COL. AL BAGGETT has arrived home to take over his work as head of the Physical Education Dept. of West Texas State College at Canyon.

ROPEVILLE will have a new theatre, according to Wallace Blankenship and Jimmy Thornhill, owners.

AN ADDITIONAL grant of \$150,000 has been apportioned for completion of REA construction in Dawson, Lynn, Terry, Garza, Borden, Martin and Hockley counties.

SPEARMAN has started a 45 block paving program. Over 4,000 feet of curb and gutters have been laid to date.

PLAINVIEW city council set up a paving project last week to include 36 blocks of residential streets.

STREET IMPROVEMENTS in O'Donnell is expected to be a political issue next April according to the O'Donnell Index-Press, because of the quiet bond election last week. Only 87 voters appeared to cast ballots, with the issue going down 49 to 38.

SPUR Chamber of Commerce has purchased a lot from the REA to be used for erection of a migratory camp for cotton pickers.

TULIA'S \$60,000 bond issue for improvements of the city water works and sewer system has been called for June 8.

LITTLEFIELD is carrying out an extensive paving project on 50 to 60 city blocks. City officials have also contracted for sale of bonds for the \$275,000 light plant to be built in Littlefield.

OLTON'S former court house building has been obtained for a Memorial Hospital. Approximately 300 memberships have been sold.

STAMFORD officials have extended invitations to 150 towns for their Texas Cowboy Reunion Rodeo set for July 2-4.

HASKELL residents expect an early start on a major irrigation and water conservation project for the area. Preliminary surveys on the Brazos Dam project north of Rule began last week.

WINK has received approval on its proposed building project of FHA houses for returned veterans.

KNOX COUNTY rang the bell with its first oil well last week, located 20 miles north of Knox City.

AN ACTIVE campaign was started last week to raise \$10,000 for the newly organized Crosbyton Rodeo Assn. of Crosbyton, which has as its goal the building of one of the finest rodeo plants in that area.

CLAUDE announces progress on its new city park plans. The land for the park was donated by residents.

SLATON may secure a National Guard Armory of a strong enough plea is made, according to Major Walter Smith of the Texas State Guard.

STAMFORD has begun a summer athletic program for boys and girls, sponsored by the American Legion, Jaycees, Rotary and Exchange Clubs.

CANADIAN officials have proposed a new hospital at a cost of \$146,000. Officials are also recommending purchase of the old hospital until the new unit can be built.

MOTLEY COUNTY'S largest tank was recently completed on the Joe Bloodworth farm, near White Flat. A 325-foot dam will back water for one-half mile and seepage will come from 2,000 acres.

FLOYDADA voters approved an increase in the legal levy for schools from \$1 to \$1.50, and favored a bond issue of \$100,000 for school building funds 190 to 33.

WORK started last week on 28 blocks of paving in Lockney.

TAHOKA'S Youth Center held its formal opening with over 200 teen-agers and adults attending.

LOVINGTON, N. M., announces the Lovington-Denver City highway will be black-topped soon. Machinery is to be on the ground by July 15.

KERMIT Chamber of Commerce directors expressed unanimous dissatisfaction with the present telephone service of that city at a recent meeting and have asked for increased facilities and equipment.

Veterans Administration Lubbock Regional Office Is Officially Open

The Veterans Administration Lubbock Regional Office officially opened for operation, Monday, June 3, Robert W. Sisson, Regional Manager has announced. The Regional Office will be located at the Lubbock Army Air Station until an office building can be constructed for VA occupancy in downtown Lubbock.

The organization is not complete as some of the Divisions; however, every effort is being made to have the Regional Office in operation within the next few days. When de-centralization is complete, the Lubbock Regional Office will render every service right in Lubbock, that is normally rendered by any Regional Office.

The Lubbock Region will include eighty-one West Texas counties. Case files have already been moved from the Waco Regional Office for 49 counties formerly served by that office. The twenty Panhandle counties being served by the Muskogee, Oklahoma Office, and the six counties in the El Paso Area being served by the Albuquerque Regional Office will be activated at the Lubbock Office, July 1, Sisson said.

