Council To Ponder \$351,284 Budget

We have been shocked the past week, as many farmers have been lately, of the devastation to the current maize crop by green bugs.

We knew that the bugs were posing a problem, and that they were thicker than usual, even invading the city in swarms, but we didn't realize just how serious they were.

One farmer friend of ours believes that the High Plain's maize crop may suffer by an average of 1,000 pounds per acre due to the pests. After viewing some fields in the immediate area, his estimate may have been light.

Green bugs are something which maize farmers haven't had to worry about to a great extent. They usually confine their damage to wheat. But this year they apparently "laid over" for the later crop.

The late maize is catching the worst of the ordeal, with entire fields of small milo being ruined. In fields of this nature, it's a far worse loss than a severe hailstorm would have brought, because hail usually misses some of the crop. In much of the younger maize, the bugs didn't miss a thing.

Spray planes have been working at a fast and furious pace the past couple of weeks, but for many farmers a lot of damage had already been done.

This being sort of a new threat to maize, most farmers didn't know to spray the bugs, and apparently neither did experiment station officials, who said after first seeing the bugs that they didn't recommend spraying -- and they still doubt the effectiveness of spraying the bugs.

But try to convince a farmer who has already lost one field to the insects not to spray -- it would be a hard job.

We're always glad to hear of new scholarships and this week's mail brought news of one which could be useful to many students. It makes tuition free to students from low-income families, who meet certain grade requirements.

Paul Thomas, student advisor at Cooke County Junior College in Gainesville, says the recently enacted law is probably known by less than one per cent of the general public, so he has initiated an advisory service to inform students of their rights under the law.

Under the Connally-Carrillo Act passed in 1967, a graduate of a Texas-accredited high school can attend a Texas state-supported college with tuition and fees paid by the state if the student was in the top quarter of his class and if his family's total income does not exceed \$4,800.

The junior college has set up an information office and asks students who might be eligible to write or call the scholarship advisor, Cooke County Junior College, Gainesville, Texas. Phone 817-HO 5-3476.

This being the time of month that it is -- when you start getting those once-a-month letters from all of your "friends" -- reminds us of something our daughter said last month.

Since we've been getting city mail delivery, we've made Laura the official mail-getter, something which is naturally, a daily adventure. However, it seemed like the first several days that we had city delivery, most of our mail consisted of bills.

After several days of procuring this sort of mail from our box, and hearing some of our comments after she had delivered it into the house, Laura finally asked "Well, what did we do wrong to get all these bills, Daddy?"

The Friona City Council will consider a proposed budget for 1968-69 amounting to \$351,284 at their meeting August 5 to city manager Jake Outland. The budget compares to that of \$304,284 for the previous year.

Outland stressed that the taxpayers are cordially invited to attend the meeting if they have any questions concerning the budget, or any proposed expenditures during the 1968-69 fiscal year.

Major maintenance items in the budget are headed by continued street maintenance at \$10,000, and water well maintenance estimated at \$4,000.

In the "capital outlay" column are such items as the city's comprehensive plan at \$6,000. Also included are a new cyclone fence to enclose the city dump ground, at \$7,000; a new water well at \$20,000; a new back hoe at \$5,000 and a new pickup (exchange) at \$2,000.

Also included are new Christmas decorations for the city. Likewise, a 3.5 per cent increase in salaries of employees is included.

Outland will recommend that the tax rate remain the same, at \$1.30 per \$100 assessed valuation. Tax evaluations increased approximately \$300,000 for the 1968-69 year, as compared to \$200,000 the previous year.

"By having this increase in evaluations, we will be able to continue at our old tax rate. I don't know how much longer we'll be able to go without increasing our sources of revenue," the city manager says. Outland pointed out that possible ways of getting additional revenue include a water tap fee, which many cities charge, additional trash collection fee (currently at \$1.00 per month for residences) or increasing the tax rate.

In his message to the council as a preface to the proposed budget, Outland said "Building, growth and expansion of Friona has rebounded reasonably from the previous budget year. Permits issued during the first six months of 1968 came to an estimated \$688,300 as compared to only \$209,500 for the same period of 1967. The completion and beginning of operations at Missouri Beef Packers has had a direct bearing upon our continued growth."

