Astroworld, an elaborate high quality, multi-million dollar family amusement and entertainment center, is now under construction on the south side of the Astrodome in Houston, and is due to open in the Summer of 1968, it was announced on September 16 by Ron Hofheinz.

Hofheinz said the Astroworld would be a "family owned" venture and that the owners would include his two sons, Fred and Roy, Jr., daughter Dene (Mrs. Scott Mann) and his five grandchildren.

"Astroworld coupled with the Astrodome and AstroHall will provide the greatest complex of family enjoyment, sports entertainment and convention and show facilities in the world," said Hofheinz.

"This elaborate complex is destined to become the world's greatest tourist attraction, bringing untold millions of dollars into the Houston area economy."

In addition to the high quality and fun-filled amusements and the unique rides, Astroworld will also provide the most extensive "outdoor" air-conditioning system ever attempted," Hofheinz related.

A total of 2,000 tons of central air-conditioning will cool all shade areas, including all buildings, waiting areas, picnic umbrellas and many of the rides. This air-conditioned tonnage is four times that of any other outdoor amusement park.

The underground chilled water system is also the largest in the world.

The entertainment area will encompass 56 acres in its initial phase but could be expanded to 116 acres during ensuing development.

The entire 240 acres in Astrodome parking lot will be used to park more than 30,000 cars.

There will be one fixed admission price for adults and a lesser price for children. The admission ticket will include entrance to the park, all rides, shows, and other features. Astroworld will be open daily throughout the Summer and on most weekends during the remainder of the year.

Astroworld, which will accommodate 20,000 people per hour on rides and attractions, is depicted for fun and education throughout the 11 primary sections.

One of the major chores in presenting Astroworld in the best possible fashion has been the landscaping task. There was just one measly shrub on the track when the construction began. When completed there will be more than 10,000 trees and thousands of other plants, flowers, and nursery items.

Due to the low land and drainage problem, it was necessary to bring 600,000 cubic yards of dirt to the property.

There will be seven acres of rectangular well water in the park for use in the Lost World Ride, the Lagoon, and other areas.

Stan McIlvaine, former executive with Six Flags Over Texas and a former professional baseball executive, will be general manager of Astroworld, employing a staff of 1,200 of which 1,000 are expected to be college students from Houston area colleges.

Park personnel will be dressed in bright, fresh attire with 25 different wardrobes designed in keeping with the area in

AT OLTON

Streaks On Line Friday As District Play Starts

Three different three-game winning streaks will be at stake on Friday at Olton, when the Friona Chiefs take on the Olton Mustangs in the opening round of District 3-AA contests.

Both Friona and Olton boast a 3-0 season record. The other streak is a three-game winning streak which Friona has man-

aged over Olton the past three years.

The game will begin at 7:30 p.m.

It will undoubtedly be the toughest contest yet this season for Friona, and possibly the toughest opponent the Chiefs will face.

One common opponent has been met, Morton. Olton walloped Morton 41-0, while Friona scored a 26-0 win. Otherwise Olton probably has played a tougher non-conference slate. The Mustangs beat two class AAA teams, edging Hereford, 21-20, and topping Muleshoe, 18-0.

Friona, meanwhile, was tripping two county foes, both class A elevens, Farwell 19-7 and Bovina 28-7.

"The way District 3-AA is shaping up this year, we might as well open against Olton as any of the teams," Coach Don Light stated this week. District teams rolled up an impressive 16-6-1 record against outside opposition in non-district play, including several games against class AAA teams.

Olton returns practically the same team which rebounded from a 1-4 record at mid-season last year to finish 5-5, including a 20-14 win over district champs Memphis.

About the only offensive star the Mustangs lost to graduation was Dale DeBerry, who scored against Friona last year, but Olton has a good slate of returnees.

Junior backs Benny Aiken and Kenneth Johnson head the assault in the backfield. Aiken, with six touchdowns is top scorer among class AA players on the South Plains so far this season.