Sisson has announced the following Division Chiefs for the Lubbock Regional Office: C. Ross, Chief, Personnel Division; J. Collinsworth, Chief, Compensation Division; Eldon F. Fuller, Chief, Vocational Rehabilitation Division; Benjamin O. Murphy, Chief, Adjudication; Oza J. La Barge, M. D.,

Chief Medical Officer; Fred Young, Chief, Legal Division; Conn D. Catterton, Chief, Communications and Records Division; Joe B. Chambers, Deputy Supply Officer; Cecil E. Pickens, Chief, Finance Division. Bill D. Barnum has been named Acting Ass't. Manager; Stanley M. Cowan, Acting Chief Coordination and Planning; and Carroll Smyers, Public Relations Officer.

"The Chief of each Division will let nothing stand in the way of rendering the quickest and most efficient service humanly possible to the veterans and their dependents of this Region," Sisson emphasized.

STRIKE—AT WHOM?

Financial reports make interesting reading to people who know even a little bit about what they mean. To some, they look drab because they are printed mainly in figures; many students never have learned to enjoy studying figures. Just the same, dull old numerals tell the truth in a romantic way to those who love cold facts of struggle and adventure.

Late in May it was my good fortune to have with me an annual report of one of America's largest corporations when I had to spend three hours on a day train. In the back of my mind as I rode along, was a lurking fear that I might reach home a day (maybe a week) late because of labor troubles, just then coiling to strike. My dread threw a bright light on the figures in hand.

Division of Wealth

The company about which I was reading plays an important part in the lives of more than a quarter of a million people: 100,000 employees and 150,000 stockholders. Two out of every five of these people drew wages while three out of five received dividends. The average share owner got less than \$500 a year. The average employee took home more than \$2,500 a year.

Daily newspapers for days had reported threats of strikes in the plants of the firm I was studying, also on the lines of the railroad I was riding, and in many other industries. Question: If all the employees of all the companies strike for what they want and get it, who will pay the difference? How will the pay it? These questions have answers and they're not secrets.

Enter Apple Conductor

The train stopped for a few minutes under the sheds of a big-town station and a railway newsboy came through with fresh afternoon papers. On page one, under Washington date-line, a wire story told how OPA would grant higher prices on automobiles. Nearby was another item about a 10 per cent boost in shoe prices. Then I remembered that bread and milk and meat all had gone up recently.

Whether you ride or walk or only eat, the price gains catch you. Wages are inside the cost of

every manufactured thing, and the consumer pays. It is too obvious to deserve proof. Not long ago officialdom was sounding off freely about how wages in Detroit could be boosted without charging higher prices for automobiles but it didn't work out that way. Why?

Strikes Are Weapons

It is because strikes are not tools. The official theory was right; Wages can go up without boosting prices but production has to be increased if it happens, and strikes don't increase production. Sudden wage increases of 18 to 30 per cent have to come from somewhere, but where? A stockholder drawing \$500 a year can't offer much of a boon to a \$2,500 wage earner.

Strikes can't take something from the owners of a company that the owners don't get. That leaves nobody to pay the higher wages but Mr. Consumer whose family drives the car, wears the shoes and eats the food. A large majority of consumers are themselves workers. In the absence of increased production, a strike is a boomerang. It hits the consumer who is the worker himself.

Black Market Lumber Is Green Lumber

"The public is finally becoming aware of the fact that OPA created black market lumber is green lumber, and it isn't worth using in home building", stated Gene Ebersole, executive vice-president of the Lumbermen's Association of Texas this week.

Recently returned to Houston from a swing through north and west Texas, Mr. Ebersole talked to retail lumber dealers from Pampa, Abilene, Amarillo, San Angelo, Dallas and Fort Worth. He declares that it's the opinion of these men that real estate transfers have dropped off during the past thirty days because people are finally coming to see that homes built with green lumber are not worth the price now being asked.

"One lumber dealer told about some acquaintances of his," Mr. Ebersole said, "They bought lumber to build their home from a trucker who had gotten it green off the saw from a small mill, and they paid prices high above legal ceilings. Shortly after this house was completed, the doors started to stick, the window frames warped badly, shelves curled up, and the entire house sagged out of line. Those people realized they weren't so smart after all to patronize the black market. They had a house, all right, but what kind of a house? They are now trying to unload it on some one else."