Monday's council meeting is at 8 p.m. in the city's board room.

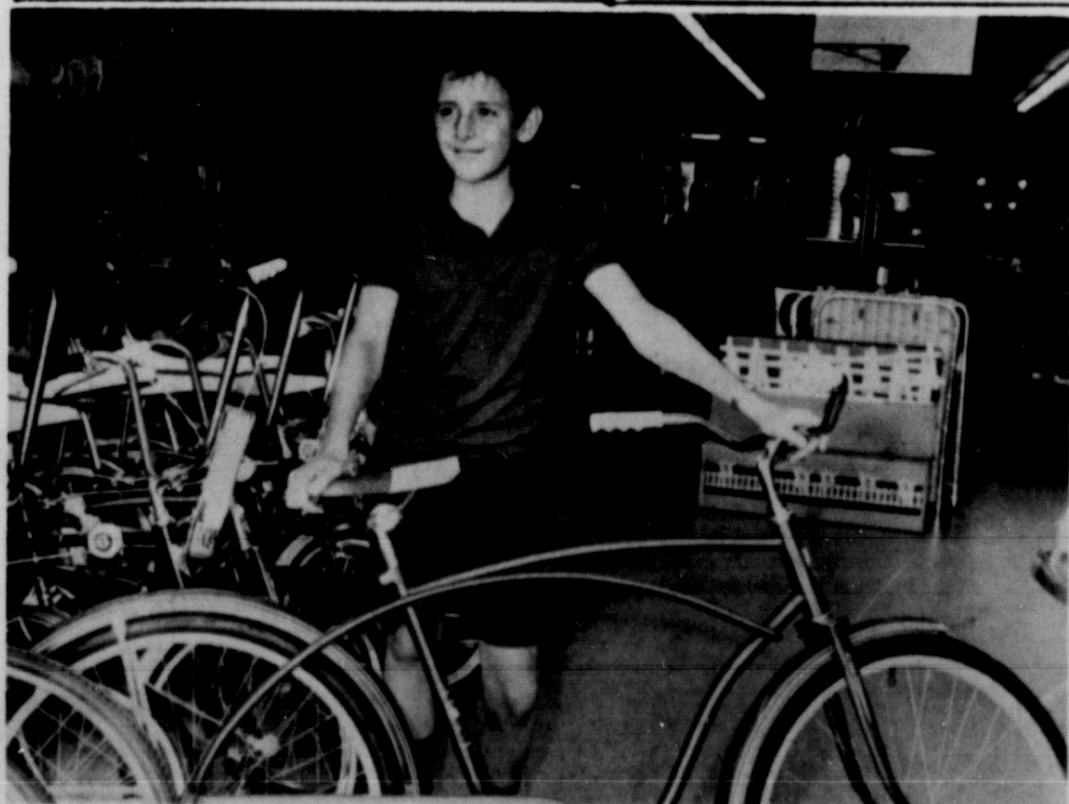
There will be only three places recognized in this year's contest. They will be Miss Maize Queen, first runner up and second runner up.

Damage Heavy On Late Milo

Farmers in the Friona area were taking inventory of their maize crops this week -- after coming face to face with a new adversary of the crop in recent weeks -- green bugs.

The bugs, which have usually limited their damage to wheat, and seldom were noticed in milo have accounted for thousands of dollars in damage to the 1968 crop, particularly to late-planted maize.

The bugs which are reportedly capable of reproducing themselves 100 times each, have sucked the life out of whole fields which were planted late -- mostly crops which followed wheat.

County Agent Ronnie McNutt said Tuesday that the infestation appeared to be thick over the entire county. McNutt said that entomologists at both Lubbock and Bushland experiment stations were not convinced that spraying the bugs will produce desired results. "However, our farmers have a lot of money invested in their maize, and they're not sitting still," McNutt said. He figured that practically 100 per cent of the maize would have been sprayed by the end of the week. Some fields have been sprayed twice.

