Area Road Work Given Approval By Commission

Cochran county road projects were included in 57 highway programs authorized Saturday by the State Highway commission, the Associated Press reported from Austin.

The approved Cochran county projects include three farm to market highways totaling 34 miles. The routes designated run from Whiteface south 10 miles; from end of farm to market highway 597, six miles northeast of Morton, to the Hockley county line; from Lehman to the New Mexico state line. A grant of \$218,000 on a county-state 75-25 cooperative financing basis was approved.

Other Funds Okayed

Other appropriations included \$459,450 to fix roads hard hit by the severe weather during the past winter. This includes state-maintained highways only and does not include the cost of repairing county-maintained roads. Dallas county alone had estimated more than a million dollars damage to its roads.

The highway commission appropriated \$228,650 to the Amarillo district for freeze damage. Other district-wide allocations were: District 3, \$21,100; District 7, \$27,925; District 11, \$19,160; District 19, \$60,000; District 22, \$15,000.

Lubbock county, in District 5, received no funds to repair weather damaged roads. S. C. McCarty, State Highway department district engineer, said Lubbock county roads suffered only normal damage from the weather during the winter and that regular funds would take care of the repair costs.

Sterling C. Evans To Deliver Tech Commencement

Folks paid their quarters, went in, came out and stood around to watch their friends and neighbors go in. Inside the tent was a buggy drawn by mules!

REA Prospects Are Bright Says George Mahon

WASHINGTON—Farm families who have waited for months or years for the REA line to reach their homes can now take fresh hope, according to a report received from Congressman George Mahon. Last week the House of Representatives by a vote of 199 to 154 passed an Amendment providing for \$175 million in REA loan funds to become immediately available upon approval by the Senate and the President, which is expected within three weeks.

The House has also approved an additional \$400 million in loans for the REA to become available on July 1st.

Mahon advises that this represents the most ambitious REA program ever undertaken in the history of the nation. Prospects are that abundant funds for the REA will be available for a period of at least one year. However, there will still be delays brought about by the inability of the REA office in Washington to process applications with sufficient speed and for the reason that abundant construction materials are not yet on the market. Fortunately, in recent weeks the material situation has definitely improved.

Mahon is a member of the Appropriations Committee and joined with other friends of the REA in Congress in the successful effort to provide additional funds. Such funds are provided in the form of loans to REA Co-ops which are rapid with interest to the Government.

New Easy-To-Read Time Table Added On Santa Fe Trains

A new, easy-to-read time table has made its appearance on Santa Fe trains in the last few days. T. B. Gallaher, General Passenger Traffic Manager for the Santa Fe at Chicago, today announced the innivation for the additional convenience of travelers aboard the trains.

The new time card carries an individual schedule for each Santa Fe transcontinental train, Gallaher said, and each section includes, in addition to train times, such information as mileage, altitudes, train connections at principal terminals, correct locations to reset watches, rivers crossed and the time of crossing, and other incidental information of interest to travelers, including even a list of tunnels on the Santa Fe, their length and the times the trains will pass through them.

In the old-style time tables it was necessary for passengers on north and eastbound trains to "read up" the columns while south and westbound passengers "read down". On the new table, all schedules "read down", and there are separate sections for each direction.