Mr. Ebersole continued: "Since people are refusing to buy this green, poorly milled lumber with the sap still running out, the

black market truck operators who dealt with small mills are becoming fewer and fewer. The public is to be commended for refusing to buy homes built with lumber from these disreputable operators." Mr. Ebersole concluded. "As the people realize they're getting a very bad bargain indeed, it is hoped that a buying strike will take place, and the folks will wait for the reputable lumber dealers to get in quality stocks, from which good substantial homes can once again be built. This will happen as soon as these truckers cease to operate."

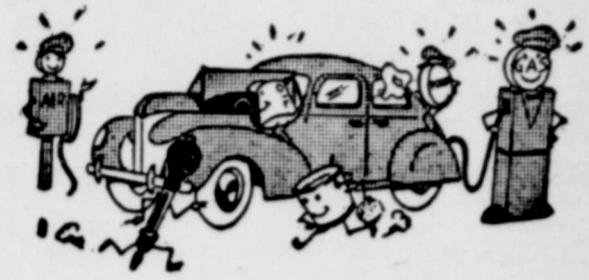

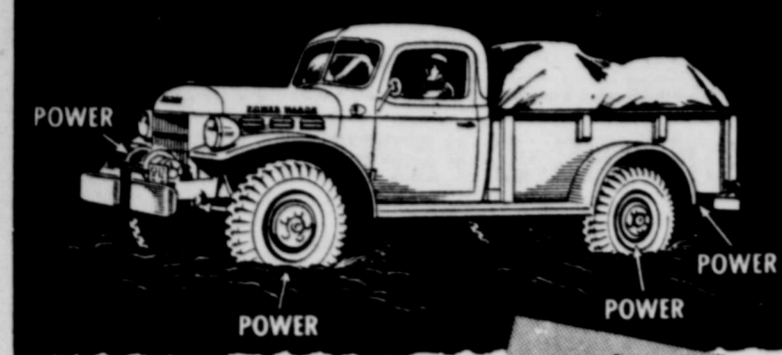

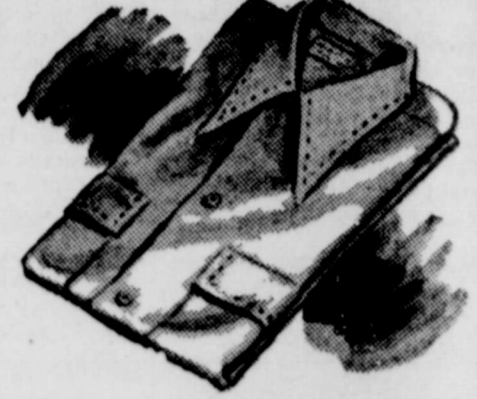

Flow Of War Surplus To Be Speeded Through New "Sales At Site" System

Within the near future WAA will speed the flow of war surplus to the public through a system of disposal to be described as "sales at site." All priority sales and small business purchases will be adequately taken care of these sales.

Another important means of making war surpluses a part of the nations reconversion plan in addition to existing methods, WAA will schedule sales at site for areas of the country where major quantities of surplus war property are located. The sales will be conducted as swiftly as adequate mechanical means and power can be mobilized.

Warehouse of military bases, military establishments and War Relocation Authority camps, where war surpluses are stored, will be the scenes of

this method of sales. Sales at site disposal methods will permit prospective purchasers who visit sale sites to inspect merchandise, select what they want to buy, pay their money and depart with their purchases or have them shipped to designated destinations.

The sales at site system will entail installation of a complete selling staff at each of the surplus property storage centers. These sales sites will be operated as sub-regional offices of WAA and will be sufficiently staffed to assure their working as self-contained units. The 33 regional offices of WAA, currently the pivotal surplus purchasing points for the public, will shed systematically all selling responsibilities and retain only administrative supervision and accounting operations, ultimately permitting the sub-regional offices to do all selling of war surplus through the come-and-get-it sales at site method.

Lt. Gen. E. B. Gregory, WAA, Administration, emphasizing the necessity for faster disposal of war surpluses, stated:

"All of the 33 regional offices of WAA will remain in operation. However, regardless of the type of goods which it has been organized to sell, each regional office will become responsible to the maximum extent possible for disposal of all types of surplus war goods, capital and producer, and consumer goods, located within the regional boundaries."

