WHITEFACE TRUSTEES NAMED NATHAN TUBB SUPERINTENDENT

The Whiteface School Board announced this week they have elevated a principal to the office of School Superintendent.

At a regular meeting of the Whiteface School District Board on Monday night of this week, the board offered the Superintendent's job to a 10 year veteran with the school, Junior High School Principal, Nathan Tubb.

Tubb replaces Noah Cunningham who resigned last week after six years at the helm of the school to accept a Superintendent's job near Corpus Christi.

Tuesday the details of the new contract are to be worked out at the next board meeting. Tubb had a two year contract renewed as principal and it is assumed the Supt. contract will be for at least two years.

Tubb is an experienced administrator and teacher. Last year he received a 10 year pin in recognition of 10 years with the Whiteface Schools. He had served three years as Junior High principal at Whiteface schools. Previously he had taught at Pop for three years and had served as Supt. there for two years. All told he has 15 years of experience in the teaching field.

Tubb also only recently completed a tenure as Mayor of Whiteface. Tubb comes from a family of well known teachers in this area. He took over office immediately as Cunningham left last Thursday morning to take over his new job. Cunningham gave as reasons for his resignation the fact that he just couldn't turn down the extra money offered by the new job and that the climate around Corpus Christi would be better on his wife's health.

Insect Situation Under Control County Agent Says

No new fields warranted poisoning the past week according to the weekly insect report check of County Agent Homer Thompson.

Seventy-eight fields checked by the Agent last week showed no serious damage and prompted the Agent to report, "The cotton looks better and is fruiting up better than I've seen since 1948."

The only big problem now, according to Thompson, is bacterial blight which is showing up in nearly all fields. It turns the lower leaves yellow and eventually they fall off. It does the squares the same way when they become affected and it will do both the same way, thereby reducing the yield and making the cotton over 40 percent of a great deal of it can be attributed to this disease.

It is called two names: (1) Angular Leaf Spot, or (2) Bacterial Blight. There seems to be nothing you can do about this disease except to plant varieties of cotton more tolerant to it. Open boll cotton is highly susceptible to it. More tolerant varieties are Stormmaster and Blightmaster and Playmaster Stormproof, 101. Blightmaster is the newest and here is its record compared with the following varieties and the yields per acre quoted at the Experiment Station in Lubbock:

Blightmaster, 789 lbs.
LockettStormproof, No. 1, 743 lbs.
Lankent 57, 705 lbs.
Western Stormproof, 724 lbs.
Stormmaster, 707 lbs.
CA 119, 746 lbs.

The record shows that stormproof cottons are more tolerant to the disease than open boll cotton, the Agent advises.

Rites Held for Brother of Mrs. Morrow

Armstrong, who had been in relatively good health, died suddenly Friday at Emory. Burial was in Emory.

Mrs. Morrow was unable to stand the rigors of the trip to Emory and the funeral was unattended by any Mortontites.

Survivors of Armstrong include four sons, three daughters, one brother and the one sister. His wife passed on several years ago.

REMNANTS OF ANCIENT SECT: About 200 of the last remaining members of a unique sect of Samaritan Jews still live peacefully in the town of Nablus, 40 miles north of Jerusalem, in Jordan, one of the Bible Lands. They are strict adherents to one God, believe only in the Pentateuch or first five books of the Old Testament and make three pilgrimages a year to Mt. Gerizim, their sacred mountain, for sacrificial rites. They pitch their tents and carry out ceremonies enjoined upon them since the time of Moses, including the sacrifice of a sheep for each person present. Their Patriarch, dressed in red turban and flowing white surplice, is shown here pointing to the words of the Torah of Law of Moses. The Good Samaritan who came to the rescue of the stranger on the road to Jericho, (Luke 10:33) was a member of this sect.

SCHOOL TO OPEN HERE SEPT. 3

After conferring with the Board of Equalization and interested citizens last week, the Morton Independent School District trustees voted Monday to set the School Tax Rate on \$2.00 per \$100 valuation & not ask for any increase in property values.

The action, unanimously voted by the six members present, came after a discussion of the school's indebtedness, the proposed budget, and other pertinent matters. However, a rider was attached onto the proposal, that any funds left over at the end of the coming school year be used to be applied on the approximately \$5,000 debt that will exist at the start of the present school year.

The raise, which would be 75c increase or an approximate 60 percent increase, would bring in \$314,000 in taxes in rough figures and the proposed budget submitted by the Superintendent was for \$290,000. In other words, barring any unforeseen circumstances, there is a possibility of \$10,000 or more to be applied against the existing operating fund indebtedness.

