March of Dimes Drive Rolls On; 'Fund Night' Planned Friday

With approximately \$300 collected as the result of a variety of fund-raising programs last Saturday, the 1954 March of Dimes drive planned to roll forward this week, weather permitting.

There's no telling how much more funds could have been collected last Saturday had the weatherman cooperated, one official said this week. However, most of the organizations whose drives were held last week planned to repeat them because of the cold weather.

Number One donor last week purchased \$185 worth of articles donated by local merchants, through an auction sale held on the courthouse lawn. However, when the bidding began to lag below cost on the items, Roy Allsup, chairman of the drive, ordered it stopped until another day when weather would bring out more bidders.

Across the street the Jaycees buffeted wind and even snow until nearly dark but could only coax 930 dimes for their "block of dimes" drive. It took them

almost past two buildings. They plan to start again Saturday, if the weather is warmer, where they left off last week. The block will start at 1 p.m.

The Chelelo Campfire girls raised \$17 in a "tag day" held last Saturday and different groups of the girls will continue to hold these tag days through the 1st Saturday in January.

A cushion polo match, despite rugged cold weather which discouraged many from not even going to see if the match would be held, added another \$14 in funds to the drive. It also will be repeated according to the drive chairman, Mrs. Albert Morrow.

Thus, approximately \$309 was netted in the first salvo of programs. Yet to come, in addition to all the "replays" will be a coffee morning sponsored by the Town and Country Study Club Saturday, Jan. 23, in the activity building, from 9 until 11 a.m. Coffee and doughnuts will be sold with funds to go to the MOD.

J. T. Porter at the Steak House will also sponsor a coffee fund

program. All coffee purchased at the Steak House, Saturday, will be paid for by the guests at a "whatever donation you can make" price in MOD containers on the tables.

One new program has been added to the drive. A fund night, Friday, at the Office and Activities Building will feature tables of almost any type of card game or dominoes anyone wants to play.

Starting at 8 p.m., and continuing as long as you wish, the games will be played and refreshments will be served by the various community game clubs. Admission will be 50 cents per person and everyone is urged to attend, bring whatever game you wish to play and even bring the players if you so desire.

Two more programs which still haven't been completely ironed out, will aid the MOD this month. The Lions Club will sponsor a benefit basketball game with a halftime program of interest to everyone in Morton and the "Mother's March on Polio" will cap the long drive, January 29th.

Call \$110,000 Election

A \$110,000 bond election, asking for the right to issue bonds of \$95,000 for improvement, enlargement, and extension of the city's waterworks and an additional \$15,000 in bonds for the improvement of the sewer system; and also asking the right to levy a tax to take care of the situation has been called by the Morton City Commission.

In an ordinance passed at their meeting Jan. 4, the commission voted to put the proposition to the qualified taxpayers of this city, January 34, in a vote to be held at the City Hall.

J. B. Knox has been named presiding judge of the election with Hume Russell appointed associate. Clerks will be J. R. Ward and Roy Allsup.

Voters will cast separate votes for the two propositions. In other words, the \$95,000 bonds could be passed without voters okaying the \$15,000 companion bond, or vice-versa. The ordinance does not state what the tax payment to be levied would be, simply asks for the right to levy the tax.

It'll be the second in a long series of very important elections to be held in the city and country throughout 1954. Perhaps more elections will be held this year than ever before in the history of the city.

The commission members themselves and the mayor will be involved in the regular city elections early in May unless they

choose not to run for re-election. In addition, the county, district and state elections will be held in July and August and a school election in which all seven trustees will be voted upon will be coming up.

Just last Saturday, J. W. McDermott was elected Supervisor of Soil Conservation Sub-District 5 in a meeting of seven area farmers. It was the third time the election was slated before a new

supervisor was selected.

Concerning the bond election coming up, Gipson said this week that the water improvements were badly needed. He pointed out that last summer, more than once, the city came dangerously close to using all the water they could pump. Another storage tank, part of the proposed addition, would alleviate this situation, Gipson said.

County FHA Committee Telegraphs; 'Farmers Urgently Need P&S Loans'

Since there is no more cotton seed meal or pellets available for emergency drouth feed the farmers and ranchers are suffering during these cold months.

This may not interest all the distressed cattlemen, but corn and wheat are still available under the emergency drouth feed act. The price of shelled corn in bulk is \$1 per bushel and wheat \$1.10 per bushel. There is a mixed feed program in operation, too. It works like this: A certificate of eligibility is still required by the county USDA Drouth Committee which shall approve individual application for corn or wheat as in the past. If you want mixes of feed, either I or II mix—sign drouth emergency for No. 5. The committee shall indicate on this amount of feed the individual may purchase.