Otherwise, starters for Olton include Johnny Lewis at quarterback and Bobby Turner at fullback.

End Joe Luera is an all-district candidate. He is joined at the opposite side by Lannie McClain. Tackles are Steve Burleson and Mike Crowder, guards Tony George and Eddie Hooper, and center Jayson Latimer.

Coach Light pointed to the fact that Olton had good depth this season, which has allowed the

team to "platoon" rather successfully, with an almost new team on defense.

Friona will be hoping to preserve a winning streak began at Olton in 1964, when the Chiefs won, 20-0. In 1965, Friona's district champs eked out a 20-18 win in a game at Friona, and last year edged the Mustangs, 24-8.

Three Tie For First In Star Grid Contest

A rare three-way tie for first place resulted in the third weekly football contest sponsored by the Friona Star and 15 other Friona area businesses.

Not since the contest was expanded to make up 16 games for contestants to pick each week have as many entrants tied for the top spot -- not only having the same number of games picked correctly, but also missing the tie-breaker game by the same margin.

Burford Hartwick, Raymond Milner and Joyce Veazey were the contestants who couldn't even be separated by the tie-breaker device. They were awarded identical checks of \$3.50. Also picking 14 games correctly were Jewel Tabor and John Wilson, both of Bovina, but they were farther from the tie-breaker score.

With his 14 score, Milner jumped atop the standings in the race for the contest's grand prize. Mrs. Veazey's 14 put

her in a tie for second place with Mrs. Edward White. Next in the standings come Bill Raybon, Mrs. Frank Truitt and Albert Johnson at 14.

Hartwick missed the Arkansas-Oklahoma State game (as did most of the entrants) and the SMU-Missouri clash. He picked the Friona-Bovina score at 30-6, missing the actual score by three points.

Milner missed Arkansas-Oklahoma State and West Texas State-Utah State game, the same two missed by Mrs. Veazey.

Milner's and Mrs. Veazey's papers were identical -- something of a rarity in itself. Both contestants missed Arkansas-Oklahoma State and West Texas State-Utah State. Both had put the tie-breaker score down as 26-6, also missing by three total points.

Mrs. Tabor and Wilson also missed the two games mentioned above. However, Mrs. Tabor was nine points off on the

score at 30-7, and Wilson was 13 points off at 22-0.

New Chevrolet For '68

A new peak in individuality among Chevrolet's six car lines is reached for 1968, according to Glen Reeve of Reeve Chevrolet.

"Each member of our automotive 'family' has a distinct pace-setting personality with features that fully span its market," Estes said. "This matches the growing customer desire for mass production."

A total of 41 new Chevrolet, Chevelle, Camaro, Chevy II, Corvair and Corvette models go on sale on Thursday, Sept. 21. Highlights include all new advance design bodies for Chevelle, Chevy II and Corvette, with introduction of two wheelbases within the Chevelle line; a longer, more luxurious regular Chevrolet, new sportiness for Camaro and continued stress on the special features offered only by Corvair, and important safety improvements, exhaust emission controls, and anti-theft provisions are standard equipment on all models. Also improvements in ride, handling and performance including a larger base V-8 engine for the regular Chevrolet, Chevelle and Chevy II and introduction on several lines of full door windows without ventpanes, hidden windshield wipers and dual level "Astro" ventilation.

Heading a list of more than 400 options and accessories is a power vacuum door lock system, a lamp monitoring system to tell the driver if his front and rear lights are working, front disc brakes and added availability of stereo tape players.

Safety improvements range from energy-absorbing front seat backs and safety armrests positioned to shield door handles to seat belts for all passenger positions and exterior side marker lights.

REGULAR CHEVROLET-- Increased length and new front, side and rear styling reinforce the "big car" image of the industry's top selling car, offered in 18 models in four series on a 119-inch wheelbase.

