



granting of the license to the applicant's 21st birthday. At that time a regular operator's license will be granted. Ward pointed out that only two moving traffic violations may result in revocation of these provisional licenses.

Another new innovation in the law pointed out by Ward is the fact that all original applicants for licensing must present a birth certificate at the time of application. Drivers having old licenses renewed need not present the certificate.

Color photos of the driver will be added to all licenses issued after Jan. 1, and the licenses will be laminated between layers of plastic. Cost of the new licenses will remain the same, Ward emphasized, the only difference being in the length of time for which the licenses are renewed.





During the summer of 1914 the city of Baltimore, Maryland, still contained some vacant lots. They were rough and weedgrown and were usually surrounded by huge billboards that advertised everything from chewing gum to automobiles.

Beneath one of these signs a skinny six year old boy lay hidden in the ragweed. As a fawn freezes when hunters appear so did the boy remain rooted to the ground. He did not realize that far across the Atlantic the European continent was beginning to feel the rumble of World War I. He had a war of his own to contend with and he felt that discovery would mean a severe beating or probably death.

In the center of the vacant lot a wooden post had been set into the ground, and to the post a young man was tightly bound. Man and post were encircled by a sinster gang of young hoodlums, At a signal from the leader the torture of the victime began, Brickbats, sticks and stones were the weapons and they fell fast and furiously until the poor captive's head dropped and he found relief in unconsciousness.

As quietly as they had come, the torturers sneaked away. Two came dangeriously close to the terrified boy.

When the fear of discovery was past the boy left the clump of weeds and his barefeet made short work of the several blocks between himself and his home. Never again did he disobey his mother by going to that part of town to play.

Next day's paper carried a short story of a gangland victim being admitted to Johns-Hopkins hospital.

The little boy is now an old gray haired man. The first World War came and went. Years later a second World War began on the same battleground and later spread all over the globe. Korea erupted and was quieted only by the blood of thousands of the boy's companions. Now his son and his friend's sons are being sent into another war and to him it seems sometimes that it is still the same battle that began in a vacant city lot half a century ago.

Violence is not new. It started in the Garden of Eden and today its ugly face is seen in every land.

Any war, any place, is a deplorable occurance and is extremely hard to justify on any grounds. However, wars do not materialize over night, they grow from the seeds of unrest, greed and are nourished by treason. These seeds of war have been planted in our own country for many years and are now beginning to bear their hateful fruit,

Our national crime rate is now 16% ahead of last years. It is considered dangerous to walk the streets of our cities. including our nation's capitol! Children murder children. Young ladies are unsafe in public buildings. Parents are brutally done away with by their offspring. City buses and subways have become hangouts for criminals. The motorist who happens to have a flat tire on our highways faces robbery or death.

An alleged minister of the Gospel, holder of one of the world's most coveted awards, turns out to be a worse snake than the one that infested Eden.

Ill-bred rabble-rousers are permitted to travel over the face of the earth spewing a doctrine of hate and bloodshed and remain as free as the man next door.


Dope peddlers invade our college campuses there by striking the very roots of our future and ar given the blessings of some bone-headed doctors, professors, and scientists.

Railroad Pays\$35,868 In Taxes


Current annual taxes paid to the various government agencies by Texas railroads in Parmer County totaled \$35,868, it is announced by the Texas Railroad Association.

In addition, of course, was the large total in taxes the railroads' 33,410 Texas employees contributed on their own property. The vast majority of rail workers, many



amounts of nitrogen are required to keep a soil in high The process of nitrification which involves the changes that occur to nitrogen compounds when they are applied to the soil so as to become available for plant use is very interest-

ing. Nitrates are the available forms of nitrogen compounds and their formation is affected by soil temperature, aeration, Ph level and moisture. Nitrification best occurs when the soil temperature is above 50 degrees F. Also, the soil should be fairly loose for good aeration and contain adequate moisture. The Ph range should be between 6.5 and 8. As far as the application of nitrogen, on sandy soils, the element should be applied just prior to planting or by sidedressing according to research. On clay or tight soils, however, times of application is not

significant. Phosphorus deficiencies do not always show up as visual symptoms (discolorations) in plants, Significant responses can be obtained from crops by the application of phosphorus, under certain circumstances. According to researchers, applying phosphorus preplant by either banding or broadcasting is best for top results.

The species of plant as well as it's root activity plays an important role in the amount of phosphorus used. Also, the solubility of the phosphorus compound is an important factor and the element's renewal rate in a particular type of soil must also be taken into consideration.

Fertility tests conducted by the Lubbock Experiment Station indicated on some loose, sandy soils in which the addition of phosphorus was made zinc deficiency resulted. This occurred through a chemical change in the soil in which the available znic joined with the phosphorus to form insoluble zinc phosphate.


