Because there has always been a certain amount of confusion relating to the Friona Star and Plains Publishers, many people may not have expected to receive newspapers this week, due to the announcement last week that Plains Publishers was closing its printing plant in Friona after almost nine years.

Most people know, however, that Plains Publishers was established in 1958 as a means of printing the Star and other area newspapers in a central plant.

What they may not know is what was then a new concept, both in offset printing and central plant printing, has been accepted by a majority of the newspapers on the High Plains today.

In 1958, when Plains Publishers bought its first offset press, it was only the fourth of its kind sold by the Gemco company in the entire nation. It was the only one in Texas and the Southwest.

Today, nine years later, there are some six offset presses with central printing plants, between Amarillo and Lubbock alone. Downstate there are many, many more. We'd say that today the majority of newspapers published are printed offset. If it isn't a majority, it won't be long before it is.

Whereas the Friona Star was the first and only High Plains newspaper printed by the new offset method as of August, 1958, we're far from being alone today. We made a quick nose count, and find at least 30 newspapers printed by offset located between Amarillo and Lubbock.

So, we're not exactly "high and dry" by losing our Friona press. In a way, we're lucky to be only 22 miles from Hereford, which has built up one of the better offset central plants in the country.

And at least for the present our neighbors at Southwest Offset in Hereford are doing the printing of the Star. Our last two issues have now been printed on their press.

Since we're just feeling our way along, we have come up with no new deadlines as yet, since we're not sure where we will fit into the new printing pattern.

But one thing for sure: we haven't nor will we suspend publication as at least one citizen asked last week. I'm afraid you're stuck with us around here.

Our goal will remain unchanged in that we shall endeavor to bring the people of Friona the best newspaper that it is possible for us to publish, and to give our advertisers a medium second to none in our area.

One thing we like about graduation services at Friona; they move fast, and don't keep you there all night. The idea of not using a guest speaker on top of the valedictory and salutatory speakers is good, we believe.

When you think back to graduation exercises you have attended, you can appreciate this. You may remember a hot summer-like night (no air conditioning, naturally), and mothers fanning fretting children while a long, drawn out speaker tries to impress the graduates.

The graduates, meanwhile are probably thousands of miles away. Some are still wondering how in the heck they managed to pass English. All are making rosy plans, either for the immediate future or long-range.

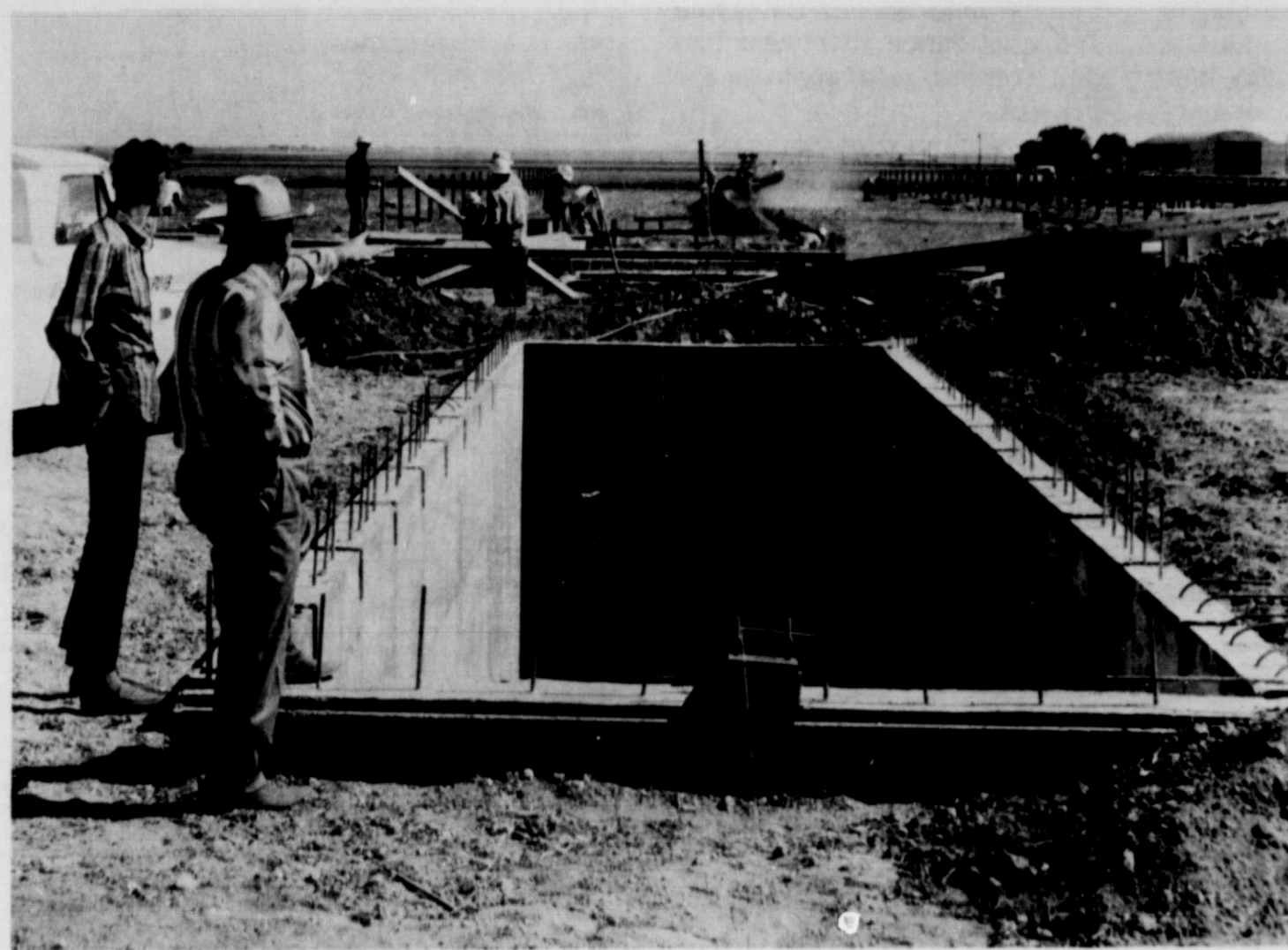
Speaking of the graduates, we've noticed that ours in Friona have a way of "letting off steam" immediately following the exercises.