Under plan of operation of mixed feed, see your local feed distributor. Distributors can sell Mix I or Mix II drouth emergency mixed feed at price which will reflect the cost of corn or wheat to be obtained from CCC. The formula for Mix I feed shall be 1,000 pounds wheat per ton of mixed feed produced. The formula for mixture II feed shall contain 1,000 pounds corn per ton mixed feed produced. Mixed feed distributors may order corn in car load lots from Kansas City OCS Commodity office, or wheat in car load lots from Commodity office serving the area in which feed mixing plant is located in quantities equivalent to the quantities delivered to farmers and ranchers under this program.

The mixer shall be required to label each bag, "Drouth Emergency Feed Mix I", or same for Mix II, and shall attach a tag on each bag listing all the ingredients and quantity on each bag.

Cochran County FHA Committee met January 5, and approved about 35 disaster loans.

The FHA has run out of funds on production and subsistence loans several weeks ago. This type of fund is used to keep many farmers credit available who are already indebted to banks, PCA or some other credit institution, and who need credit on order to continue their farming operations, but these institutions have carried them as far as they can go. The P. and S. funds for FHA can, if made available, be used to refinance these loans and give future credit assistance to those who need this type of loan.

Cong. George Mahon was contacted in Washington, D. C. Jan. 5, 1954, by J. W. McDermott of Morton. Mr. Mahon informed McDermott that he was introducing a bill in Congress Wednesday, Jan. 6, requesting \$100,000,000 for P. and S. funds for FHA.

Mr. Mahon suggested that telegrams be sent to the following: so the committee did just that. Here they are and what was in the telegram:

Dwight D. Eisenhower, President, Washington, D.C.; George Mahon, House of Representatives, Washington, D.C.; Price Daniel, Senate, Washington, D.C.; Lyndon Johnson, Senate, Washington, D.C.; Ezra Taft Benson, Secretary of Agriculture, USDA, Washington, D.C.

"All production and subsistence loan funds of Farmers Home Administration exhausted. About 100 farmers of Cochran County need this type loan.

"Farmers need refinancing which cannot meet renewal requirements with banks. Second drouth year in row just experienced and 1954 farming operations being delayed.

Minimum estimated J. and S. funds need locally, \$500,000.

"Urge your help in getting this type loan made available immediately." — Signed Roy Hill, Chairman, Cochran County FHA Committee and J. W. McDermott,

Chairman, Agricultural Committee, Morton Chamber of Commerce.

Also, another telegram was sent to Administrator FHA in Washington. Here is who it went to and the contents of the telegram:

To R. B. McLeish, Administrator FHA, South Agricultural Building, 14th and Independence Avenue, Washington, D.C.:

"You perhaps do not realize all P. and S. funds are depleted. Need this type loan more than ever due to drouth. Approximately 100 farmers need this type loan. Due to lack of collateral banks unable to renew this type loan. Need \$500,000 P. and S. type funds now.

"Second drouth year in row just experienced and 1954 farming operations being delayed. Urge you to ask Congress to get these P. and S. funds available at once.

"An assistant county supervisor and clerk typist needed for this county now."

Former Local Store Owners Die In Crash

Eight persons, at least two of them former Mortonites, were killed in a flaming auto-ber crash at Truth or Consequences, N. M., late Tuesday.

Mr. and Mrs. H. F. Lafferty who formerly operated two different grocery stores in Morton were killed along with a Mr. and Mrs. Slim Servers and their four children. All were living in Elfreida, Ariz. The car, apparently out of control, plunged through a bridge shearing off several concrete abutments, and dropped off the edge into a dry creek bed and burned. Five were trapped inside the wreckage.

The driver of the beer truck escaped with internal injuries and was suffering from shock.

The Servers killed, were in-laws to Mrs. Lafferty's daughter whose name is also Servers.

The Laffertys owned the grocery store now operated by Was Lackey several years ago and then later owned the grocery store operated by Elmo Seavey. They sold it to Seavey in 1949.

Funeral services will be held in Mesa, Arizona for Mr. and Mrs. Lafferty on Saturday.

Nicewarner Rites Held Sunday

Final rites were held Sunday at 2:30 p.m. in the First Baptist Church for Herman B. Nicewarner, 81-year-old long time resident of Morton who died early Saturday morning in the County Hospital after a long illness.

Born March 22, 1872 in Missouri, Nicewarner moved to Morton from Fannin County in 1929. He had been a resident on a farm near here until about 10 years ago when he retired and moved to Morton following the death of his wife. Actually he had been ill for nearly a year, but the most recent serious illness lasted about three weeks.

Survivors include one son of Morton, Joe Nicewarner. Others include three daughters, Miss Lillian Nicewarner, Canton, Ohio; Mrs. Eunice Pilliod of Garland, Texas; and Mrs. Ruby Hollis of Gail; and two grand-children.