McNutt said that one problem with spraying is that this also kills the beneficial insects, possibly leaving the door open later on for midge infestation.

The county agent also reported that there had been some reports of maize being burned by insecticide. "If this is just leaf burn, the plants should come out of it," he said.

It is harder for the green bugs to hurt the larger plants. The bugs have been observed, however, in maize heads on older plants. Even though they don't eat the grain, their secretion might hurt the plant, McNutt said.

At this point, it is difficult

to guess to what extent the 1968 crop will be hurt. McNutt estimated that there were 10,000 to 15,000 acres of maize planted on land following wheat crops in the county.

Since the bugs have stayed over from the 1968 wheat crops, McNutt said they may become a year-around problem, and may be a bigger problem than ever in wheat next year.

Farmers seem to be getting pretty good control where they have sprayed.

Spray planes have been working early and late in a feverish effort to cover the territory. Some pilots have been hospitalized temporarily with insecticide burn. All in all, it's been a pretty hectic period.

Third Bike Is Awarded

Maize Days is set for the week of September 9-14, with the parade on September 13.

Pause And Reflect

Crater Battlefield, Petersburg, Virginia ---
"For an instant a great dark cloud hung suspended over us. Then there descended upon us the contents of this cloud -- dirt and rocks, parts of trees, and fragments of human bodies."

So runs one surviving soldier's description of the first few moments following the explosion of the powder charge from which this Civil War battleground takes its name.

For seemed an eternity the two armies had faced each other in this wooded area just southeast of Petersburg.

Taken alone the village of Petersburg was not too important, but as a link in the defense of the Capital City of Richmond, it became a vital target.

Among the Union army laying siege to the city were a number of soldiers who had been coal miners in Pennsylvania. It was this group of men who first suggested that a tunnel be dug to a point under the Rebel lines and a charge of explosives be set off to allow a breakthrough into the city.

And so it came about that at 3:15 a.m. on July 30, 1864, the fuse leading to a charge of 8000 pounds of powder was lighted. The estimated time of 15 minutes from lighting to explosion passed and still all remained quiet and peaceful in the pre-dawn darkness.

An hour passed and just as the eastern sky became pale grey, two volunteers stepped forward and offered to crawl into the tunnel and relight the fuse.

They discovered that the fuse had burned out where it had been spliced. Relighting it they scrambled back out to safety and 30 minutes later the explosion took place.

Five hundred feet of Confederate trench was destroyed, 278 men were killed or wounded, and two of the four cannon at the salient were wrecked. A gaping hole 30 feet deep, 70 feet wide and 175 feet long contained a writhing, screaming mass of men.

However clever the plan and however daring its execution it failed in its primary purpose. After the first shock the Rebels rallied and by early afternoon were again entrenched in the area.

Today it remains a deep grass grown scar on the Virginia landscape. Granite monuments and bronze tablets attest to the valor of the brave men of both armies who died at the "Crater."

Tall straight pines stand guard over the unmarked graves and a respectful quiet prevails, even among the youthful visitors.

This week marks the 104th anniversary of the "Battle of the Crater."

Compared to the more spectacular wars of modern times it seems almost amateurish. However it bears remembering for one very important reason -- it remains one of the first examples of the white majorities concern for the black minority.

To understand this we must return to the Union lines during the night time hours of July 29-30, 1864.

General Burnside had in his command 4,300 negro troops who had been rested and refitted while the tunnel was being dug. It was his plan to have these troops spearhead the attack immediately following the blast.

Burnside was outranked by Meade and it was Meade's judgement that if the plan failed the Union army could be accused of wanting to get rid of the only negro troops then remaining in the army of the Potomac.

Burnside did not know of this change until the day before the battle. He revised his battle plan and sent in three divisions of white soldiers with the negroes.

Although the "Battle of the Crater" was counted a Confederate victory, the city of Petersburg was overrun and before another summer came the Rebels surrendered at Appomattox Court House.

The long horribly bloody American Civil War was over. The Union, Our Union, was preserved.

Now our task is to protect this unity and strength.

We will never do it by taking the negative approach nor by emphasizing the differences that exist between majorities, minorities, political parties, rich people, poor people or ethnic groups.

