#### Sterling C. Evans To Deliver Tech Commencement

Sterling C. Evans, president of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, will deliver the commencement address at Texas Technological College June 7, Pres. W. M. Whyburn has announced.

Approximately 500 students will receive degrees in June, making the 1948 graduating class the largest in Texas Tech history, Registrar W. P. Clement estimated. Ceremonies will be concluded in Jones stadium, beginning at 8 p. m.

Evans, who graduated from Texas A and M College more than 20 years ago, has been active in helping agriculture ever since. Serving as boy's club agent, 4-H club leader, and district agent of the extension service, Evans showed a sympathethic understanding of farmers' problems and applied himself vigorously and intelligently to their

Because of his understanding of farmers' cooperatives and the part they can be made to play in bettering agricultural conditions, the Farm Credit Board in 1933 selected his as the first president of the Houston Bank for Cooperatives. Holding this position for six years, he made a record that in 1940 brought him to the presidency of the Federal Land Bank of Houston.


