Questions Answered On Sales Tax Proposition

As we pointed out in this space a week ago, this is a "special edition" of the Friona Star. Maybe not special by way of having lots of pages nor a special event to commemorate, but mainly because of the date the paper bears this week.

Today's issue is the first time in the history of the Friona Star that the Star has been published with the "leap year" date of February 29.

Since this "extra day" only happens once every four years, it happens on a weekly newspaper's press day only once every 28 years.

While the Star is 43 years old it should have already had at least one issue dated on February 29, but missed it by changing printing dates.

The last time February 29 fell on a Thursday, in 1940, the Star was carrying a Friday date line, so missed having the unusual date by a day. In 1952, February 29 did fall on a Friday, but alas -- the Star had switched to a Thursday date line by then, and this time came out on February 28.

As a fellow newspaperman puts it, there aren't many editors around who have been able to date more than a couple of issues on February 29. And at the rate it happens, many of those doing so this year may not be around the next opportunity, which isn't until 1996.

Coffee will be served. Smith will speak briefly and answer questions from those present.

A Muleshoe tax specialist told a Friona audience Monday that the proposed one per cent city sales tax could increase the city's tax revenues as much as 40 per cent.

"Generally, all items which are subject to the state's two per cent sales tax are also subject to the one per cent city tax," Alex Williams told a small gathering at the junior high school auditorium. Williams is a Certified Public Accountant in Muleshoe.

The tax specialist also pointed out that passing the sales tax would not hurt local business. He showed that if people thought they could drive elsewhere to save money, they would have to buy \$100 worth in order to save \$1. Deducting automobile expenses, Williams showed that one would have to spend several hundred dollars if he drove very far at all, to merely break even. Friona residents will vote on the proposed tax during the regular city election on April 6.

Mayor W.L. (Preach) Edelman outlined the needs of the city in the near future, which will necessitate some sort of additional revenues.

"We do not mean to imply here that the city is in bad shape financially - not by any means. However, we must make a decision as to how we want the city to progress," Edelman told the group.

"If you turn the sales tax down, it would be two years before you could vote on it again," Williams pointed out. Once the one per cent tax has been voted, it cannot be increased -- one per cent is the limit. It can be revoked, however, by a similar election at a later date, he explained.

If the tax is passed, local businesses would add the one per cent to their quarterly tax reports. The state comptroller collects the taxes, and after computing the amount of tax due to the city, makes a check out for the amount, less two per cent of the total tax, for its book-keeping fees.

"The sales tax has more equity in Texas than any other types of tax," Williams told the gathering.

He answered several questions about the tax by means of an illustrated chart. The questions were as follows:

1. Q. What items are subject to the one per cent municipal sales tax? A. The one per cent sales tax is applicable only to those sales now

taxed under the state sales and use tax act.

2. Q. There is a two per cent state tax on automobiles. Would the city sales tax also apply to automobile sales? A. No.

The two per cent state tax on automobiles is an excise tax; the municipal sales tax wouldn't apply to automobile sales.

3. Q. Does the city sales tax apply to sales at wholesale? A. No, only to retail sales.

Goods sold for resale are not taxable.

4. Q. Are city sales tax payments deductible on our Federal income tax reports? A. Yes.

5. Q. Does the city municipal sales tax apply to purchases by units of government (county, state, other cities, etc.)? A. No, all are exempt.

6. Q. Does a person residing outside the city limits

pay the one per cent municipal sales tax? A. Yes, when he makes a purchase of personal property subject to the tax in a city which has adopted the local sales tax.

In return, he enjoys the city's streets, facilities, police protection and other advantages of the city for which city residents pay the major share.

7. Q. Assuming that city

Only 30% Of Vehicles Inspected In County

Only 2,940 vehicles had been inspected in Parmer County as of Tuesday of this week, according to Ed Richards, of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

This compares to a total of 8,169 registered vehicles in the county, or only 30 per cent of the vehicles which have been registered.

Richards said that Department of Public Safety predictions showed that approximately 40 per cent of the total vehicles in the state would be inspected by March 1. This is well below the acceptable level, and also well below last year's pace at this time, he pointed out.

Official inspection stations in Friona are Automotive Ignition Company, Friona Motors and Reeve Chevrolet.

Richards stated that the Department of Public Safety was concerned about having a possible shortage of seat belts at the deadline time. Many of the inspection houses and automo-

bile supply houses have been trying to "guess" how many of the belts they will need, and it just might happen that the belts will become scarce as the deadline approaches, Richards says.