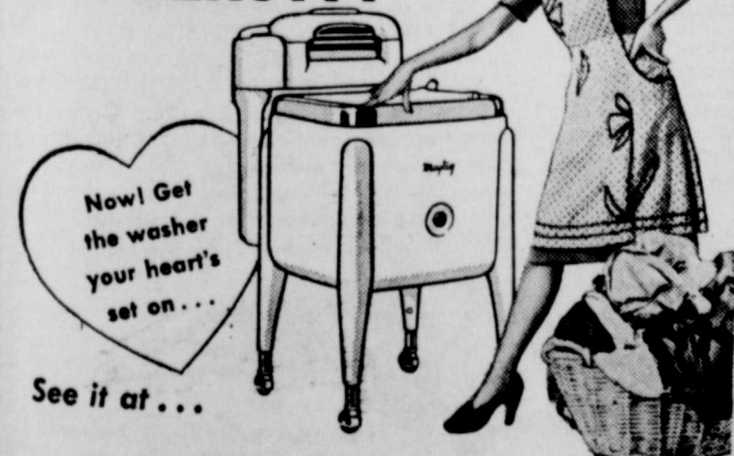

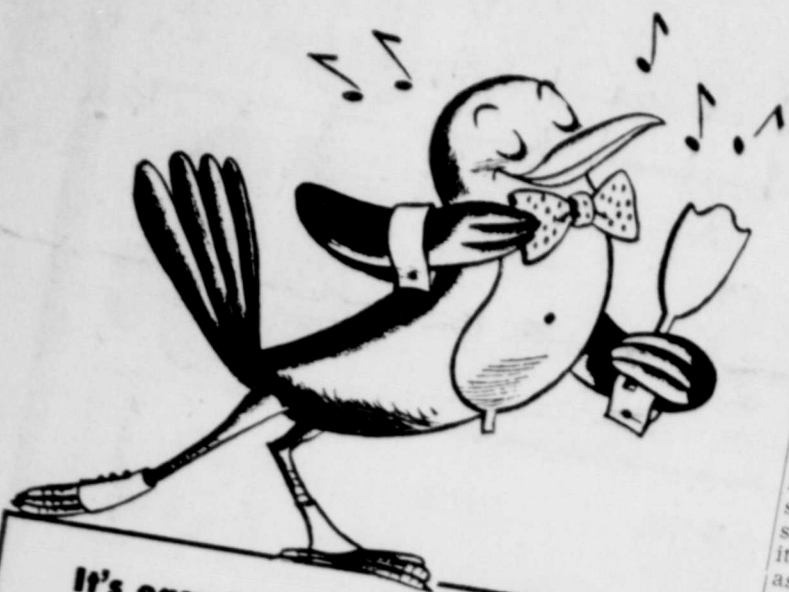

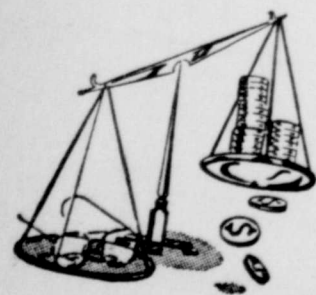

Public Health Nursing Week Slated April 11-17

The State of Texas is planning to observe national "Public Health Nursing Week" April 11-17, as proclaimed by President Harry S. Truman. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges high school graduates to consider public health as a career.

"Public health nursing offers young women opportunities for lifetime careers which are highly useful and satisfactory. The demand for professional nurses now exceeds the supply in public health and other fields of work," Dr. Cox said. "Possibilities of travel, worthwhile service, income, and other features of the nursing profession compare very favorably with those open to women in other careers."

Education for nursing is available in 33 schools in Texas and fall classes, which open about September 1. All schools still should be graduates of high school or have some college credit with a record of good scholastic standing, be in good physical condition, and of high moral character. An interest in people to work well with one's hands is necessary.

Details regarding nursing education can be secured from hospitals, physicians, nurses' organizations, and local health departments, as well as the Texas State Department of Health.

Reminder; Not To Late To Buy Easter Seals

A reminder that it is not too late to buy Easter Seals was voiced this week by Roscoe L. Thomas, Dallas, president of the Texas Society for Crippled Children. The seals which are mailed to citizens throughout the state three weeks prior to Easter, finance the year-round work of the Society.

"The Easter season was chosen for our annual appeal as being symbolic of the season of renewal and hope for the thousands of handicapped youngsters whom we aid," Thomas said. "However, since there is no closed season on crippling diseases, there is no deadline for Texans to purchase the seals. If the colorful seals are still lying about the house, it is not too late to send a contribution for them and to use them as reminders on all correspondence."
