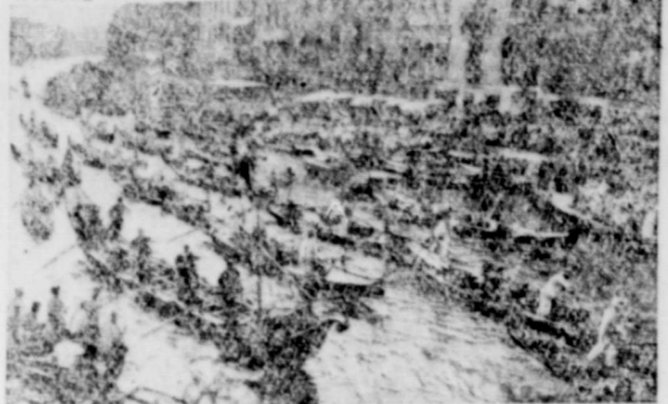

The Three Way grade school football team recently journeyed to Cotton Center for a game which they lost.

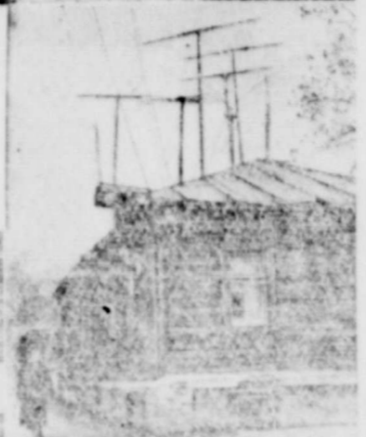
SPLIT FINAL TWO GAMES

Traffic All Snarled Up!

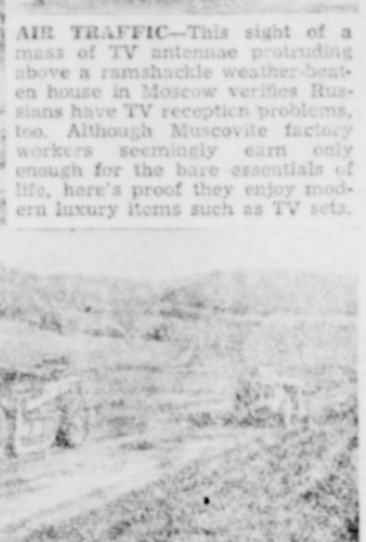

WASHINGTON AND SMALL BUSINESS

Sometimes in the course of events, it is possible to observe chickens coming home to roost. Such an occurrence took place recently concerning some big American magazines. In addition, these are big American magazines that have long and loudly propagandized for free trade, taking the stand that U. S. business and labor should not be protected by effective tariff laws. These magazines have had some circulation in Canada; in fact, quite a substantial circulation. With most of these magazines their Canadian circulation has reached a point where it was more profitable to either print editions in Canada, or print special Canadian editions. The editorial format remained the same. The biggest difference was that their Canadian editions were attractive to Canadian advertisers seeking to reach their fellow Canadians. In addition, some American firms also wished to advertise in Canada. Thus, apparently, everybody was happy. But there are two or three all-Canada magazines which have been published for many years in Canada. Apparently, they were not happy, and became still less happy when they found that these Canadian editions of American magazines not only attracted more readers in Canada than Canadian magazines, but because of that fact, were taking substantial shares of the Canadian advertising dollar. So the Canadian government acted, with a law providing for...

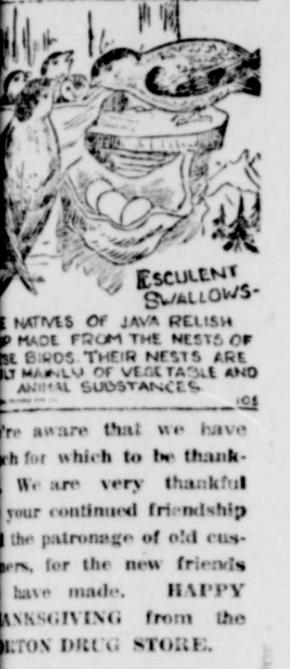

The overriding factor in determining the eligibility of any applicant is his financial ability to obtain the feed necessary to maintain his basic herds and continue his normal operations. An applicant whose financial circumstances are such that he can provide necessary feed for his basic herds and carry on his operations without serious difficulty is not eligible for the assistance. Under the present designation, applications may be filed through December 31, 1956 for a supply of feed grain and roughage to carry basic livestock herds through December 31, 1956.