The operating fund indebtedness is not to be confused with the bonded indebtedness that this school, like most all schools, has.

By passing the tax rate raise, the Board does evade the possibility that the Board of Equalization might not have seen fit to raise the property values. They also may have sidestepped a court session with the Oil Companies who have said they will not object to the rate raise but would have fought such a steep property value increase.

Of the \$2 tax money, only \$1.50 can be used for operation of the school, the remaining 50c will be used on the school's building program.

Then the Board considered action to do away with the combination office of Business Manager - Tax Assessor Collector. They would instead incorporate the Business Manager duties with the Superintendent office duties and the new position of Assessor Collector of Taxes would be paid on a percentage basis of what was assessed and what was collected.

Under the new plan, the Assessor - Collector would either be a

RODEO PLANS INCLUDE ADDITIONAL AWARDS AND PONY GIVE - AWAY

"Texas Last Frontier Rodeo", the 5th annual event of its kind for the local Rodeo arena, should top all the previous ventures if the amount of activities planned have anything to do with it. Rodeo directors announced after a meeting on Friday night.

Elwood Harris, representing the Sheriff posse; J. T. Holloman of the Jaycees; Don Hoffman of the Roping Club met with C. E. (Samuel) Woods, of Clovis, New Mexico the stock director and turned over to lay those plans and also made a good share of the other incidental plans.

The Rodeo pattern will follow a similar pattern to the show held last year — with a few added enhancements to boost the number of entrants and the number of spectators.

The dates for the rodeo will be Friday and Saturday, August 3-4. The rodeo parade will be held at the same time, 4:00 on the first day of the show; the barbecue for all the fans who desire to attend the first night of the show and incur purchase advance tickets will be held at 7:00 p.m., as before; the bathing beauty contest, which the Jaycees have sponsored on two of the previous rodeos will be at 6:00 a.m. and the Grand Entry of the rodeo will be at 8:00.

The show will be a two go-round and average event with the top money in all six main events the same as last year with the exception of two \$150 saddles that have been added to the prize list. The two saddles will be awarded to the top rider and the top roper who compete in all of the riding events or all of the roping events. This could encourage more of the ropers and riders who would come to enter one event, think it was worth while to enter all events of their class.

To draw the crowd the Association plans to give away a shotgun pony to some lucky ticket stub holder on Saturday night's tickets.

All in all it promises to be one of the best shows ever held here.



In another year they expect to be off and winging toward more championships. Meanwhile, they are just spending the year on various projects to raise funds for the trips next year.

we feel sure . . .
THEY'LL BOUNCE back up to the top, just like our Sheriff Posse did after a layoff of about a year during which time they had troubles getting enough members to be on hand for the rides and just couldn't seem to win trophies consistently.

they're building . . .
QUITE A LOCAL feud in this HOT ROD business, but so far, the old master of the local racers, James Butler, manages to hold a one trophy lead. However, the way

according to . . .
THE REPORTS WE'VE received the past two weeks, and we won't vouch for their correctness because we weren't at either drag strip, but four local boys have won their first trophies of the year. Next to Butler comes Bob Benefield with a pair of drag strip trophies; and each with one trophy are Troy Lee Coon, Pee Wee Albright, Johnny Hodge and Kenneth White. The last two races at Hobbs and Midland found four trophies going to Mortontonites. But Butler, had difficulties. One of the boys who are local rivals said James forgot to turn on the fuel at Hobbs and at Midland, with a good lead, he got the gear shift hung on the dashboard in second gear.

they've all got . . .
EXCUSES — and most of them enjoy a laugh on the others when they pull a horsehead. After all, in an exacting business like racing, it only takes one short slip to get you beat.

there'll be . . .
SOME BEEFING, but we think very little about the new school. When people understand that the school is in debt and that a concerted effort is being made to reduce the debt and to get more for the patron's tax dollar, most people will react favorably knowing that the tax dollar spent on the kid's education is one tax dollar that is well worth the burden on the taxpayer.

why . . . ?
THE RAISE, is the most asked question. The answer is simple, the school was in debt and the debt had been increasing steadily under the old tax. Not only was there no way to reduce the debt, but the debt was getting bigger. That simply put our schools in the bind of having to put off some bills and to damage our credit rating. This, in turn, simply meant they couldn't get as good prices on items they did purchase. It also meant they had to continually borrow money and a larger part of the tax money would have to be paid on interest on borrowed money. Without funds they couldn't offer salaries that would keep teachers. Yes, one look at the overall picture and it's easy to see why the taxes had to be raised.