## FOR THIRD DAM

# Bond Issue Looms On Draw Flood Control

It appeared that the question whether Parmer County received two or three floodwater retention dams on Running Water Draw will be decided by a countywide bond issue, following a meeting of the county commissioners Monday.

The project, which involves four Texas counties and Curry County, New Mexico, has been completely surveyed by a team of engineers. The best prospective sites were surveyed closely and mapped.

Currently, there are two locations for dams which have no problems. One is on the Catfish Draw above Bovina on land owned by Jack McCracken. Another is in the southeastern portion of the county near Lazbuddie and the eastern line.

The federal government is to

spend \$250,000 on construction of structures within the county. Because the draw has more "mileage" in Parmer County than other counties, it was figured that it could support three structures within the county.

The problem which has arisen is the location of the third structure on the draw. Two possible sites near Bovina on Running Water Draw were surveyed. One is north of Highway 60 on land belonging to Jack Dunn. The other is south of the road on land belonging to George F. Trimble.

Since surveying the Dunn site it has been found that landowners at this location are opposed to a dam being located on their land. However, Trimble and other neighbors involved at the location south of Highway 60

are in favor of getting a dam-site.

However, other matters enter into the south Bovina site. They include raising Farm to Market Road 1731 eight feet, which may involve a cost of \$67,000 locally, and taking care of a gas pipeline through the area, which could cost \$94,000.

The commissioners court asked the crowded courtroom Monday which route those in attendance would like to see the court take. The group stated that it wanted to try for three dams, and if it meant calling a bond election to pay for the necessary improvements, they asked the commissioners to call the election.

Eddy Willmon, work unit conservationist for the Parmer County Soil and Water Conser-

vation District presented the alternative to those present at the meeting.

Willmon stated that by having the dam near the center of the county, the recharge benefits would help more of the county. Use of the site for recreation is not held as a big factor, although it is admitted that this could be a good possibility. "The area would be dry one year in 20," Willmon points out.

If the bond issue fails, then the County would stand to get only two structures -- the one on Catfish Draw and the one near Lazbuddie. Objections to this would be the lack of floodwater protection to farms and roads above the Lazbuddie structure. Floodwater protection is one of the main reasons the project was initiated in the first place.

Tax cost for the money to be expected in putting in the Bovina area dam was estimated by one source to amount to only 25 cents per acre, paid only one time.