"Authority to take final action with respect to all problems will be delegated to the maximum extent practicable by the Washington office to the regional offices and from regional offices to sub-regional offices as and when they are staffed and equipped to accept responsibility."

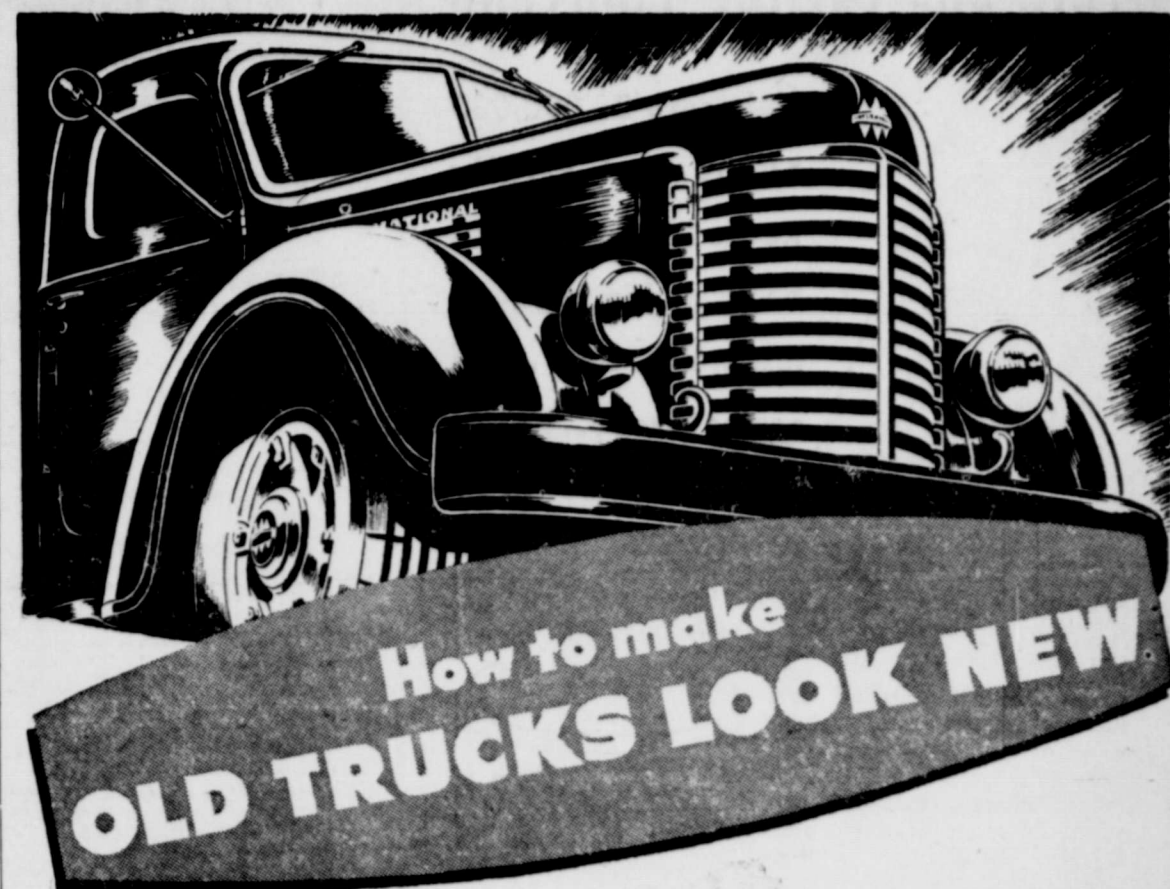

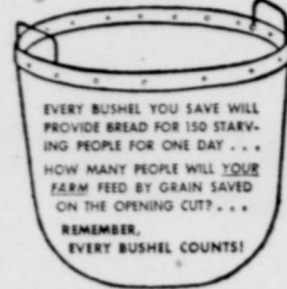

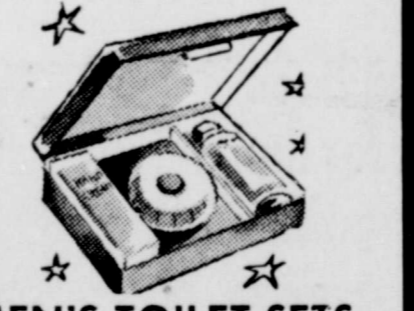


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