A new front bumper has a central bar that splits the grille horizontally. Concealed headlights are introduced as an option for Caprice models. Windshield wipers hidden beneath the cowl when not in use are standard on all models. Left hand blades are articulated for increased wiping area on the driver's side.

The rear deck extends fully down to the flush-mounted bumper giving easy access to the trunk. Traditional Chevrolet taillight clusters are mounted for the first time in the new rear bumper.

Added prestige is styled into the exclusive square roofline of the Caprice Coupe. A new model - Impala Custom Coupe

- offers this roofline to Impala hardtop buyers in addition to the "fastback" Impala Sport Coupe.

Door vent windows are eliminated on the Caprice Coupe. New dual level "Astro" ventilation providing continuous flow of outside air through the upper levels of the passenger compartment is standard on the Caprice Coupe, optional on other Caprice and Impala models. There is a different wood-like trim on Caprice Estate Wagons.

A full length body side molding on all Impala models features a black vinyl insert which in addition to adding distinctiveness also gives side body protection.

New luxury interiors offer both pattern cloth with vinyl and all-vinyl.

Refined body mounting and other chassis improvements give a smoother, quieter ride. The base V-8 engine is increased to 307 cubic inches, developing 200 horsepower. A 327 cubic-inch V-8 which also uses regular gasoline is introduced.

A 250 cubic-inch base six and three other V-8's up to 427 cubic inches give a horsepower range from 155 to 385. Five transmissions include Turbo Hydra-Matic which is offered in 1968 with all V-8's on top-of-the-line models.

CORVETTE-- An all new aerodynamic body incorporating the design of the experimental Mako Shark II is offered by America's only mass produced sports car in its 16th year on the market.

More than seven inches longer and two inches lower while retaining the 98-inch wheelbase, Corvette comes in both a convertible and unique "semi-convertible" sport coupe which has removable roof panel sections and rear window.

High-rise front fenders with functional louvers frame the long sloping hood. The grille, including front parking lights, is beneath the flush-mounted bumper. Vacuum operated retractable headlights are concealed in the upper body surface.

New concealed windshield wipers are hidden beneath the power-operated cowl panel. Full door glass styling eliminates ventpanes and "Astro" ventilation is standard. So is Chevrolet's lamp monitoring system.

CHEVELLE -- The industry's intermediate sales leader gets its first all-new body since introduction in 1964, plus two distinct package sizes.

Sedans and station wagons are longer with wheelbases increased one inch to 116 inches. Coupe and convertible models are slightly shorter and have a 112-inch wheelbase that gives

additional emphasis to Chevelle's new long hood, short deck design.

Fourteen models in four series include two new value leaders -- a 300 Deluxe two-door hardtop and a two-seat station wagon named "Nomad" which replaces the Chevy II station wagon.

A luxury Concours option is offered for the Malibu sport sedan. The Concours station wagon has wood-grain trim. Popular SS 396 models again have a distinctive hood and other ornamentation.

The redesigned front end has a lower, fine grid grille with bold horizontal bars. The long hood flares over concealed windshield wipers, standard on Concours, SS 396, and Malibu models.

Back window, curved side glass and greater slope windshield have increased total area. The roofline flows into new rear quarters and rear deck. There are wraparound tail lamps and a wider, deep section bumper.

Chevilles have all new interiors. Instruments are in recessed square panels on either side of the steering column and are mounted at an angle toward the driver for improved visibility.

The perimeter frame and front and rear suspension are redesigned for an improved ride. On a number of models, brakes are improved through adoption of finned drums.

Chevrolet's new 307 cubic-inch engine is the base V-8 for all but SS models. Two sixes and six V-8's give horsepower from 140 to 350. Five transmissions are offered.

CAMARO -- After scoring a strong success in its first year on the market and climbing to second place in sales among all domestic small cars, Camaro has added appeal in 1968.