## \$100,000 Raised; Abstract Received

The fund drive to raise \$100,000 to buy land on which to locate Missouri Beef Packers' Friona plant has gone over the top, it was announced this week by Friona's Industrial Development Committee.

In other developments concerning the land, it was reported that title to the 197-acre plot was received in Friona on Monday, has now been received in Missouri, and attorneys of Missouri Beef Packers are inspecting the abstract as a preliminary measure for beginning construction on the \$3 million beef packing plant.

About the fund drive, Loyd Shackelford, a member of the Industrial committee, said "This is a real credit to the community. Everyone should pat themselves on the back for the job which has been done in this respect."

Shackelford stated that the fund-raising was really an easy matter. "People were real cooperative. We had the money raised or promised within a 10-day period," he added. That would be raising the money at the rate roughly of \$10,000 per day.

Shackelford has been in contact with Harry Nelson, executive vice president of Missouri Beef Packers early this week, and Nelson indicated that if the MBP attorneys accept the land abstract, Gene Frye, MBP president was due to fly into Friona

on Thursday or Friday to begin preliminary arrangements for construction to begin.

With the proximity of the Memorial Day weekend, however, it was indicated that the Missouri company official might not make the trip until after the May 30 holiday.

Shackelford stated that the MBP officials are very anxious to get construction underway. All that hinders the beginning of construction at present is the inspection by their attorneys of the abstract. "We're not expecting any hitches, but you don't move fast where legal matters are involved," he said.

## Memorial Day Services Set

The annual Memorial Day Services, sponsored by the Friona American Legion and Auxiliary, will be held at the Friona City Park and Cemetery next Tuesday morning, beginning at 8 a.m. at the park.

A local minister is being secured to bring the annual Memorial Day message. Wreaths will be placed on veterans' graves at the cemetery. The public is invited to attend the services.

Six veterans' names have been added to the local Memorial list since last May 30. They are Howard Biggers, Lloyd Hollis, W.B. (Bill) Norwood, George Treider and Frederick Worm.

## Golf Tourney This Weekend

A first annual men's partnership golf tournament is scheduled for Saturday and Sunday at Friona Country Club. A qualifying round will be played Friday, or members may turn in their scores on that date.

Eighteen holes will be played Saturday and Sunday. An entry fee of \$30 per team will be charged. Cash or merchandise prizes will be awarded the winners.

It is hoped to make the tournament an annual affair.

## Attention, Cattlemen

A special meeting of Friona Young Farmers will be held in the high school agriculture department beginning at 9:00 p.m. Thursday. Purpose of the meeting is to determine the feasibility of conducting an artificial insemination pregnancy testing school here.

If sufficient interest is shown a qualified instructor from Amarillo will be secured to conduct a five day school. All livestock men and farmers are invited by Jimmy Mabry, president of the organization, to attend.

## Swimming Pool Set To Open Saturday

Friona's Dive-In Swimming Pool will begin its sixth year of operation Saturday at 1 p.m. The pool, which opened for the first time in 1962, is the only indoor swimming pool in the area, outside the large cities.

Owner Truett Johnson announces that two Friona classroom teachers will be in charge of the pool. Thomas Baird and Alton Peak will run the facility. Peak will serve as life-guard. He is a fifth-grade instructor. Baird is a special education instructor at Friona Elementary School.

Johnson indicated that swimming lessons would be offered at the pool as soon as a qualified instructor could be secured, and would probably begin after June 1.