but the next . . .
QUESTION IS ALSO one that is asked many times. What steps are being taken to save money in our schools? First of all, the audit that was taken recently was the first step. I pinpointed antiquated ideas that have cost the school hundreds of dollars and spotlighted the need for a change in book-keeping setup as well as a change in how the business was handled. The audit didn't cost money. IT SAVED MONEY, over years to come. If the business is handled in the future according to the recommended changes of the auditors, who are experts in their field.

one of the . . .
CHANGES that are being made is to centralize all business through one office, the office of the superintendent, and to do away with the business manager. The Assessor-Collector is to be hired on a percentage basis, if possible. The new plans also call for some revisions in book-keeping methods recommended by the auditors. Purchases are on a requisition slip basis and all bills are fully gone over by the Board. No bills are to be allowed paid as long as the creditor is on the delinquent tax roll.

by setting the . . .
TAX RATE UP, the schools will have enough money to pay current bills and earn the discounts that can amount up to several hundred dollars on a big business in a big hurry. They will also cut out most of the interest payments. And, they will have enough funds to start whittling on that \$32,000 to \$35,000 operations debt that we have.

its good sense . . .
TO MAKE THESE changes. If you were in business and you op-

erated on a \$32,000 general fund indebtedness, you wouldn't last very long. Our schools are among the biggest businesses we know of. A half million dollar business — and it has been operating laxly in the way of finances. Yes, we definitely think the new board is on the right track. Infact, they've been on the right track for about a full year. But with as many problems as they had to face, it takes along time to get around to enough problems to make an appreciable change in operational appearance.

we just hope . . .
YOU'LL STUDY the thing a little before griping. You'll find that with all our troubles and with the new increased tax rate of 75c per \$100 evaluation, things still aren't as bad here as they have been in many school districts. We are fortunate, indeed, that we can see the possibility of working our way out without Federal Aid — many schools haven't a chance without it — they say.

IT WOULDN'T take me long to decide whether or not to attend the barbecued chicken dinner at the Famuliner Community later in the month. It's not often a cand-

idate receives anything for his campaign expenses, with the exception of some votes. Campaigning is a hard, expensive, and vicious thing. But the people of Famuliner are taking some of the sting out of it by serving this free dinner. The candidates can hardly afford not to be on hand. And, those who by some quirk were unable to attend the box supper a couple of weeks ago, are none the less, invited. If we were in their shoes we would certainly attend, but we would drop by a little early and bring 'em a chicken to help out. However, this suggestion is ours, not the suggestion of the people of Famuliner.



COTTON GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT

Many farmers have been asking questions in regard to cotton growth and development. Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Substation No. 8, Lubbock, gives the following timetable of stages of cotton growth in the Lubbock area.

Emergence to square, 30 days.
Square to white bloom, 20 to 25 days.
Bloom to open boll, 45 to 65 days.

Boll full grown 18 days after the bloom.
Should be ready to harvest within 15 days.
Twenty-five per cent open in 130 days.
130,000 equal number of seed in one bushel of average seed.
Most effective fruiting period is from July 20 to August 10.
Approximately 35 to 40 percent blooms make bolls.
September 1 is general last date for fruit to be set.
Poll period ranges from 45 to 65 days.
Fibre length laid down first 25 to 30 days.
Critical period in length is 16 days after blooming.

Strength of the fibre is built up in second 25 to 30 days.
Moisture is limited factor in the length of lint.
85 is average number of days to blooming peak.
27 is average number of days from first bloom to peak.
30 is average number of days from first bloom to shed peak.
Average per cent of blooms shed is 65 per cent.
Average number of blooms per plant is 35.
In 50 to 54 days after the first white bloom 30 per cent of the crop is open.
In 64 days, 71 per cent of the crop is open.
In 65-70 days, 81 per cent of the crop is open.



POULTRY REQUIRE PROTECTION FROM HEAT
 As summer temperatures climb above 85 degrees, many poultry flocks will drop in egg production. Feed consumption will decrease & water consumption will increase. Texas poultrymen should begin to plan now for adequate protection of their flocks during periods of high temperature, says Ben Wormeli, extension poultry husbandman. Increased water space, more effective ventilation systems, water sprays and shade are all being employed in an effort to thwart old man sun.

Normal body heat of a chicken is about 107. Chickens have no sweat glands and therefore cannot depend upon evaporation for body cooling. This makes it necessary to take precautions during the summer to provide the birds with shade and ventilation.

With Your... COUNTY AGENT

Here is a summary form in question and answer covering the important highlights of the Acreage Reserve plans for 1956 on wheat and cotton:

FOR WHEAT

1. Deadline: Agreements must be filed with your county ASC by July 20th.

2. How can you qualify? (a) If you underplanted your wheat allotment because of adverse weather, or (b) if your crop was destroyed by drought, rain, hail or other natural causes.