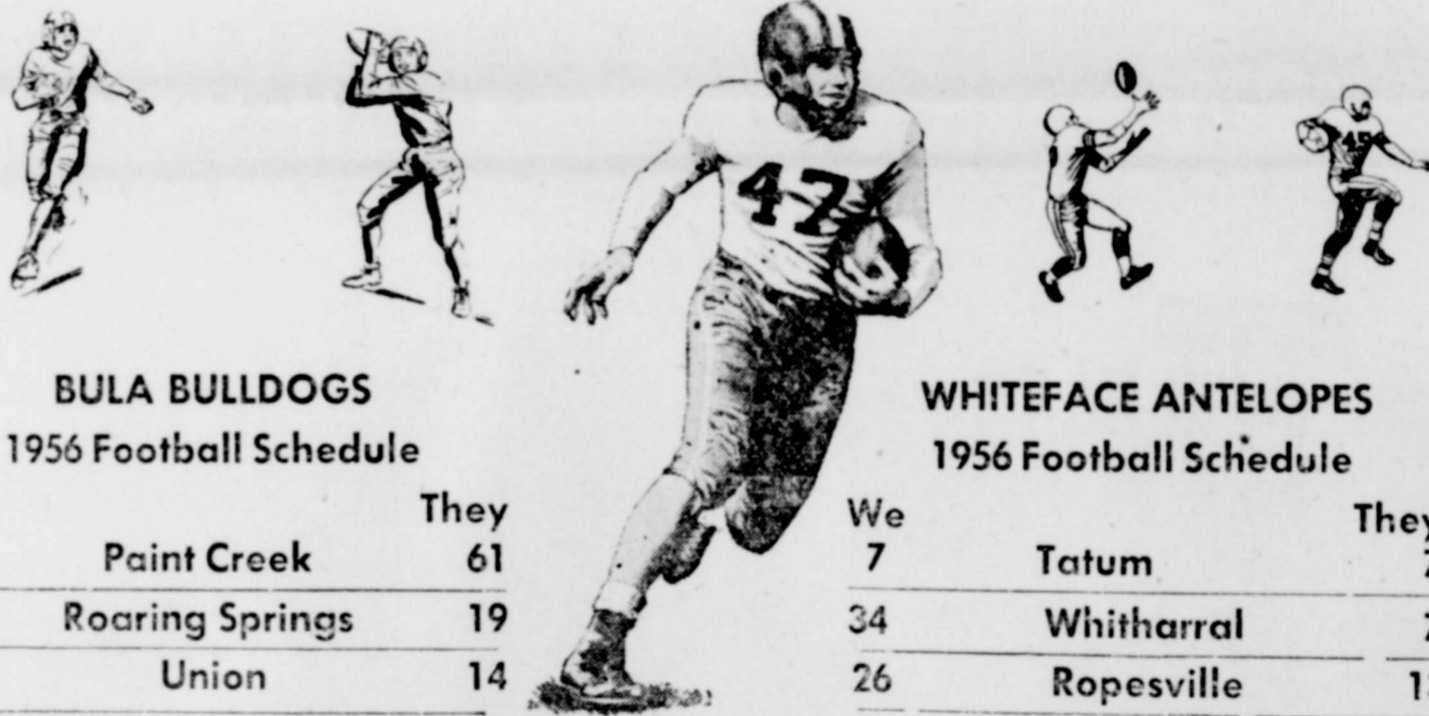

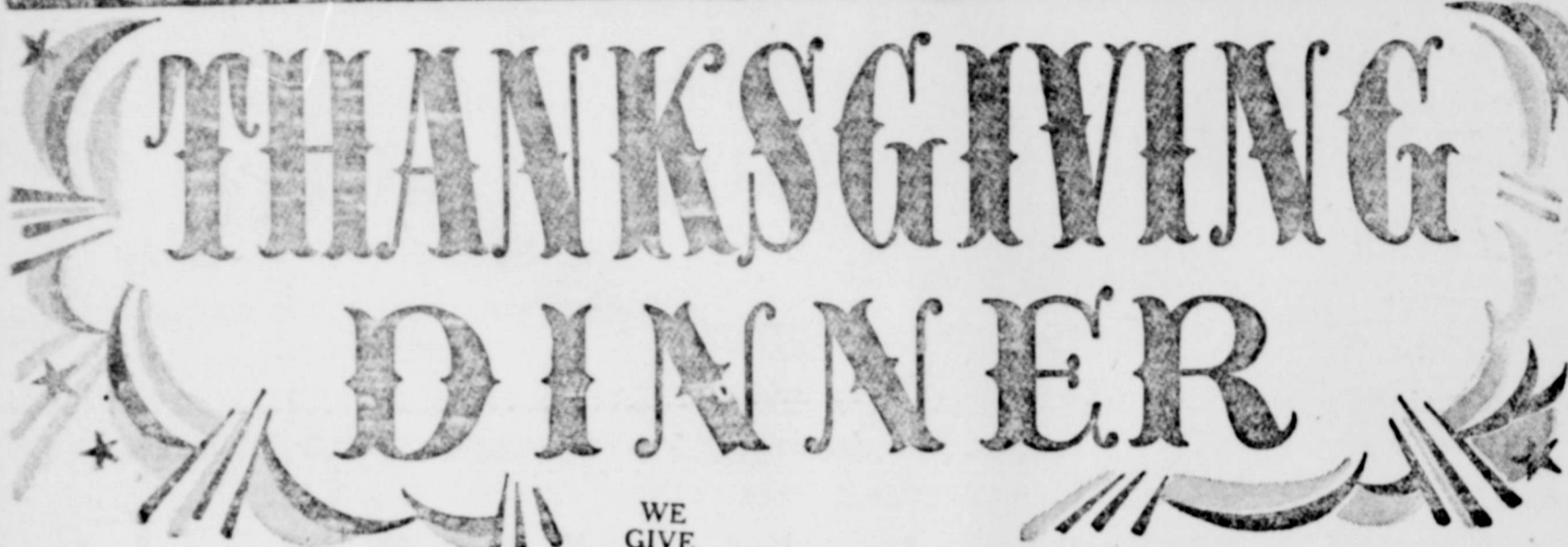

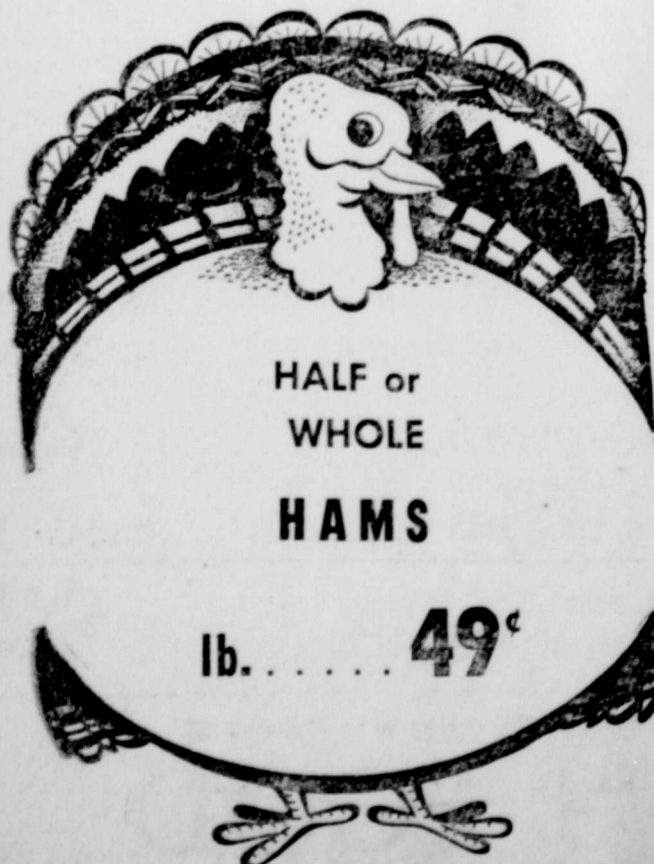

Cleanest Street in the World



Forty Hunter College girls worked themselves into a lather paving a street block at Rockefeller Plaza with 108,000 bars of pink Camay soap to begin the 1956-1957 campaign of the Citizens' Committee to Keep New York City Clean.

The volunteers completed the five-hour job at 9:30 a.m. and then posed in an aura of cleanliness for photographers and television cameramen. The sweet-smelling soap mosaic, extending from 49th to 50th St., proclaimed "A Cleaner N. Y. Is Up To You" in six-foot letters of soap wrapped in pink foil.

The design, which also included a broom and its "swoosh," was laid out late Monday night by two professional artists after the street was closed to traffic. About 90,000 unwrapped bars provided the fragrant background for 18,000 others used in the lettering and symbol. There was enough soap, it was said, to provide an average family of four persons 4.154 years of clean living.

Keith S. McHugh, chairman of the Citizens' Committee, spoke at a brief ceremony shortly after 10:00 a.m., which was hosted by TV and radio personality Jinx Falkenburg, and said that his group was trying to convince 8,000,000 New Yorkers that "it's more fun and nicer to have a clean

**TIPS FOR SURVIVAL
FCDA Offers Practical
Defense Against Fallout**

In a split second during the post-dawn hours of a morning in November 1952, radioactive fallout came of age as a potential hazard to every living thing.