Ford Calls For Jobs As Best Answer To Poverty

Frank Ford, Republican candidate for State Representative has called for greater effort in providing skills training for the under-employed. Stating that "Jobs are the best answer to poverty," he has proposed a plan to utilize existing school facilities and volunteer teachers to step up adult education in Texas that will meet the needs for those skills that will be required for jobs in the 1970's.

"With increasing mechanization of farm labor and other low skill jobs in Texas," said Ford, "the need for job training is well recognized, and I am not satisfied with the current progress in education."

"Industry must continue to assume a greater role in education, and there must be greater state appropriations for learning as well as increased local effort for education and vocational training. However,

with our rapidly increasing tax burden, we find ourselves walking a tightrope. This points up the need for mobilizing those who are willing to volunteer their time and talents to help others become more productive, self-supporting citizens."

"We have many talented retired individuals and others with great ability and a thorough knowledge of a productive skill," Ford concluded, "who have voiced a willingness to offer their services in a well-planned, practical program to meet this pressing need. With this volunteer teaching corps, the utilization of existing facilities during idle hours, and only a token increase in tax cost, giant strides forward can be made in Texas education."

Ford is a candidate in the 72nd Legislative District, including Cochran, Lamb, Bailey, Castro, Farmer and Deaf Smith Counties.

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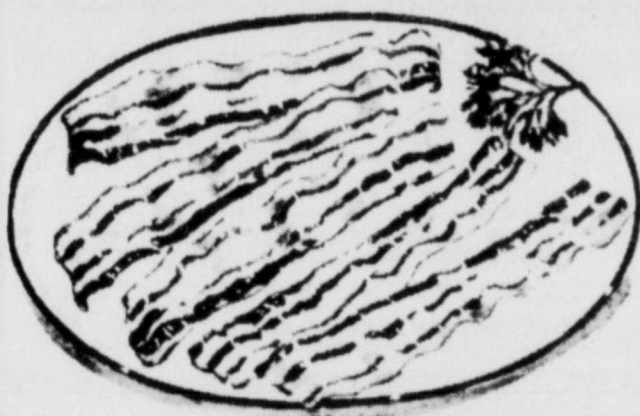

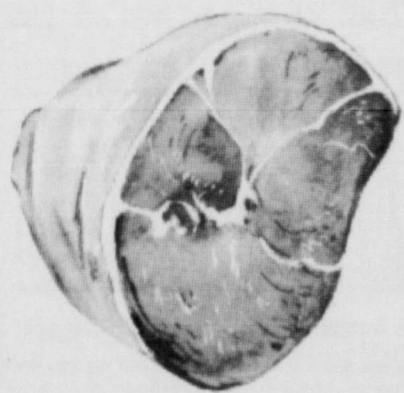

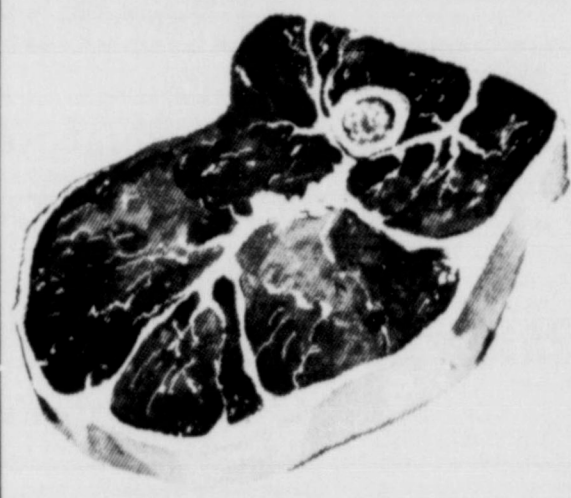

Pat Roberts Reports On Trip To Girl's State

The 1968 session of Bluebonnet Girls' State was held on the campus of St. Edwards University, Austin, Texas, June 11-20. It is a beautiful place and other than having to stand the heat I had a wonderful time.