3. What is the largest acreage that can be placed in the acreage reserve? One half of your wheat allotment or 50 acres, whichever is the larger.

4. What is the smallest acreage that can be placed in the reserve? 10 percent of your allotment or five acres, whichever is the larger.

5. How will you be paid? (a) For underplanting, \$4 per acre. (b) For destruction by drought, flood or other natural causes the smaller of your normal yield or the appraised yield, multiplied by the rate set for your county, but not less than \$6 per acre.

6. Requirements? (1) Crop must not be grazed after June 22; (2) Must not harvest any crop from the reserve in 1956; (3) Must control noxious weeds; (4) Must comply with acreage allotments.

7. Division of payments between the landlord and tenant. Must be fair and equitable. Generally, the division will be approved by the county ASC Committees if it is based on the contribution the landlord and tenant would have made in producing the crop and on the basis they would have shared the crop.

8. How do you sign up? Go to your county ASC office. They immediately can give you the dollar-per-acre rate which you will receive for signing an agreement. In most cases you will be able to sign an agreement at your first visit.

COTTON

1. Deadline date is the same, July 20th for filing with the county ASC.

2. Qualify by (a) underplanting the cotton allotment because of adverse weather or because you planned to place that acreage in the soil bank; (b) by having your crop destroyed by drought, rain, hail or other natural causes; (c) by plowing under or mowing, etc., an acreage of your crop after May 27 &

before a date that has been set by your county. (Either July 2, July 16, or 31).

3. The largest acreage that can be placed in the reserve is 50 percent or 10 acres, whichever is larger.

4. The smallest acreage that can be placed in the reserve is 10 percent of the allotment or 2 acres, whichever is larger. (If the allotment is less than this minimum.

5. You will be paid as follows: (a). For Underplanting. Your normal yield multiplied by 15 cents; (b) For destruction by drought, flood or other natural causes or for plowing under, mowing, etc., Your normal yield or the appraised yield, whichever is smaller, multiplied by 15c, but not less than \$6 per acre.

6. Requirements are the same four requirements under the wheat program.

7. Division of payments is on the same basis.

8. Application is the same as for the wheat.

Bedouins Discovered Scrolls Near Jericho

The Dead Sea Scrolls were found over a nine-year period, starting in 1947, by Bedouin shepherds exploring in the Wadi Qumran area south of Jericho in Jordan, one of the Bible Lands. Searching for treasure, they uncovered the parchment manuscripts telling of life in Biblical times and giving a new insight into the origins of Christianity.

Since then scientific investigation has centered on the ruins of the Khirbet Qumran, located between the cliffs and the shores of the Dead Sea. Archeologists soon became convinced that this was once the "city in the wilderness" of the Essene community of Hebrews.

In Christ's time, the Essenes were an ascetic group that lived with two other groups, the Sadducees and the Pharisees, for the loyalty of the devout. It is believed that the sect was finally dispersed in the 1st century A.D. when the Roman conquerors destroyed their community. They apparently left their library buried in nearby caves as a legacy to humanity.

The two phases he speaks of are the planting of cover for range seeding in 1967 and the summer growing of legumes.

We encourage planting grain sorghum, millet, sudan or cane as a cover for next year's grass planting. By establishing and maintaining cover, grass planting can begin by April 1st very successfully.

This early date of planting will give our grass an even start with weed competition. Should you have all of your land planted, combine sorghums as high as possible and leave standing. Grass is important from the standpoint of cash income seed production, grazing, wind erosion control, and humus.

One good example that all of you have seen is Jack Curbo's field of love grass on the Morton, Whiteface highway approximately one mile northwest of Whiteface. The field was planted to love grass in August of 1954 and, as you know, received very little rain. In 1955, Jack turned 53 head of cattle on the land and they are still there.

This week, even with the cattle grazing constantly, a seed crop will have been harvested. An estimate of seed yield will run from 30 to 50 pounds per acre. Seed at 75¢ per pound plus grazing and the putting of organic matter back in the soil adds up to a good return and we will give the exact pounds harvested, when completed.

J. W. McDermott has 20 acres of blue panic and has averaged for the past three years harvesting 70 lbs. per acre and grazing. One other thing that is seldom mentioned is the fact that when we plant grass, usually it will be on sub-marginal land. I would like to see some planted on GOOD land just to see what it really will do.

The other phase of conservation, far behind, is summer legumes. We encouraged our local seed dealers to lay in a good supply of New Era, Braubham, and Chinese Red peas. They did and at the present time they still have that good supply. In fact, they still have, practically all that they purchased. These peas may be planted with