Since then, millions of words have been written and spoken about it. We are told that it cannot be detected by any of the human senses, only by radiation detection devices. It can hitch a ride on the wind for hundreds of miles from a nuclear blast, settle to earth in remote places and make entire areas temporarily uninhabitable.

BUT WHAT, ACTUALLY, is fallout? Can its movement be predicted? And what can people do to protect against it?

Fallout is nothing more than tiny dust particles blasted into the air when a nuclear weapon's fireball intersects the earth's surface. This material is then made radioactive by the fireball, and thus carries dangerous radiation to wherever the dust falls.

By plotting high-altitude winds, weather men can predict the area of fallout, and tell approximately where it will land. Radiological monitoring would then establish specific fallout patterns.

People can protect themselves mainly by staying under cover, and tuning a battery-operated radio to emergency civil defense frequencies for expert instructions. A basement makes a fair shelter, an old-fashioned root cellar an excellent one. This is because only 1/5,000th of the radiation that would hit a person in the open will penetrate three feet of earth.

MOST IMPORTANT, remember that fallout leaves no margin for errors, or amateurs. For example, just because the surface wind is blowing from a "safe" direction doesn't mean that the winds above 10,000 feet—which would usually dominate the direction of fallout—weren't blowing some other way. Only the experts have the equipment to predict fallout areas.