Most vehicles made since 1962 must have front seat belts in order to receive their safety inspection sticker for 1968. If they have "manufacturer's anchorages," then they must have the belts. In many cases, this consists only of threaded holes in the floorboard of the car, the DPS official concluded.

Leap-Year 'Babies' Range From 3-19

Some say it's unlucky to be born around Christmas, because you're apt to be left out or at least slighted when it comes to birthday presents.

But consider those born on February 29 -- they only get a chance to have a "real" birthday every four years.

This week we're saluting these who don't have many birthdays.

The Star located six persons in the Friona area who are celebrating birthdays all the way from three to 19 -- or 12 to 80, if you prefer.

In fact, in one case a father and daughter (Glenn and Susan Floyd) are both celebrating their 15th birthday this year -- and this is probably about as rare as a February 29th birthday itself!

Mrs. Maggie Miller, the mother of Mrs. W.R. Mabry is the senior among the six who are having birthdays, having been born on the leap year date in 1888. Besides only getting one chance every four years to celebrate a birthday, Mrs. Miller says that one time on leap year February didn't have 29 days -- so she is actually just 19.

C. Glenn Floyd was born on February 29, 1908, so this is the 15th recurrence of the leap year date. Daughter Susan's

birthday rolls around for the 15th time on May 10.

"I was born in a half-dugout near Portales," Floyd relates. "So I not only miss three birthdays out of four, but had the misfortune of being born in New Mexico, to boot," he jokes.

4 Announce In City Race

Four candidates had announced for seats on the Friona City Council as of Tuesday, according to City Manager, Jake Outland.

Announcing are Rene Sneed (incumbent), Robert Neelley, Charles Everett and Ed Clark, W.L. (Preach) Edelman, incumbent mayor, is the only candidate announced for that position.

Two aldermen will be elected. Terms of Sneed and Dr. Lee Cranfill are expiring. Dr. Cranfill moved from the city in late 1967.

Deadline for filing is March 6. The city election will be held on Saturday, April 6. Also on the ballot that day will be the question of imposing the one per cent city sales tax (see discussion elsewhere on this page).

This leaves only around \$350 that will need to come in from outside donations. Friona enjoyed the benefits of having exchange students from the years 1962 to 1966. The program has been dropped for the past two years, but recent interest has provided a new committee and possibilities of renewing the program again soon in Friona.

This study, under the supervision of the Bushland Experiment Station, was conducted on an Amarillo Fine Sandy Loam soil. Donald Christian was the cooperator on this test. The farm is located 1-1/2 miles north of Lariat.

In this test a comparison was made of yields from different time of applications of nitrogen under the two irrigation systems.

Visual differences between furrow and sprinkler irrigation observed in the field were not reflected in the yield. There appears to be no consistent differences between the two methods used in this study.

The check plot under the sprinkler method yielded 3140 lbs. compared to 3220 lbs. under the furrow method. Where all of the nitrogen was applied preplant under the sprinkler method the highest yield of 5440 lbs. was made from a 120-80-0 application. A high yield of 6360 lbs. was made from an 80-80-0 application with half of the nitrogen put on preplant and half sidedressed. The high-

est yield of 5180 was received from a 160-80-0 application under the furrow method.

Based on these data, the advantage of split applications over all-preplant appears to be due to something other than correcting losses due to leaching, according to Wendell Robertson, research associate at Bushland.

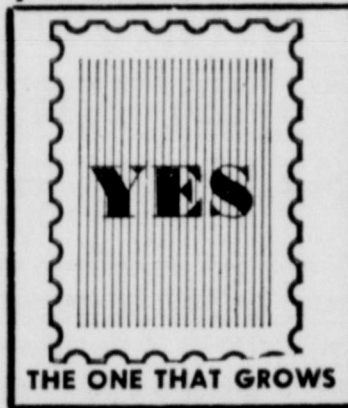

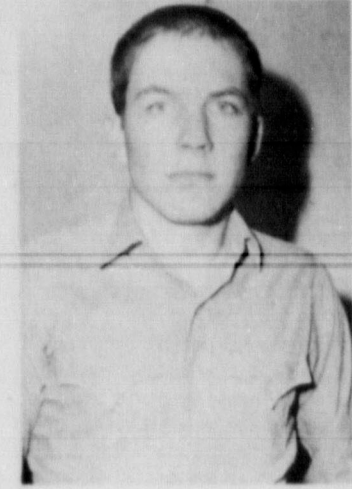

Sales Tax Question...