Again offered in a sport coupe and convertible on 108-inch wheelbase, Camaro has full door glass styling without vent windows and Chevrolet's new dual level "Astro" ventilation.

A new V-shape grille with strong horizontal lines adds depth to the front view. Special moldings accent the venturi-shape of the sides. Wheel trim covers and tail lamps are restyled. Camaro continues its exclusive feature in its class -- concealed headlights available as part of the Rally Sport option.

More luxury has been added to all interiors. Expanded vinyl - softer and richer feeling - is used on all seat trim. The instrument panel has new dial faces, chrome accents and larger padding.

Relocation of shock absorbers and provision for greater ride travel are among chassis improvements. Two

Gulls wheel serenely overhead and sandpipers dash across the sand like eastern versions of roadrunners. The sun shones, soft breezes blow, and nature makes every effort to apologize for last week's tantrum.



Patrol Investigates 15 Accidents In County



Some 150 4-H boys and girls in Parmer County and their activities and programs will be in the spotlight during National 4-H Club Week, September 30-October 7, says County Extension Agents, Cricket B. Taylor, and Ronnie McNutt.

There are 76-thousand 4-H'ers in Texas with more than 2.25 million boys and girls enrolled throughout the nation. "4-H, A world of Opportunity, is this year's theme with activities focused on local, state, national and international achievements of the head, state, hands and health programs.

Locally, says the agents, 4-H week activities will emphasize the opportunities 4-H offers the boys or girls 9 to 19 years of age. Exhibits and displays will feature the work of current 4-H members and will be accented by the green and white four-leaf clover emblem. Several events and activities are planned to encourage youth to join 4-H.

4-H combines the best of learning and fun, points out the agents. It offers a wide variety of projects and activities which emphasize "Learning by Doing" and rewards the boy and girl for personal growth and achievement.

Young people may choose their own individual 4-H projects from some 50 to 100 offered. These range from the traditional beef calf, poultry, gardens, foods and clothing to automotive, career exploration, photography and baby sitting. The young scientist may choose a project in entomology, electricity, conservation or others. And there are projects too, for the young owner of dogs and horses.

Boys and girls like 4-H for the many activities and projects it offers groups and clubs says the agents. Clubs may select such worthwhile activities and projects as community beautification, safety, health, recreation, leadership and conservation. Volunteer adult leaders help guide and advise members of community and neighborhood 4-H Clubs.

Speaking of adult leaders, National 4-H Week also provides an opportunity to give the volunteer leaders a well-deserved "pat on the back." More than 40 dedicated citizens of Parmer County give their time and skill in assisting 4-H boys and girls and in promoting 4-H club work. Not only do they assist at 4-H Club meetings but they also help with project studies, train demonstration teams, manage county fair exhibits and recreational projects and give individual training to 4-H'ers.

The junior 4-H leaders in Parmer County should also be commended, adds the agents. They devote their spare time and use their 4-H experiences to assist the adult volunteers in making 4-H the outstanding youth organization which it is today.

4-H offers many opportunities for the youngsters who is interested in preparing for the difficult, challenging tasks which lie ahead. Now is a good time to join 4-H. Clubs throughout the county are reorganizing for the new year and new clubs are just starting. Anyone interested in joining 4-H or in finding out more about the organization should contact the County Extension Office, a local 4-H club member or an adult leader.

Otho Whitefield returned this week from the New Mexico State Fair at Albuquerque where he exhibited the grand champion ram and reserve champion ewe.

Whitefield also had the first and third place ram lamb; first place pen of three; second and fourth place ram under two; second and third place ewe lamb; first place pen of three ewe lambs; second and fourth place ewes lambs under two years; second place pen of three ewes under two; second place exhibitor's flock and first place "get of sire."

In the carcass competition, Whitefield had second and sixth place in Class I (on the hoof); and third and fourth "on the rail."

Thawing Turkeys At Room Temps Now Okay

Thawing frozen turkeys at room temperature is now safe and practical, says Cricket B. Taylor, county home demonstration agent.

