## Grand Jury Meets April 9th

Cochran County faces a busy & crucial period within the next two weeks with a lot of outside activity such as the Fat Stock Show and two elections outwardly overshadowing what might be a costly \$200,000 decision to the county in two oil tax hearings set for a week from Monday.

That the day the District Court is scheduled to reopen hearing in a suit by the two oil companies, Magnolia and Continental. Actually its two separate suits, but their similarity in nature has caused them to be placed on the docket at the same time.

As if that won't create stir enough around the courthouse, its time for the April Grand Jury to go into session.

The Jury Commission met this week to select the Grand Jurors, but the names have not yet been announced nor has the list of cases they'll have to consider been released. However, the last Grand Jury passed some five cases and it is presumed that these, as well as others which involve dealings since that time, will be considered.

Discrimination, is basically the charge of the oil companies, claiming their land has been valued excessively high in comparison with other oil companies. District Court has already granted a temporary restraining order preventing them from having to pay the taxes until the matter which involves in the neighborhood of \$200,000 in tax money is settled. Asked last fall during the budget hearing what he thought of the situation on Cochran County if they lost the suit, the Commissioner's Court answered only that they were sure they will not lose the suit.

The hearing will be held in Judge Victor H. Lindsay's 72nd District Court at 10 a.m. Monday, April 9th, providing other cases on the docket are completed by that time. The postponement was granted last month due to the illness of the legal council representing the oil companies.

### GIRLSTOWN, USA TO KEEP LICENSE: AT LEAST FOR THE PRESENT, IS ORDER

The State Board of Public Welfare, after reading the findings of a specially appointed advisory committee of Child caring institution managers to conduct a hearing on Girlstown, U.S.A., announced on Thursday that they had decided to give the Cochran County institution for girls a chance to meet the state standards and retain their license.

In not revoking the license immediately, the State Board emphasized that the Board of Directors of Girlstown should make some changes in their constitution and by-laws, and some changes in the method of former operation.

John Winters, executive director of the Welfare Board, read the committee report to the Board members, who in turn, issued their unanimous decision not to revoke the license at this time. Specifically the special committee recommended:

The managing director should draw a reasonable salary rather than the \$100 per month now provided.

The managing director shouldn't be a member of the Board of Directors of Girlstown.

Board members should try to be present at all board meetings and no proxy votes should be allowed.

The managing director should attend child care workshops and conferences.

As to the question raised in a court hearing by Miss Amelia Anthony, as to the authority of the State Welfare Board, they unanimously agreed they had the authority to revoke the license; but added a promise to work with the Girlstown directors in any way possible to preserve the institution.

However, they emphasized, the license would be revoked if the institution does not meet the standards set up by the state.

Thus ended a several week controversy capped by a three day hearing in Austin before an advisory board.

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### WHY WERE YOU BAPTIZED?

This question is applicable to all who have entered into this realm of religious obedience. In the religious world we hear of, read of and witness four kinds of baptism. We hear of the Holy Spirit baptism, and we witness sprinkling, pouring and immersion. When we study the Bible, we read of ONE baptism, Eph. 4:5, and the apostle Paul said it was a burial (Rom. 6:3-4). Therefore, if you were not immersed, buried in water, and that predicated by a genuine faith in God and Christ as His Son, this faith leading you to repentance; you have not been scripturally baptized. Hence, you stand in need of baptism. You are the one to make the decision.

But why did you go through the form called baptism? Or, if you were immersed, buried in water, why were you immersed? The Bible teaches all of us to be baptized for one purpose only, and that is "for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38). The Jews said: "What shall we do?" Evidently they were asking what to do in order to obtain pardon from sins. Much depends on the meaning of "eis" (the Greek term used in the original and has been translated "for" in (Acts 2:38); some have claimed that it means "because of"; therefore, they state that baptism is "because of remission of sins"; or that one receives pardon of sins before he is baptized. Others say that "eis" means "for", "in order to", "unto" the remission of sins. The best scholarship on the translation of "eis" and its accompanying phrase translate it as: "for", "unto"—Benson, a Methodist, in "Commentary On the Bible"; "in order to"—Willmarth, a Baptist, in "Baptist Quarterly", 1878; "might receive"—Schaff, a Presbyterian, in "Shepherd's Handbook"; "denotes object"—Meyer, a Lutheran, in "Commentary on Acts".

Although most all religious organizations of today do not believe baptism is essential to one's salvation, their scholars have rendered the correct meaning of "for" in Acts 2:38. They knew that it was true. When you are baptized for the right purpose, you have your sins washed away (Acts 22:16) the Lord will add you to his church (Acts 2:47).

Elwood Harris was named tailor for the year, to keep parliamentary procedure on hand at the meetings.