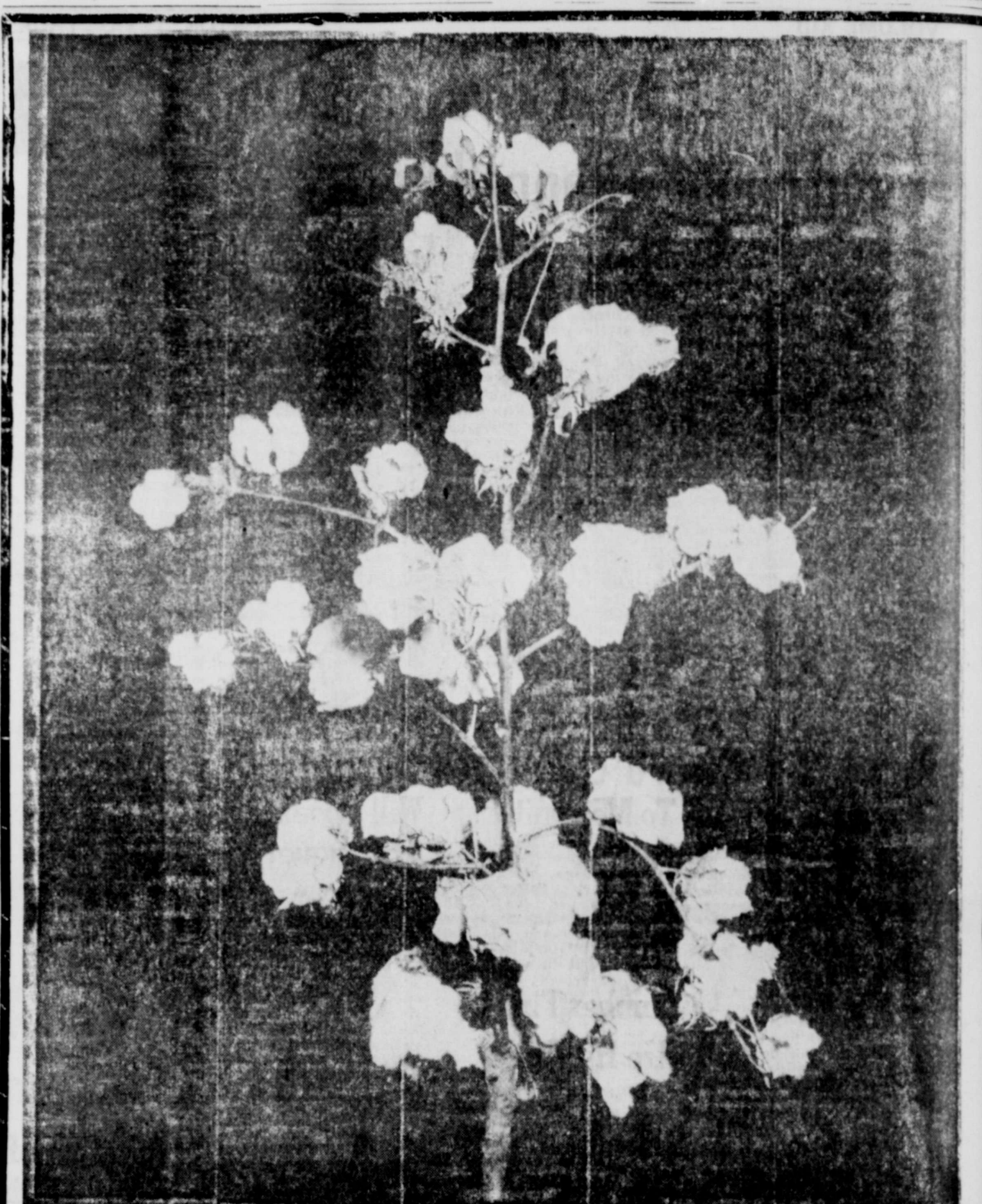

Dixie and Donna are dairy food leaders for the Neely Ward 4-H Club. They attended a training meeting to get material for their club meeting.

The program Dixie and Donna will give is cottage cheese tomato salad. Donna would like to share this recipe with you.

6 tomatoes, lettuce or other salad greens, salt, paprika, if desired, 2 cups cottage cheese, 1 green pepper, chopped fine; 1 onion, chopped fine; French dressing, if desired. Combine the cottage cheese, onion and green pepper. Season with salt. Remove stem core from tomatoes. Cut each tomato in sixths two-thirds through toward the blossom end. Spread the sections part as the tomatoes are placed on a bed of salad greens. Fill center with cottage cheese mixture. Add French dressing, if desired or garnish with paprika. The girls completed the menu with, broiled hamburgers, pickles, onions, cottage cheese tomato salad, oatmeal cookies and milk. Dixie would like to tell you how they fixed the hamburgers — spread 1/4 pound ground round or hamburger meat evenly on 2 sides bun. Place on broiler rack and broil from 10 to 15 minutes. When done add salt, mustard, pickle and onions to taste. Put bun together and serve while hot.

Donna agreed that this broiled hamburger is juicy and no skill to wash since the meat is cooked on the broiler.

The girls didn't forget to serve the meal attractively — center piece, place mats, napkins and good table manners.

Donna and Dixie are making plans to enter the district dairy foods contest. Giving this program to the 4-H Clubs will be good experience for them.

We think the girls have real possibilities in this field of food preparation and we look forward to working with them.