The secret is to thaw the turkey in a closed paper bag. The bag keeps the temperature low enough to protect quality, the agent says, and this method is more convenient than thawing in a refrigerator or under tap water.

Many processors hesitate to recommend room-temperature thawing, Mrs. Taylor points out. Although this has been a common practice, the outside surface of the bird can be exposed long enough and at temperatures high enough for bacteria to multiply.

Refrigerator thawing avoids this danger. But, research has shown that if the bird is kept in its plastic wrap and placed in a paper bag at room temperature, the atmosphere


inside the bag is only slightly warmer than the atmosphere of the refrigerator. Thus, the bird can be thawed completely without exposing the surface to temperature higher than 55 degrees F., the agent points out.

Large birds, 20 to 25 pounds, should thaw for 16 hours smaller birds, 8 to 12 pounds, should thaw for 12 hours.

Cook the turkey within one to three hours after thawing, Mrs. Taylor recommends.





BOVINA FALLS, 28-7

Chiefs Topple Mustangs For Third Season Win

Halfback Tony Perea scored a pair of touchdowns, led the team offensively with 144 yards, and sparked Friona to a 28-7 win over neighboring Bovina in a game here last week.

Taking advantage of numerous breaks, the Chieftains were aided by the recovery of five Bovina fumbles, three of which led directly to a score for Friona.

Perea scored the team's second and third touchdowns, and rushed for 144 net yards, as Friona took its third win of the season, and seventh in ten series games against the Mustangs.

After a scoreless first quarter, Friona got on the scoreboard first, early in the second quarter, following the recovery of a Bovina fumble at the Mustang 19. Lowery Harper's punt was put into play by the visitors on their own 18, and three plays later, Friona pounced on the loose pigskin.

Perea rambled 12 yards to make it first and goal at the Bovina seven. Harper picked up three yards, Perea one, and then Larry Graves got the score from the three. Sahara Gonzales' kick was good, but a penalty wiped out the point and set the Chieftains back. This time, the team elected to try for a pass for two points, but it fell incomplete. Friona led at that point, 6-0.

It didn't take Bovina long to get back into the ball game. Stuart McMeans returned the kickoff to his own 18. Daryl Kirkpatrick then hit Rodney Murphy with a pass, and the speedy Mustang halfback sprinted the rest of the distance for a TD—a sparkling 82-yard scoring play. Rex Cumpston booted the point, to give the aroused visitors a 7-6 lead.

Friona picked up a first down,

but was forced to punt following the Bovina kickoff. However, Carl Harris fumbled the punt, and Friona recovered at the Bovina seven. Perea covered the distance on the first try, and Lowery Harper ran for two points, to put Friona ahead to stay, 14-7.

The Chieftains were given yet another scoring opportunity during the period, pouncing on their third Bovina fumble at the 30 yard line. The Chiefs picked up a first down, and drove to the nine, where Johnny Barker's fumble was picked up by Bovina's charity total of the first half by giving the ball over the first two times they had it in the third quarter.

Finally, Friona was able to hang onto the ball for a sustained drive. It started on the Friona 33 following a Bovina punt. Perea, Graves and Barker gave

the teams first downs during the drive, Perea gaining the last 13 yards in three straight totes—the final thrust being from a yard out.

Gonzales' kick was good, making the count 21-7, Friona, Bovina fumbled again, on the first play from scrimmage following Friona's touchdown, but gave the ball to Bovina four plays later.

Following a Bovina punt, the Chiefs put the ball in play at the Mustang 41. Perea picked up three first downs, with three gains of eight yards each.

(Ted Procter) got the touchdown from a yard out, and Gonzales' kick made it 28-7, which turned out to be the final score.

Perea was the workhorse for the Chieftains, carrying the ball almost exactly half of the time—28 times in all averaging 5.2 yards gained per carry.