(Continued From Page 1)

8. Q. If merchandise is ordered from a mail order business in City "A", which has the local sales tax, for delivery in city "B", which also has the tax, which city is eligible to collect on the sale? A. City "A" collects, since it is the point of sale, rather than delivery.

9. Q. What are some of the items which are exempt from the one per cent city sales tax? A. Among many other exempt items are included cigarettes, cigars, automobiles, water, telephone and telegraph, meals served by hospitals to patients, meals sold by a church food products which are not prepared for eating, prescription medicines and prescription eyeglasses, cement, alcoholic beverages (unless included on meals), gasoline, farm machinery and products which will be used in the manufacture of another product which is not subject to this tax. A complete list of exempt items is available from the State Comptroller, Austin, Texas.

10. Q. Who can vote on the one per cent local sales tax? A. Any registered voter in the city. A simple majority is required to put the sales tax into effect.

11. Q. Why should the local businessman favor the city sales tax? Poor city services mean poor business, while well-financed and efficient municipal services attract new people to live and trade in the city. More people mean more business and a more active economy.

12. Q. Will a local sales tax hurt business? A. No. The experience of cities in other states has proven that a sales tax will not hurt the retail sales business in a community. Rather, a clean, attractive and well-run city attracts people, makes it grow and makes business better.

13. Q. Why should a resident property owner favor this kind of tax? A. Proper police and fire protection will protect the property owner's investment in his home, and high-quality streets, parks and other municipal facilities provide a suitable environment in which to live. The money to support these services must be derived from some source, which has to this time been primarily property taxes.

14. Q. Why should a city dweller who rents his residence favor the local sales tax? A. For one matter, the person who rents enjoys the same services available to the property owner. For another, if it is necessary for the city to raise property taxes, the increased cost of this tax will be passed along in the form of higher rent charges.

15. Q. Is the local sales tax regressive... that is, will it cause a particular hardship for lower-income families? A. A sales tax has more elements of equity than any other type of tax, and this is particularly true in Texas, since so many essential items are exempt from the sales tax.

16. Q. To whom will the local merchant report and pay the local sales tax? A. Reports and remittances will be made to the State Comptroller in Austin.

17. Q. How is the Comptroller reimbursed for expenses incurred by his office in collecting the local sales tax? A. The Comptroller is permitted by law to retain two per cent of the total in local sales taxes collected.

18. Q. Who will enforce the municipal sales tax? A. The State Comptroller is authorized by law to administer and enforce the local sales tax.

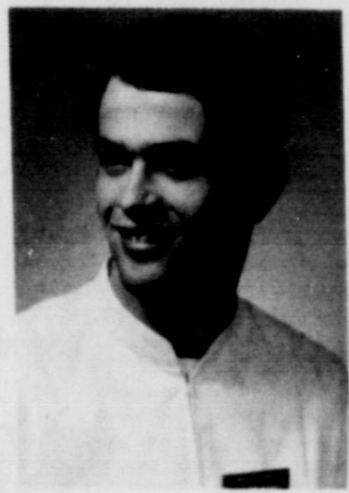

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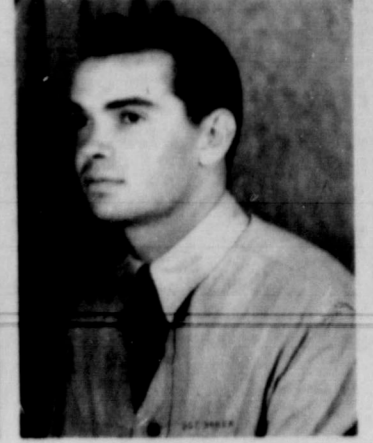

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

Homemakers Study Hair Fashions

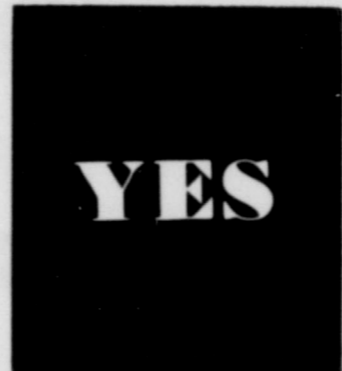