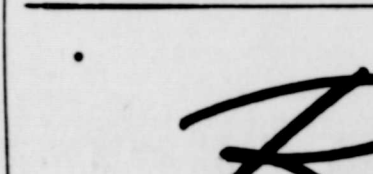
They voted to set up a special fund for the meals being served by the Jaycees.

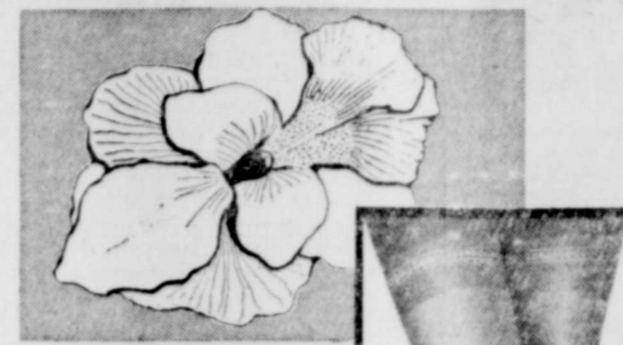

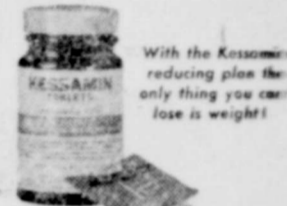

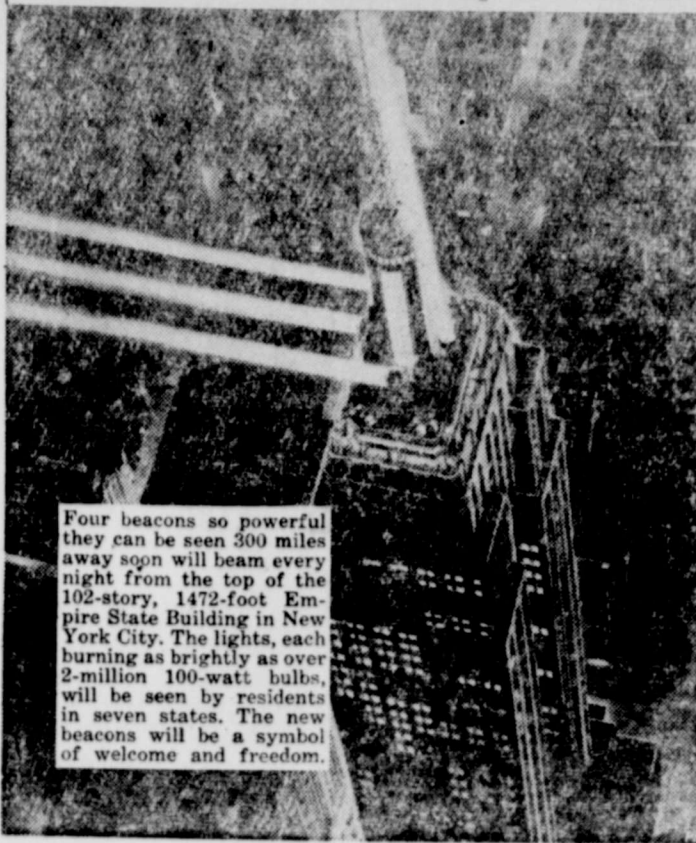
JUDGE MORRISON SEEKS ELECTION TO 2ND TERM ON CT. OF CRIMINAL APPEALS

WHAT WE ARE going to say in the next few lines probably comes under the heading of the "hot air" department and, in all probability will be just so much wasted breath but we want to get it off of our chest. — so here goes.

How can you, as a candidate for council — on the ballot because someone asked you to run, — have a real appreciation for the thankless, payless, job ahead, if people don't even care enough to take a few minutes and vote?

SCHOOL ELECTIONS coming up the following Saturday. Will you examine the list of names and say to yourself, now this man would be a good school trustee, I believe. Or, will you say, because of some petty misunderstanding either in the recent past or the distant past, "I don't know about these men, one's as good as another, but I'm going to black out this man's name because he did this or that. In other words are you going to the poll with the intention of picking out the best man, or are you going to vote simply because you want to vote against some man?

SEE A BIG VOTE at both elections, in Morton and in Whiteface, and at the school election in Whiteface. We're not endorsing any of the candidates. That's your privilege to choose and vote. But a bigger, more representative vote will not only probably select the best men, but will let all of the men running know that you do care a little how the city and the schools are run.

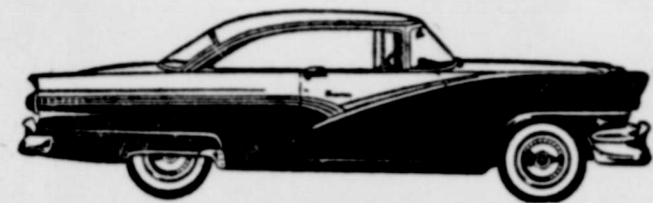