I have found that some people don't know exactly what Girls' State is, well, I'll try to explain it. This is a mythical state that the girls attending organize. They first elect city, county and then state officials. The girls run the government and it is just like the real thing. At Girls State we learned by doing and believe me, we learned.

In my own city we chose our city charter as that like the one of Waco, Texas. Our officials carried on exactly like the city officials of any city. Some examples are: the tax collector collected tax for our shoes as transportation, our boyfriends' pictures as personal property and on contact lenses or eyeglasses. We had lanes in our halls and if we ran, which was speeding or walked on the wrong side of the "street" we were given a ticket by the policemen. The same happened if we didn't stop or yield at the signs. The Justice of the Peace had a wedding ceremony and married all of us to our boyfriends' pictures. We even made rings

and bouquets. It was a dandy time. These are just a few examples but all of our officials did their actual jobs.

The counties were the same way. The tax collector collected taxes again and now I know how our parents feel about taxes. We had a trial with an elected judge and appointed the jury. It was "City B vs. Counselor Drake." In the end it was declared a mis-trial because it was a city problem held in a county court.

Sunday, June 16, was our state election day. It was so exciting I couldn't believe it. We had two parties, the Nationalists and the Federalists. We had already had the primary elections and run-offs so there was just one candidate per party for each office. First we heard a speech from each of them and then balloted. Now it means so much to me to be rooting for one person and in the end know that my vote counts. All of the girls I voted for got it except one and she was in the opposite party anyway. Out of the ten state offices, girls from my party got nine of them. That makes you feel just pretty good.

We had some of the most wonderful speakers. Among them were: Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, Rep. Gov. Nom. Paul Eggers, Speaker of the House Ben Barnes, Senator from Harris County, Barbara Jordan, Librarian, Library of Congress, Anne Hodges, Jack Cox and many others who were great. Some of these people are so different from what you see on the news or TV programs. Some for the better and some for the worse, but it was still fabulous.

There was a lady there who gave us our city, county and state government lectures. She was Miss Virginia Kennedy. She majored in government and really knew what she was talking about. We learned a lot that will really stick with us.

At Girls' State we learned pride for our country, state and city and respect for our fellowman and his ideas. Every day we had a flag raising and flag lowering. Before the ceremony started the cities would line up

and sing city songs and chants to see who could be the loudest. It was like one giant pep rally with all the opposing teams there. After a little while we would sing as a group. We learned some of the most beautiful songs I've ever heard. Those that I knew had a brighter ring to them. When you have 420 girls blending voices for one cause it is nearly too much.

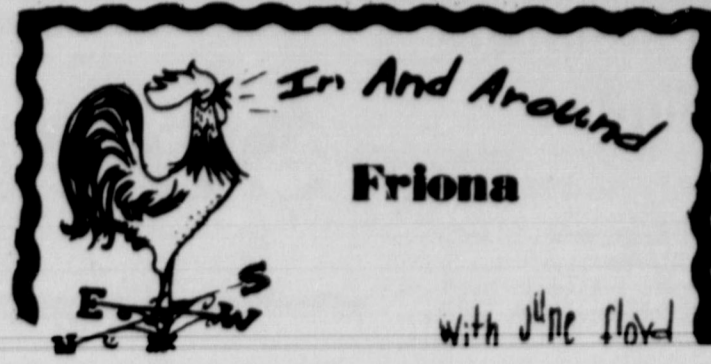
The organizer and director of Girls' State is Miss Frances Goff. She is as good as gold and we citizens of Girls' State learn to love her for the rest of our lives. At first you are scared to death of her but later you learn that she is great but you sure better do what she says.

For our governor's inauguration we went to the capitol. We were given two and a half hours but I found I needed two days to see everything. The capital was different from what I thought but more beautiful. All of us met in the rotunda and sang our songs for everyone it sounded great and the ceremony was just great.

During our visit to the capitol we got to visit the House of Representatives and Senate while they were in session. This impressed me so deeply. At first I was so disappointed I wanted to cry. Then Barbara Jordan, Senator from Harris County explained that the lag in business was waiting for the big Liquor-by-the-Drink bill to come up. So now I feel a lot better about the way our government is running than at first glance.