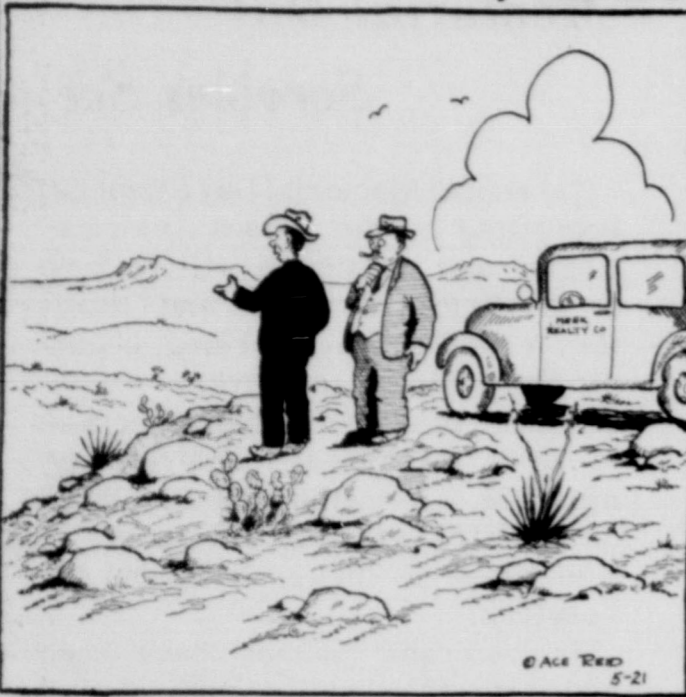

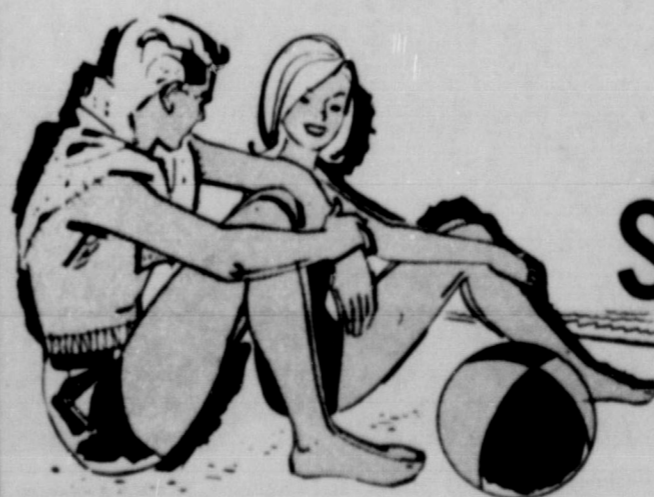

The war in Vietnam comes closer and closer to home as more and more Panhandle and U.S. citizens soldiers are involved and as the casualty reports mount.

As a participant in the Korean War, I can well understand the agony that comes from each of the "we regrets to inform you" messages of the wounded or killed in action messages. I know what it was to lose a buddy to enemy action and can understand the loss of a loved one means.

But I believe most of us understand the reasons and justifications for our involvement in this terrible war -- a war neither of our making or asking.

After the Senate Policy Committee issued a staff report last week which made it appear that the Republican Party was split in its support of the President's policy in Viet Nam, I joined Senate Republican leader Everett Dirksen and House minority leader Gerald Ford in disassociating myself from agreement with that report or its implications.

Our own Senator Tower was quick in assailing the report as a "misleading" document that

could be misinterpreted, and he challenged as incorrect the major contentions that President Johnson has involved the United States in a unilateral, open-ended land war in Asia in contradiction of the policy followed by President Eisenhower and historically endorsed by the Republican Party.

My main objection to the President's policy is his failure to fully utilize our naval and air superiority in stopping the flow of war materials and supplies to North Vietnam.

In view of the reaction to General Westmoreland's visit from the noisy and misguided or misinformed dissenters, it seems to me that these "doves" and doubters should be again reminded of history, although they apparently choose to ignore the real story of Communism and its avowed goal of world conquest.

The infiltration and invasion of South Vietnam followed the usual Communist pattern of intimidation, murder, subversion, terrorism and coercion under their propaganda camouflage of "liberation from imperialism."

But there is no more imperialistic nation in the world today than the Soviet Union, Freedom or the right of self-determination for the countries Russia took over after WW II such as Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Estonia, Rumania, Poland and the others is a mockery of their so-called "Peoples De-

Upon completing 12 books, a child wins a place on the honor roll, and his or her name will be added. The honor roll will be displayed at the library during each open day. This large roll will be designed and made by Carol Ellis, and as the children's names are added, their pictures beside the honor roll will be published in the Friona Star.

The climax of the annual Library Summer Reading program will be a 'Fun Day' with games and refreshments and

surprises at the City Park on Sunday afternoon, August 20th from 2 to 4 p.m. unless otherwise announced. When the young club members have read twelve books, they will qualify for a merit certificate to be awarded at the 'Fun Day.'

The children who are Summer Readers have proved to be a faithful group and many return year after year. Christine Grant in 1966 received her fourth certificate. This assistant was provided for the Library through the donation of the Progressive Study Club and the College work-study program. ### On The Farm In Parmer County

RONNIE McNUTT  
County Agent

Several crop demonstrations have been established over the county in the past two weeks and some earlier.

Five irrigation demonstrations are underway in the county. Three grain sorghums irrigation demonstrations will be conducted. These demonstrations are located on the farms of Ronald Minyen, northwest of Bovina, Larry Fairchild east of Hub, and Roy Farley, 4 miles west of Clays Corner. These tests are designed to show the value of properly timed irrigations and at which irrigation water is worth more.

C.W. Bowman, 6 miles west of Bovina is conducting a cotton irrigation demonstration. On this demonstration skip row versus every row irrigation will be studied. Also the value of the first and third watering will be looked at.

A soybean irrigation demonstration will be conducted on the Robert White farm located 2 miles south of Oklahoma Lane Community Center. This test will determine which watering

is most important for growing soybeans.

Darrell Norton of Farwell is cooperating again this year with the Lubbock Experiment Station on a grain sorghum variety demonstration. This demonstration was planted May 15 and will test 45 different varieties.

Other sorghum variety tests will be conducted by Wesley Barnett of Friona and Jerry Smith of Lazbuddie. These two tests will be mainly late maturing varieties. Jimmy Mabry of Hub is conducting a medium maturing variety demonstration on sorghum. Roy Farley of Lazbuddie has 13 different varieties in his sorghum test with both medium and late maturing varieties.

A.E. Redwine of Lazbuddie will conduct a fertilizer and variety demonstration on his farm. Four varieties will be tested. They are Hinn, Hill, Lee and Patterson. Nitrogen and phosphorous will be checked as far as fertilizer is concerned.

Nitrogen, phosphorous, sul-

fur and trace mineral will be tested on a fertilizer demonstration on the Roy Farley farm. Three other fertilizer demonstrations on sorghum will be conducted by the Lubbock and Bushland Experiment stations on the Keith Brock farm of Friona, Donald Christian and John Christian of Farwell.

A herbicide demonstration on cotton will be located on the J. L. Langston farm 6 miles southeast of Farwell.

These are result demonstrations that are being conducted over the county. If you are by one of these demonstration plots stop and look it over.

I wondered if Frances would remember to sit beside her husband after being a "loner" at so many graduations of the couple's three children.

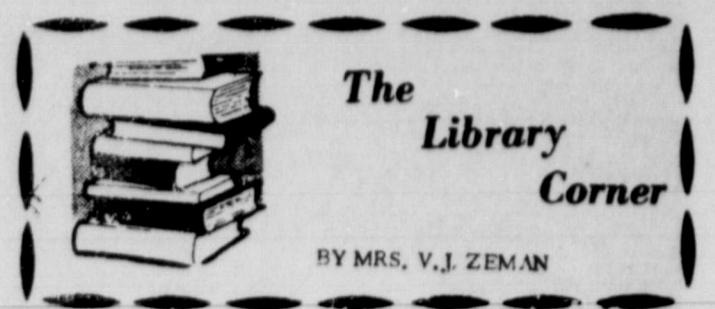

Word of the permanent loan of 125 more books to Friona Public Library was received from Texas State Library last week. Local librarian, Mrs. John Gaede, had requested an extension of the annual loan for an additional year. Instead, upon recommendation of Mrs. Rosalyn T. Shamblyn, Field Consultant for Texas State Library, a permanent loan was made. A permanent loan means that the books can remain as long as there is a Friona Public Library.

Mrs. Shamblyn's most recent visit to Friona was in March when she met with the library board and the city council. She expressed high praise then of Friona Public Library's growth and support.

Mrs. Shamblyn is a consultant for 31 per cent of the geographic area of Texas, roughly the size of Kansas. Her area includes 62 West Texas counties. Texas has six library consultants.

This 125 books brings the total number of books on permanent loan to 410. Valuation is \$2,050,00 for the 410 books, at five dollars per book.

In preparation for the summer increase in reading, 250 books from the Texas State Library were received recently on annual loan. Fifty of these are easy books for kindergarten through primary school readers. One hundred, evenly divided fiction and non-fiction are junior books. There are 100 for young adults. Received on summer loan are 225 books from the Bookmobile.

The summer Reading Programs begins June 1 for school age readers through the 8th grade.