As all good things do, this session ended. It ended after meeting friends whom you will always remember. Girls who you will want to take some extra time to write to or call when you pass through their city or make a special trip to see. It ended after learning what being a citizen of the United States Texas, Farmer County and Friona meant to me. And it ended after I had the most wonderful ten days of my life. The only regret I have is that just one girl from a school can go. I wish everyone could spend at least one day at Girls' State because you will learn so much in that one day.

In ending I would like to take this time to thank each member of the American Legion Auxiliary of Friona. No one but a citizen of Girls' State can know how deeply I feel when I say the small words "Thank you." One thought I learned through Girls' State that I will always remember goes like this: "Place your hand in the hand of God, be true to yourself walk uprightly and everything will be all right."

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

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by this the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state.

"There is hereby created as

an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Employees Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the custodian of said moneys and securities. Said board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of

the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System including land, equipment, and office building; or in such corporate bonds, notes, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its

successors; and provided further, that not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) at any one time of the book value of investments of said Fund shall be invested in Government and Municipal Securities as enumerated above. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any enabling legislation."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 5, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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Vacationers Warned Of Poisonous Vegetation

"The summertime beauty of our State's lush vegetation in yards, fields, pastures, and woodlands also holds dangers that the public should heed," H.N. Smith, State Conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Temple, Texas, warned this week.

Smith said that throughout the U.S. and Canada more than 700 species of plants are known to cause death, illness or extreme discomfort to people.

"Chewing, swallowing or otherwise contacting the toxic parts of certain plants, trees and shrubs takes a heavy toll," Smith said. "Each year health services report that about 12,000 children are poisoned or injured by these sources."

Parents should be concerned, the SCS official stated, because many of the plants are quite common in flower and vegetable gardens, and in ornamental landscaping, as well as in wild places. Bulbs, roots, seeds, leaves, beans, stems or berries may contain poison, depending on the species of the plant.

The beautiful oleander bush, for example, grown all over the country, contains a deadly heart stimulant similar to the drug digitalis. The toxin is so strong that a single leaf can kill a child. People have died merely from eating steaks speared on oleander twigs and roasted over a fire.

The popular Christmas flow-

er poinsettia is full of an acid, burning juice, so lethal that a child who consumes one leaf might die. Mistletoe berries can also be deadly.

Peach tree leaves contain hydrocyanic acid, one of the most dangerous poisons known. Potato and tomato plants, close kin to the deadly nightshade, have foliage that contains alkaloid poisons which can cause severe digestive upset and nervous disorder if eaten.

Jimson weed, sometimes called thorn apple and stinkweed, grows almost everywhere and causes more poisoning than any other plant. It grows from 2 to 5 feet tall, has large leaves and white funnel-shaped flowers resembling morning glories. All parts are poisonous, especially seeds and leaves.

Duffenbachia, or dumb cane, is a beautiful house plant grown in millions of homes, but merely biting its stalk can cause swelling of the mouth and tongue that can be deadly. It is called dumb cane because of its power to strike its victims speechless. The stalk contains needle-like crystals of calcium oxalate that become imbedded in the tissue of the mouth and ton-

gue causing severe swelling and pain.

Castor beans seeds are especially dangerous because they are so deadly and so readily available. They are sold in garden stores for about 25¢ a packet and are popular because they produce large, lush plants in one season. Yet each seed contains enough ricin, a powerful blood poison, to kill a child.

Mescalbean, or mountain laurel, is also dangerous. It has a poison bean with a hard coat. If it is swallowed whole there may be no ill effects, but if chewed or crushed it can be lethal.

Other common plants in Texas that have poisonous parts include elephant ear, larkspur, azaleas, lantana canana, yew, oaks, water hemlock, poison hemlock, poisoning, poison oak, and poison sumac.

It's always a temptation to save seeds from a particularly fine flower but if it is of a hybrid variety there is little advantage in so doing. The seedlings grown from your home-saved seeds will not produce flowers like those of the parent bloom. In fact the blossoms will vary in size and color and many will be inferior.

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 21. All stationery and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contract."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows:

"Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax paid on the first sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."