An average of 600 books from local donors has filled about 60 feet of shelves each of the four years since. Over one hundred families and many clubs and organized groups have given books.

All ages are welcome at Friona Public Library which is north of Friona Methodist Church on the corner of Pierce and Ninth.

Beginning May 25th library will be open 18 hours weekly on Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and 3 to 6 p.m. Friday is a new library day.

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# Financial 'Ten Commandments' Are Given By Extension Agent

Young couples who follow the "Financial Ten Commandments" will have more success for happiness, says Cricket B. Taylor, Farmer County Extension Agent. Money matters seem to be the cause of much unhappiness among young couples and greater emphasis is being placed on MANAGEMENT as a means of helping this situation.

Quoting the "Commandments listed by Dr. Milton Huber, associate professor at the University of Wisconsin's Center for Consumer Affairs;

I. You shall have no more children than your income will permit to maintain the standard of living you want for them.

Do not forget that the older the children become, the more expensive they are. Financial planning and family planning must complement each other.

II. You shall not make the mistake of buying all the modern conveniences and comforts that your parents have taken a lifetime to accumulate. Ignore this, and the new baby will arrive amidst a bombardment of debts -- which the wife's income can no longer cover. Base your budget on the husband's income, primarily.

III. You shall not take for granted that your mate has the same idea about spending money. Couples who don't work out spending plans together can

end up with poor credit.

IV. Remember to save for the unexpected. Plan for medical and household emergencies. Set aside in savings, from the top of the paycheck, the equivalent of income from six months labor to care for emergencies.

V. Honor your credit rating. Pay your debts on time. Beware of merchants who advertise "easy" credit, but specialize in harsh and expensive repayments and contracts.

VI. Do not buy impulsively. Beware of door-to-door salesmen and the lure of "something for nothing." Compare merchandise and prices for furniture and appliances.

VII. Do not commit yourself to any installment contract without reading it completely. Be sure that all blanks have been filled in and that all verbal agreements have been put in writing.

VIII. Do not cheat yourself by securing new loans at high interest to pay off old bills. This is an expensive way of buying time -- not a way of paying bills.

IX. You shall not bear the responsibility of purchasing a car or major appliance on the installment plan without inquiring into the true annual rate of interest, dollar charges, and other special fees. Interest rates vary considerably. Shop for your credit as well as your merchandise.

X. You shall not cover a house of your own if you move frequently. Financing, selling, and closing costs increase the costs of buying without including all of the costs of home ownership besides monthly mortgage payments. These include depreciation, taxes, hazard insurance, mortgage life insurance, closing costs, upkeep and repair, and income from interest lost on savings used as down payment on a house.

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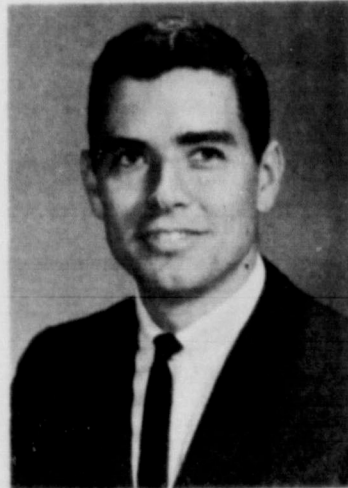

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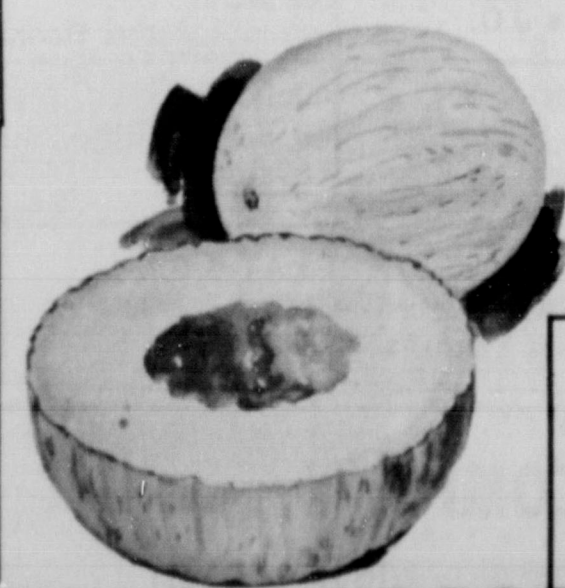
